House of Hospitality Plans Jubilee Mass

Three priests will concelebrate the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass on Saturday afternoon, Mar. 19 — the Feast of St. Joseph — to mark the 25th year of one of the most unique institutions in the Rochester Diocese.

Concelebrants will be priests who have been most intimately connected with St. Joseph's House of Hospitality during its quarter-century of providing free meals and clothing to homeless and transient men in the downtown Rochester area.

The Mass is scheduled at 4:30 p.m. Saturday, Mar. 19, in the second-floor chapel of the House at 402 South Ave. Concelebrants will be:

Father George C. Vogt, pastor of Good Shepherd Church, Henrietta, and first chaplain of the House; Father Benedict A. Ehmann, pastor of St. Michael's Church, who for many years worked with and counseled members of the group which conducts the House; and Father Raymond A. Kenny, professor at St. Andrew's Seminary and present House chaplain.

Friends of the House who have been associated with it over the last two and one-half decades have been invited to

the Mass and the silver anniversary ceremony.

Following the Mass, priests and laymen will assist in serving the traditional 5:30 p.m. free meal to the 60 to 100 men who are fed daily. They will then prepare their own dinner, which will be followed by the anniversary program.

The House has no organized source of income; it receives no assistance from any organized charitable agency, and conducts no public appeal for funds.

It receives monies for operation from contributions of friends, both priests and lay.

—Unofficial estimates disclose that the House has served more than 600,000 meals and distributed tons of clothing during its quarter-century of existence.

Operation of the House is in the hands of a small group of Catholic men and women. Their dedication to what they feel is the need for "personal charity" toward their fellowmen has motivated their reluctance toward publicity and fanfare.

New Locale

Loreto House Off To Cleveland

Miss Isabelle Dolan, who closed up her Loreto House neighborhood center in inner-city Rochester last October, is ready to open again, but in a new location — Cleveland, Ohio.

She suspended operations in the Hand Street neighborhood of St. Bridget's parish last fall, feeling that much of the Loreto House work was being cared for by other nearby centers. Her family-centered "arts, manners and morals" program had been in operation for two years.

Miss Dolan, who had moved to Hand Street in 1963, anxious to serve Rochester's less-affluent Negro citizens, soon developed a successful approach that included crafts, culture and catechetics. A number of volunteers, eventually organized into the Loreto Interracial Guild, backed her efforts. She got support from the Redeemist Fathers of St. Joseph's Church, as well as from Father Francis Vogt of St. Bridget's.

Frankly concerned for the

conversion of unchurched people, she was responsible for the baptisms of some 40 adults and children in a two year period. Because of the religious emphasis of her program, she shied away from seeking anti-poverty funds when she realized that government help could not be given to a program that stressed religion.

After she closed Loreto House here last fall, she visited a number of northern and southern cities, looking for a place that could use her own unique blend of the lay apostolate. Her search brought her finally to the Cleveland location, where she has decided to sink her roots.

Cleveland's Bishop Clarence G. Issenmann has shown an encouraging interest in the Loreto House approach. He has given her an official mandate for the work, has found a suitable building for the project, and made a \$7,000 donation to get it off the ground.

The new site, a former seminary building, is a 4-story structure at the corner of Superior Avenue and Ansel Road. It's located in the parish of St. Thomas, whose pastor, Father Otis Winchester, will act as spiritual director of Loreto House in Cleveland.

First job for the spirited Miss Dolan will be to get some volunteer help, "even one or two full-time people who would like to dedicate themselves to this work" to help her fix up the building and set up programs to serve the families in the area, now 90% Negro in population makeup.

In point of service, Father Lowe was the oldest member of the Jesuit faculty at McQuaid. He joined the group at the Jesuit High School in 1959 and taught English, Latin and Religion.

A native of Ridgewood, New Jersey, Father Lowe was a grad-

uate of St. Peter's High School in Jersey City. He then entered the Jesuit Order and studied as a novice at St. Andrew-on-Hudson in Poughkeepsie, New York. He taught as a scholastic at Xavier High School in New York City. He then continued

his studies at Woodstock College in Maryland and was ordained in 1956. He also served at the Auriesville Shrine until he joined the faculty at McQuaid in 1959.

Aware of the shortage of chaplains in the armed services, he recently volunteered his services and joined the numerous Jesuit chaplains already serving in the armed forces. On Feb. 27, he offered Mass and preached at his new station for the first time. Fittingly enough, he began his duties as chaplain on his birthday.

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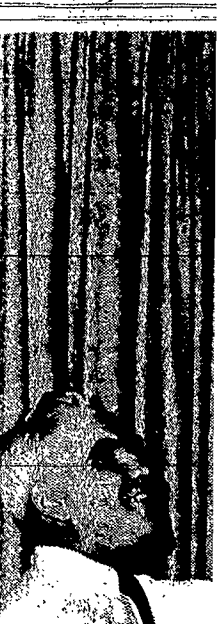
