Under the guise of comedy, occasionally black, this film presents a biting commentary on the vague and meaningless lives of a certain segment of contemporary American society. Because its style is obscure, even some adult viewers will find the film confusing, and certain elements in the treatment may strike them as needlessly sensational. The cast would suggest that this is a film for young people; it cannot be approved for them.

Class B
Objection: This one-dimensional story about the unscrupulous efforts of a psychopath to achieve fame in the motion picture world, though moral in theme, could have been developed without so much emphasis upon suggestiveness in treatment.

Class C
Objection: While making a slight pretense at being a light-hearted and comic spoof of the current mania for spy stories, this film tends to be in fact a vulgar, burlesque show, highlighting suggestive costuming, erotic dancing and gross situations.

Seminarians Rate Faculty

St. Louis — (RNS) — Student candidates for the priesthood at Kenrick Seminary here turned the tables on the faculty by conducting a full-scale evaluation of the Roman Catholic seminary's faculty.

The student study was carried out with the approval of the faculty.

"It was extremely informative and very helpful to us," said Father Ronald King, academic dean. Kenrick is maintained by the Vincentian Fathers.

THE EVALUATION consisted of two parts. The first asked the student to rate each professor on his knowledge of the subject, his enthusiasm for it, class presentation, unnecessary digressions or text reference, ability to relate the matter to practical situations, and so forth. Part Two was more personal, inquiring about the professor's class demeanor, attitude toward reasonable questions, impartiality, courtesy, sense of humor, etc.

Father King said the student replies were carefully examined, first by himself, then by faculty members.

It revealed a number of interesting points, Father King said. As a general rule, students expressed satisfaction with faculty competence and knowledge within their field. They were "pretty enthralled" with the courses on ecumenical theology, conducted this past semester by two professors from Eden Theological Seminary, a United Church of Christ institution, and were appreciative of

the work of other "outside" faculty members from Webster College and St. Louis University.

Father King said another common point was the desire for more class discussion in theology courses. "They'd like to talk all day long in this class, but they're reluctant to adopt a particular position. With only three periods of theology a week, we don't have time for much discussion."

Kenrick's academic dean noted that while students were generally pleased with the faculty's competence, the replies showed they were critical of personal attitudes.

"Individual relationships were not so high," he said. "The students felt a need to be considered as individuals, an appreciation of them as persons, not just numbers."

"Surprisingly," he added, "about half the students signed their names to the evaluations, with the most biting criticisms coming from those who identified themselves."

Father King said the faculty "not to be outdone" — has in the planning stage a corresponding evaluation of the students by each faculty member. Students will be invited to draw up a check list of matters they think the faculty can make judgments about, then submit them.



105th Birthday for Nun

Mother Keeler Marks Her Golden Jubilee

A golden day of celebration for Mother Rose Keeler of the Academy of the Sacred Heart, took place on the Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes, Feb. 11. Mother renewed her vows made 50 years ago at the Community Mass, and at 9:30 Bishop Kearney presided at a Solemn High Mass in honor of the jubilee.

The celebrant was Monsignor Wilfred T. Craugh, a former student of Mother Keeler's brother, Father Leo Keeler, S.J. at the Gregorian University in Rome. (Father Keeler had the distinction of being the first American on the faculty of this renowned University.)

At the end of the Mass, sung by the students, the Bishop's sermon emphasized the value to a community of older religious, "whose presence is a power... a link with the great traditions of the past."

In the early afternoon the students presented their congratulations to the jubilarian in the form of a chorus followed by an address and presentation of a gift. Former pupils and friends shared in the jubilee festivities by assisting at a talk and Solemn Benediction followed by tea.

Mother White Passes at 92

Mother Katherine White, 92, of the Convent of the Sacred Heart, 8 Prince Street, died on Monday, Feb. 14, 1966, after a lengthy illness. Requiem Mass was offered for her on Wednesday, Feb. 16, in the convent chapel.

Mother White was born in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and entered the Religious of the Sacred Heart at Torresdale, Pa. in 1903.

She came to Rochester in 1909 after being stationed for a short time at Torresdale, and then at New York City. She was outstanding in the service she rendered to the community in the form of non-teaching duties.

Surviving are a nephew, Mr. John White of Brooklyn, and two nieces, Mrs. Hinchey and Mrs. Wherry of Philadelphia. Interment was in the Sisters plot, Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.

Birth Control Advocate Shies Away from Debate

Chicago — (NC) — A controversy has erupted here over the withdrawal of Senator Ernest Gruening of Alaska from a television program on which he was to discuss birth control and government policy with a priest and a Catholic doctor.

After pulling out of the scheduled discussion, Gruening, a leading congressional advocate of government birth control, appeared on another TV program here and presented his views without rebuttal from any Catholic source.

Msgr. John M. Kelly, editor of the New World, Chicago's archdiocesan newspaper, gave this account of the incident in the New World:

Gruening was scheduled to appear Feb. 3 on the "At Random" TV discussion program on Chicago's WBBM. Msgr. Kelly was invited to take part in the discussion of birth control and the use of federal funds for its promotion. Msgr. Kelly said he understood the program was to be "a promotion of the Planned Parenthood association."

He declined but suggested Father Augustine Rock, O.P., of Chicago. Invitations to appear on the program were then extended to Father Rock and to Dr. Herbert Ratner, a Catholic who is public health director in Oak Park, Ill. Both men accepted.

However, Msgr. Kelly reported, "on very short notice" the discussion was canceled. "Father Rock was informed that the Planned Parenthood group had objected to Dr. Ratner... According to Dr. Ratner, he was informed by the producer of 'At Random' that he was too strong an opponent for Senator Gruening," Msgr. Kelly said.

McDonald, rector, "that the institute will serve all Americans as a source of scholarly enlightenment in the strenuous exercise of understanding, inquiry and spiritual and social reconstruction that lies before us if the word 'ecumenism' is to be written deeply and ineradicably in this nation's soul."

"Distinguished visiting scholars and visiting lecturers, both Catholic and Non-Catholic, will be invited to participate in the institute's work," he said.

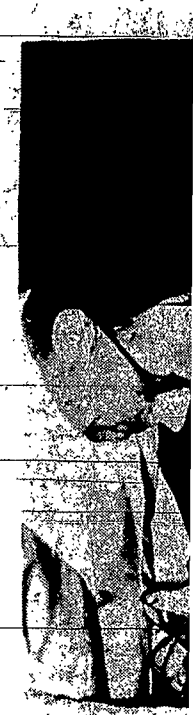
