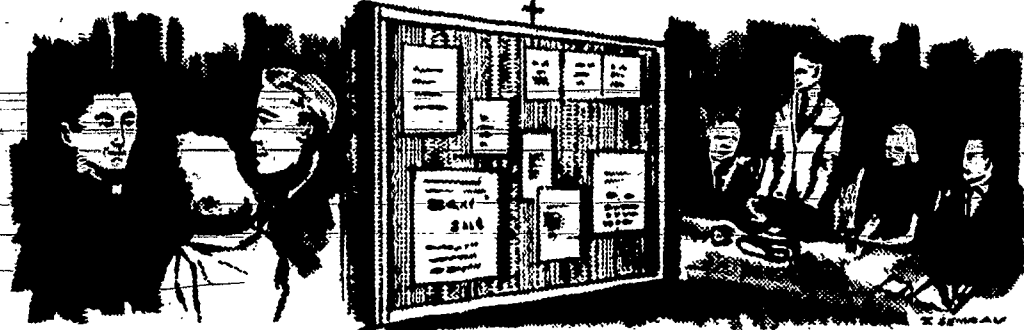

## A Vital Faith, Best Remedy for Atheism

Madrid — (NC) — Pope Paul VI is vitalizing the work of the Holy Office and changing its procedures to become "seekers and promoters of truth" instead of "policemen of orthodoxy," according to the Belgian theologian who has just been named to a top post in its ranks.

Father Charles Moeller, 54, University of Louvain professor named by Pope Paul to the new post of undersecretary of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, said that from now on the task of the congregation will be to promote the truth "wherever it is to be found." The day of the Holy Office as a "defense" congregation is past, he said.

Father Moeller, who is credited as being one of the chief architects of the Vatican Council's Constitution on the Church in the modern world, gave his views of his new duties in an interview with Father Juan Arias, M.S.C., a Vatican correspondent for the Madrid daily, Pueblo. He said that because of prior commitments, he will not be able to take up residence in Rome until the end of this year.

By his appointment, Father Moeller fills the third highest executive post in the congregation, coming directly under Alfredo Cardinal Ottaviani, the prefect, and Archbishop Pietro Parente, the secretary.

The Pope's reform decree of Dec. 7 abolished the former No. 3 post, that of commissary (judge). The position of commissary had been entrusted to Dominicans since the days when the Holy Office was known as the Sacred Congregation of the Inquisition. The Pope after abolishing the post appointed the last commissary, Father Raimondo Verardo, O.P., apostolic administrator of the archdiocese of Amalfi in southern Italy.

Father Moeller in assessing the new tasks before the Doctrine-Congregation made these points:

- "We must 'risk undertaking dialogue with . . . all the people of our times.'"
- "The intellectuals have not yet discovered the whole essence of Catholicism, which is rooted in its sacramental, biblical, artistic and liturgical strength and wealth. I am certain that anticlerical intellectuals will come to discover that they are very close to the Church. They are much more closely linked to it than many rote Catholics and those lacking concern, who have made religion simply a compartmentalized matter, without either a capacity for change or for giving a sense of depth or vitality to its existence."

He declared that in a world itself divided, "the disunity of Christians . . . is a scandal which calls for a second curtain sign of the Church, the one-people-of-God."

It is difficult for the working masses to discover the true essence of Catholicism. It is impossible to discover true Christianity only by studying the way Christians behave, yet the great masses have no other source of contact with the Church than this . . .

"The best remedy for atheism is to vitalize our faith and our hope and to give our charity so real a depth that it reflects the living image of Christ—a Christ real, so tied up in our history, so alive in our problems, so necessary in our existence, that He is more current than the morning newspaper. . . ."

"Few Catholics have sufficiently understood what St. Paul meant when he said that Christ came for the very purpose of bringing us the blessed freedom of the sons of God. Too many Catholics have made a caricature of Christian hope. They have made it a sort of alibi which masks their abandonment of life's obligations. They are comparable to a man who holds a fire insurance policy; they think they are regular in paying their premium for salvation. By their routine attendance at Sunday Mass and by confession, even though lacking a purpose of interior reform."

Father Moeller, who has been in the forefront in promoting understanding between Catholics and nonbelievers, said that in his new post he expects to be in close contact with the Vatican Secretariat for Nonbelievers, which is headed by Franziskus Cardinal Koerzig of Vienna.

As for the movement for Christian unity, he said that ecumenism "has entered the conscience of believers" and that from now on "we must not be asleep."

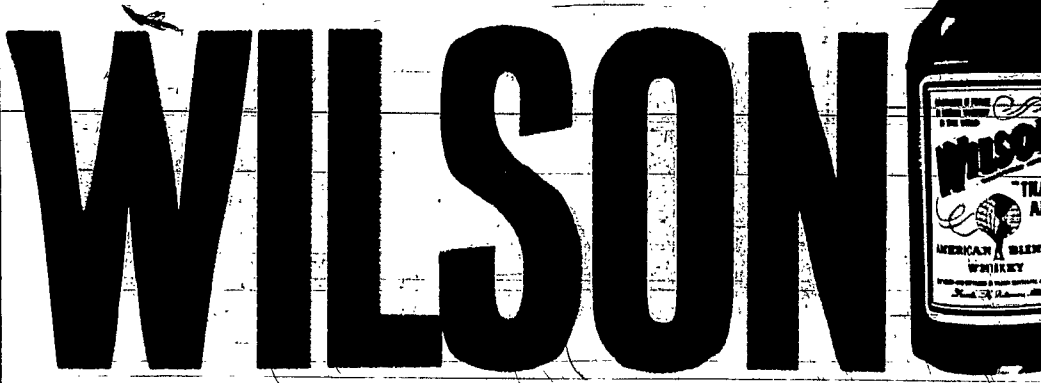
## Gifts for St. Patrick's

### Protestants Have Priest Consultant

New York — (RNS) — A Catholic priest may soon be listed on the staff roster of the National Council of Churches.

The development — unprecedented in the history of the Protestant and Orthodox agency and breaking new ecumenical ground — was indicated in Syracuse, N.Y., where a Jesuit official announced that a priest of the order would be made available within two months for staff work with the NCC's Division of Overseas Ministries.

Here, the NCC executive in charge of the division said he "welcomed" the announcement and would be cooperative in making arrangements for assignment of the priest.

### \$20 Million For Notre Dame

Notre Dame — (NC) — Three months ahead of schedule, the University of Notre Dame not only realized but topped a three-year \$20 million nationwide campaign for improvements.

Father Theodore M. Hesburgh, C.S.C., president, announced (Feb. 9) that \$21,292,271 has been raised for the "Challenge II Program." The fund will be used for construction of a new athletic and convocation center; new academic programs and faculty development; student scholarships and fellowships; and two undergraduate residence halls. The campaign deadline was June 30.
