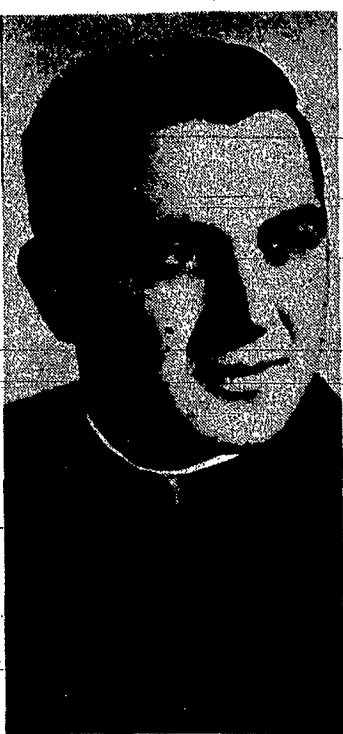
President O'Bryan in announcing Father D'Aurizio's appointment, said:

A graduate of St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries, Father D'Aurizio was ordained in 1956.

He served as an assistant pastor at Corpus Christi for five years until his appointment by Bishop Kearney to the Catholic Charities in 1961.

He received his Master's Degree in Social Work from Boston College in 1964. Besides doing direct casework, he has been involved in the administrative aspects of the Charities including the Home-Finding department; liaison and consultative services to Genesee Settlement House; Auburn Catholic Family Center and the Social Service Department of St. Joseph's Villa; various community organization projects and directing the annual CYO campaign.

# Womens Job Corps To Expand Soon

The Women's Job Corps, which has borne a lot of criticism in its first year of life, got a stout defense last week from its Eastern Area coordinator, who was in Rochester for two days.

"The program is not perfect, has had many problems, but has accomplished a great deal already," said Miss Mary Donohue. The Women's Job Corps, which has 1,700 young women in training at present, is ready to expand its scope considerably, she stated.

Miss Donohue was in Rochester to talk to representatives of the four national women's groups which make up the Women in Community Service (WICS). WICS is a volunteer composed arm of the Office of Economic Opportunity. Its task is to recruit and screen candidates for the Women's Job Corps.

(The four national groups in the WICS setup are: the National Council of Catholic Women, the National Council of Jewish Women, the National Council of Negro Women and the United Church Women.)

The first group of trained "graduates" is now finishing up Job Corps training, Miss Donohue stated. The term of service in the Women's Job Corps is indeterminate, depending on the candidates' previous background and experience. Candidates range from 16 to 21 years of age.

Discussing the relatively slow start of the Women's Job Corps, Miss Donohue told the Courier-Journal that the program's leaders felt it best to proceed "gradually, and evaluate the program thoroughly."

Satisfied that it can do the job of equipping unskilled young women with sufficient skills to ready them for the job market, the Women's Job Corps will start handling larger numbers of candidates now, she explained.

"Our newest training camp in Poland Springs, Me.," will

## Wounded in Vietnam War

The Vietnam war has again struck close to home — this time wounding Father Frederick Straub, a chaplain to the famed Green Berets.

Father Straub was hit in the leg by a sniper's shot. He has been evacuated from Vietnam and is on the way to a U.S. hospital.

He telephoned his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alphonse Straub of 17 Maryland St., in Holy Rosary parish, Rochester, from Travers Air Force Base, California, this past Saturday to tell them of his injury. At Courier press time Thursday, they had not learned in which hospital he was receiving treatment. He was wounded Tuesday, May 3.

# CMF Convention Set at Nazareth

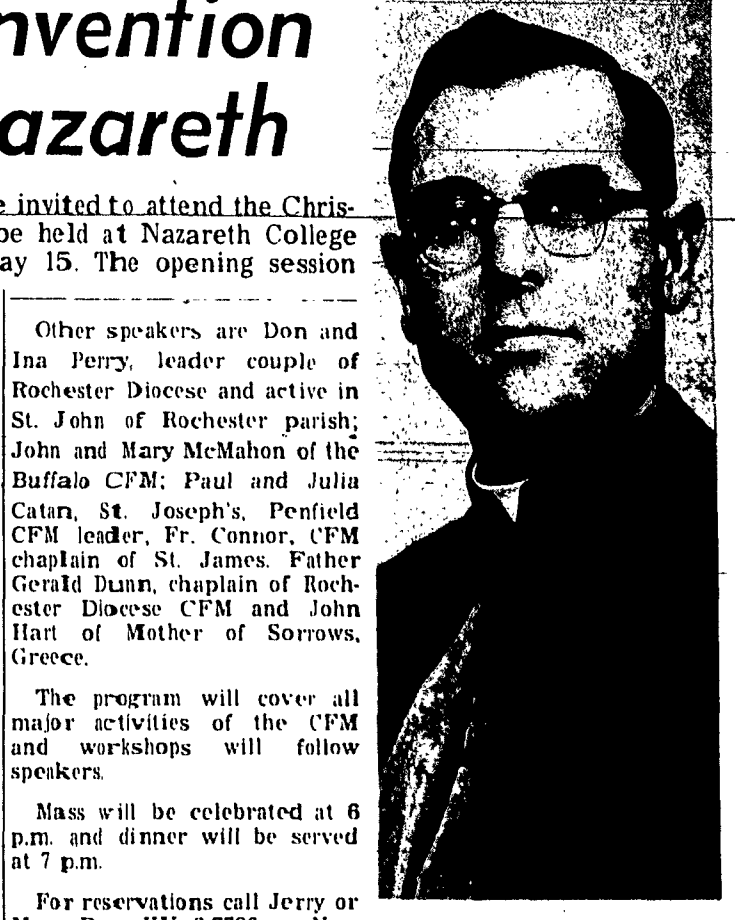
All married couples are invited to attend the Christian Family Movement to be held at Nazareth College auditorium this Sunday, May 15. The opening session starts at 2 p.m.

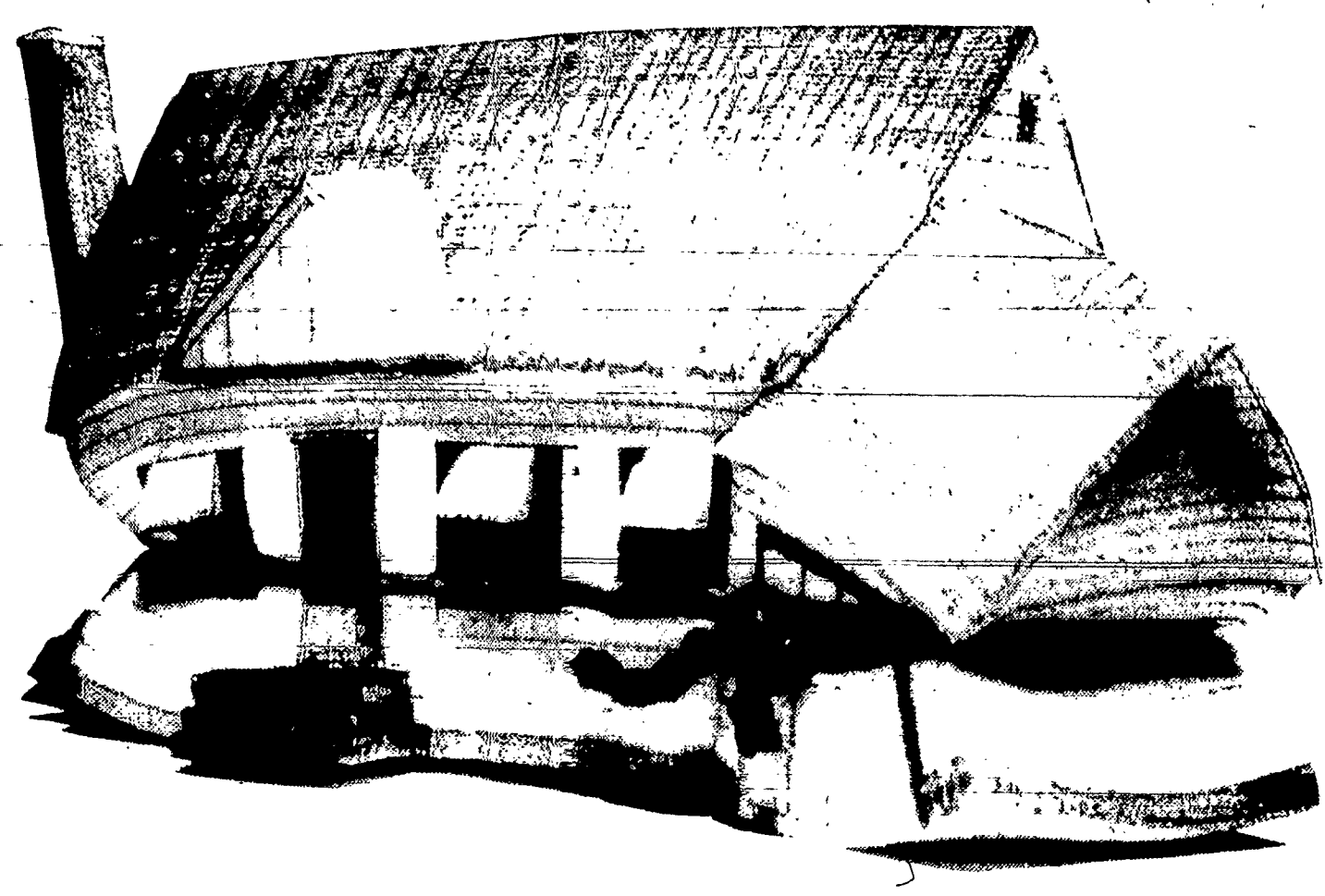
