

Padua Downs Romulus Wins Area Loop Title

The Padua Cascaders beat the Romulus Warriors 62-51 last Friday to clinch the Lakes' Region League crown. This was a first for the 14-year-old school.

Joe Jurewicz and Cliff Swirski sparked the team to the victory with 24 and 18 points respectively, while Erv Knuetter put in 19 for the losers.

Romulus took a 16-13 lead in the first quarter, but Padua came back to tie, 26-26, at the end of the half. In the third quarter Padua jumped to a 48-35 lead, which was never threatened.

Fine defensive work by Padua's Rich Stoklosa kept the Lakes' Region top scorer, Bruce Ike, down to 9 points in the last three quarters. Padua played without its top rebounder, Steve Czajkowski, but John Opiola, a six-foot sophomore, shared control of the backboards with Joe Jurewicz. Romulus put a press on Padua throughout the game, but it was ineffective due to Tom Malina's fine floor direction.

Padua finished the season with a 10-2 league record and a 15-3 overall mark, going into the Diocesan High School tournament.
