

Father Dan Lord, Still A Mover!

A comment of a famous Jesuit, Father Daniel Lord, who died several years ago, was responsible for sparking a successful forum for parents of teen-agers, held at St. Stanislaus parish last week.

"If I had it to do over," noted Father Lord, who spent most of his priesthood working with young people, "I would spend more time with parents."

Coming across this quotation recently, Father Edward Kowalski, assistant pastor at the Norton St. church, decided to organize an "Informal Forum for Parents of Teen-Agers." Father Kowalski is also active in youth work in his parish.

Seventy interested parents turned out to discuss their relationships with their own teen age youngsters. They used material from several surveys recently made among the teen

agers of the parish. Survey questions included some frequently raised by the young people:

"Do your parents understand you?"

(For boys) "Do you feel that your parents ought to let you wear long hair?"

Survey results, presented to the parents at the March 15 gathering, provided fuel for the evening's discussion. Small "buzz-sessions" were organized to give everyone a chance to contribute, and group conclusions were reported back to the general gathering.

The results were enlightening.

Many parents were concerned with communication—how to foster open discussion with their children. (One suggestion was to have an informal weekly meeting of the family.)

Most parents agreed that teen-agers should be given greater responsibility as they grew older. Most parents favored group teen-age gatherings, rather than single couple dating.

The group agreed that there is a natural "dissonance" between parents and teen-age children, but all felt that there were many areas in which relationships could be improved.

Pleased with the evening's discussion, the parents felt that such forums should be continued, at least twice a year. For the next meeting, planned for early fall, parents will submit unsigned questions or problems as a basis for group meetings as a basis for group dialogue.

CFM Couple Given Award

Notre Dame — (RNS) — Mr. and Mrs. Patrick F. Crowley of Wilmette, Ill., founders of the worldwide Christian Family Movement, were named to receive the 1966 Laetare Medal presented annually by Notre Dame University to an outstanding American Catholic layman or woman.

The Crowleys are the first couple to share the award since it was instituted in 1933. They were on a seven-week visit of CFM groups in Africa, Australia, New Zealand, France and Switzerland.

Father Dailey Appointed Vice Chancellor

Rev. Joseph W. Dailey was appointed by Bishop Kearney to be vice chancellor of the Rochester Diocese this week.

The appointment will become effective Monday, March 28.

Father Dailey will assist Monsignor George A. Cocuzzi, diocesan chancellor. The chancellor is executive secretary and chief fiscal officer of the Diocese.

Father Dailey, a native of Elmira, was ordained to the priesthood on June 12, 1949. He has served as assistant pastor of St. Patrick's Church, Corning, St. Cecilia's Church, Elmira, and St. Ambrose and St. Charles Churches in Rochester.

While at St. Ambrose, Father Dailey directed the construction of the new modern church. He also directed the planning of the present school and auditorium which were erected after the old school had been destroyed by fire. His work was recognized by parishioners in their naming the new auditorium Dailey Hall.

Parishes Report On Circulation

Nearly all parishes have reported results of the February Courier circulation drive—only 25 are yet to submit their final figures.

Two Assigned to Brazil

Sister Mariana Pilot and Sister Gilmara Cardinal are the latest Sisters of St. Joseph of Rochester to be assigned to the Community mission in Matira, Brazil, according to Mother Agnes Cecilia, Mother General of the Order.

SISTER MARIANA, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bernard E. Pilot of St. Charles Borromeo Parish, attended St. Charles elementary school, and Nazareth Academy. Entering the Sisters of St. Joseph in 1951, she attended Nazareth College, the University of Rochester, and Catholic University of America, receiving her Master's Degree in Education from Catholic U. in 1965.

She has taught at St. Rose School in Lima, St. Anne, Most Precious Blood, Sacred Heart, and Nazareth Academy in Rochester, and has been Placement Director and Assistant in Guidance at Nazareth College of Rochester since 1961. She has two sisters, Mrs. John Beers, and Sister M. Una, S.S.J., presently teaching at Nazareth Hall.

SISTER GILMARA is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. Edward Cardinal of St. John the Evangelist Parish, Greece. She graduated from St. John's School and Nazareth Academy, and will receive her B.A. degree this June from Nazareth College. Sister has taught at St. Mary's, Elmira; St. Mary's, Canandaigua, and is now finishing her teaching Academy at St. Anne's, Palmyra. She has three younger brothers and three younger sisters.

Both Sisters will complete this year's teaching assignment leaving in early August for

Jesuit Mission Dinner Lists Famed Retreat Priest

The principal speaker at the First Annual Jesuit Mission Benefit Dinner to be held on Monday, March 28th, at the Grand Ball Room of the Manger Hotel is well known to many Rochesterians. He is Father Charles F. X. Dolan, S.J. At the time that he was teaching at Canisius in Buffalo, he made frequent trips to Rochester to act as moderator for the Rochester Loyola Council. This was before there was any Jesuit community in Rochester.

Father Dolan attended Woodstock College in Maryland, and was ordained there. Prior to his ordination, he taught at Xavier High School in New York City and subsequently at Canisius High School in Buffalo, going there from St. Peter's College in Jersey City.

Because of his wide knowledge and forensic ability, Father

Dolan has given many retreats for both priests and laymen in the United States and in Europe. He gave one retreat at Berchtesgaden in Germany in a retreat house, constructed from one of the luxury houses frequented by Adolf Hitler and members of his staff in the Nazi party.

He comes from a family who were artistically inclined—all of them distinguished singers and performers. For many years his father was a moving spirit in the Parents Minstrel Show put on by the New York Jesuit Province. His mother sang for Victor Herbert.

Father Dolan has a brother in the Jesuits, who has been a chaplain in the Army for many years.

A frequent speaker on the Sacred Heart Hour that originated in St. Louis, he has made numerous appearances on television and radio. His talk next Monday will be on the work of the Jesuits in the mission field.
