Self-Criticism, Order of Day

Frank discussion of the strengths and weaknesses of the Diocesan Council of Catholic Women highlighted a panel of priest-moderators at last Sunday's quarterly meeting held in Auburn. A nine-priest panel, moderated by Mrs. John O'Brien of Webster held forth at St. Alphonsus school hall on the topic: "The D.C.C.W. in the Light of Vatican II."

The moderators' remarks sparked a number of comments from the assembled D.C.C.W. representatives.

Election of officers and deary presidents, reports preceded the panel discussion. Other officers elected for the 1966-67 year were:

First vice-president: Mrs. Frank Lyke, Manchester; second vice-president, Mrs. J. Raymond Hensler, Rochester; secretary, Mrs. John Curran, Chilton Springs; and treasurer, Mrs. Fay Lunkenheimer.

Mrs. J. Ronald Gledhill of Christ the King parish in Rochester, was re-elected president of the D.C.C.W. for the coming year.



Some of the moderators' comments, offered in the forthright manner of Vatican II Council discussions, included these observations:

"A Deanery Council should not be a super-organization, competing with its affiliates. It must be a servant of those groups."—Father John O'Connor, Wayne Deanery moderator.

"Like the rest of the Church, the D.C.C.W. is in a state of transition, and must adapt itself to meet the needs of the times."—Father John Connan, Steubent Deanery moderator.

"I'd like to see all oral reports dispensed with at our quarterly D.C.C.W. meetings."—Father William Hickey, Monroe Northwest district moderator.

"The D.C.C.W. has a fine record of developing worthwhile programs in our Diocese. In recent years, the Pre-Cana Conferences, the Mothers Circles and the Scout Marian Awards have all grown rapidly under Council sponsorship, and now operate on their own."—Father E. Leo McManus, Diocesan moderator.

Brother William Redmond, C.S.C., pioneer teacher at Cardinal Mooney, died Wednesday, April 20, 1966 as a result of injuries received when he was struck by an auto. Brother was a student at St. Edward's University, in Austin, Texas, when the accident occurred.

Brother William pronounced his final vows on August 23, 1900. He was assigned to various Holy Cross schools: Mt. Carmel in Bronx, New York; Holy Cross High School in Flushing, New York; Bishop Hendricken in Warwick, Rhode Island; and Plus XII Boys Home in Chester, New York.
