

Aquinas 64, Watertown 37

 Aquinas locked up virtually all the rebounds and hounded the Watertown shooters to run away with a 64-37 victory last Saturday night in the Aquinas gym.

For the Irish victory was their 10th of the season against 7 losses as they thoroughly outclassed the invaders who never came close.

Outbounding the Watertown quint 69-37, the Irish displayed a crackling fast break as they romped past their foes. The only time the visitors stayed with them was in the first three minutes of play when the Maroon and White had trouble finding the basket.

Hustling Paul Adams kept the Watertown cagers in the contest for a while with a flip-style jumper from the corner. The other visitors were held in check, however, and Aquinas began to pull away fast.

The Irish built a 31-21 half-time lead mainly on the sharp

eye of Jim Coffey. At the intermission Coach Jack Kelly retired Coffey, who had accumulated 15 points, in favor of his less experienced players.

Six-four John Laveck entered the game for the second and third periods, pumped in seven points, pulled down 17 rebounds and joined Coffey on the bench. Richie Greenwood with 10 and Pat DiNicola with 8, added to the bulge in the last half. Before all was done Coach Kelly was able to clear his bench, enabling 9 of his 11 players to break into the scoring column.

Paul Adams put in 12 points or the visitors.

In the preliminary game, the Aquinas junior varsity beat St. Andrew's Seminary, 66-43. Earlier in the week the Aquinas juniors topped the Bishop Kearney J.V.'s, 56-42, with Dan Hogan of Aquinas collecting 27 points.

Aquinas closes out its regular season Saturday, Feb. 26, in Lyons against the Lyons Central School.

A Fisher rally headed by a spunky Brad Chase twice brought the Cardinals within one point of tying the score late in the second half. With 1:02 remaining on the clock Waterloo led 50-45. But John

The first overtime ended with the score 58-58 after a scoreless final minute which saw the Fisher quint give the ball away with 19 seconds to go.

In the second extra period Pete Misikowetz quickly put on a one-man scoring display that put the game on ice for Waterloo. His game total of 30 points, highest for the Fisher gym this season, included two goals and four free throws made in the final overtime. Bill Gillespie and Don Collins each added 10 for the Hawks. Jim Charles led the Fisher scoring with 17 points. His chief help came from Ron Ashe and Tony Binsack, each of whom had 10.

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McQuaid Rolls Over 2 Foes

 Kearney took a brief 2-0 lead on Bob Case's short jumper. But the next 12 points were McQuaid's as senior Ray Sherbinski nit for 2 buckets, Bob Weingartner canned 2 fouls, and John Koller hit on a jumper, and a layup. Kearney coasted to 14-10 behind Tom Boss and Scott Shales, but McQuaid, with Koller hitting for 6 more points, went on another tear to lead 24-10 at the quarter.

In the second period, when Kearney got as close as 30-26, it was Weingartner and Sherbinski who carried the scoring load, combining for 5 baskets to keep McQuaid ahead by 37-28 at intermission. McQuaid's pressing defense, wrapped up the game in the third quarter, holding Kearney to 4 points while Sherbinski, Jeff Gillenkirch, and Koller pumped the Knights' lead up to 53-22.

The last quarter saw Koller hit for 3 in a row on assists from Tom Blake as he piled his game-high up to 24 points. Weingartner finished with 15 points and Sherbinski had 12.

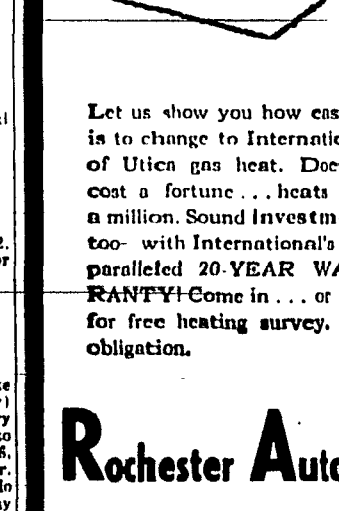
The J.V. game also went to McQuaid, 55-35, in a reversal of the earlier meeting between the two schools.

In the Watertown victory, Blake's long jumper gave McQuaid a lead it never lost, and by the end of the first quarter, it was 15-6. McQuaid steadily upped the count, led by Weingartner, and left the floor at halftime sporting a 33-15 edge.

Watertown's seven quick points at the outset of the fourth quarter enabled the visitors to creep to 46-36 with 6:50 left. Baskets by Blake, Joe Connolly and Koller plus two fouls by Weingartner pushed McQuaid ahead 54-36. After Don Steele's bucket for Watertown, Nick Combs and Tim Dieter scored and Paul Jones hit three times to widen the gap to 64-26 with 1:40 left to play.

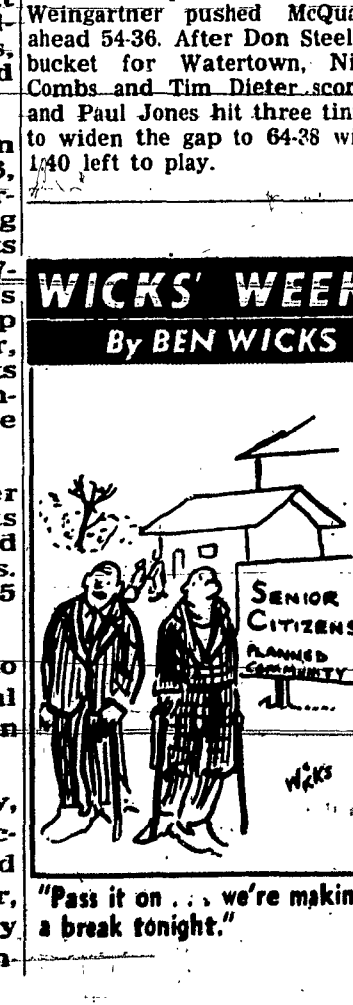
CYO Winter Frolic
