


Meat OK'd On Fridays

Though small in stature, she's giant size when it comes to originality! That's Margaret Thomas who can design a new Easter bonnet "at the drop of a hat." She never designs two hats alike and thinks nothing of designing and creating as many as fifty hats for a single fashion show.

As the wife of a research assistant in plastic surgery, Margaret found time to study dress-making from which came her interest in millinery. So she set about to take a course from the Academy of Millinery Designing and finished it much earlier than prescribed.

Mrs. Thomas' very first professional design was a three-way houndstooth wool hat some seven years ago. Since then she's gone on to create hat and scarf twosomes, hat-and-blouses, hats and pocketbooks, hat and diceys, hats and gloves. But you notice—always—HATS.

Most recently, Margaret, whose label is MIDGE, has branched out into the at-home fashions. This incredibly fertile and original mind seems to recognize no boundaries when it comes to creating in wonderfully, wearable originals.

Another special personalized service of this bright young woman is designing headpieces to match the gowns of the brides-to-be. Margaret Thomas will even go with the bride to see her gown in order to design a headpiece that will be complementary, whether of identical lace or fabric or both.

The finding of matching fabric takes a bit of time and sleuthing but somehow, she always succeeds.

So strongly does Mrs. Thomas believe in "the total look" that she often designs special hats for the mother of the bride and the mother of the groom.

One outstanding turban bearing the Midge label is convertible five ways. She uses brocade, lace, felt, feathers, fur, fabric, flowers, straw, leaves. One she created for her is a field of flowers and veiling in bright orange. It flatters the face without mussing the hair.

Her interest in promoting "the total look" extends to making a tweed hat and matching cape for chilly Spring days and evenings. For special occasions she has done a white sequined cocktail hat. "But almost none of her hats are to be worn one way—they convert magically."

The Agony and the Ecstasy—Charlton Heston as Michaelangelo effectively captures the anguish of artistic creation as well as the inner conflict between his spiritual feeling for Contessa de Medici and his love of artistic perfection represented in the completion of the Sistine Chapel. Julius the badgering warrior Pope is played by Rex Harrison, who displays a delightful urbanity whether he is discharging his role as the Churches religious head or engaging the enemy in an attempt to recover the Papal States. A Patch of Blue—"What gives this film its special magic, is the slow unfolding of the (blind) girl's personality and intelligence in response to the first warmth she has ever known. For once, it is not the Negro who is deprived, he is the giver — first food, then books, music, the beginnings of a formal education, but most of all sympathy and understanding. Cat Ballou—A wild and off-beat spoof of "adult westerns," this picture gives Jane Fonda and Lee Marvin an opportunity to show their comic prowess.
