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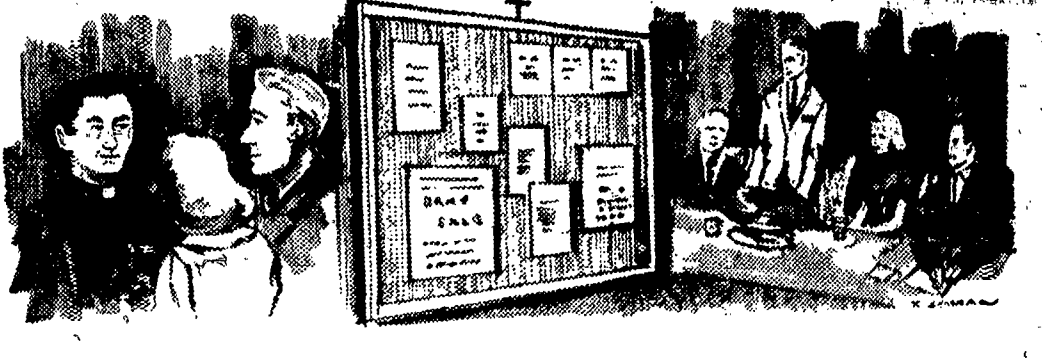

Louis Martin: Will His Friends Pull Together?

Louis Martin, first president of the newly-formed Friends of FIGHT organization, has the same problem that faces the coach of an All-Star football squad: Plenty of talent — but will it shape into a winning team?

The Rochester-based Friends of FIGHT (FOF) will provide a vehicle for whites to want to support the Negro community organization, FIGHT.

By its own choice, FIGHT's leadership, in practice, is restricted to Negroes; basis for policy is that a primary aim of the group is to develop Negro leaders.

The 37-year old Martin is associate director of the University of Rochester library. With his wife, Barbara, and their three children, he lives at 252 East Avenue. The Martins are members of St. Augustine's parish.

He was elected pioneer president of the FOF group last week at an organizing convention held at downtown Brick Presbyterian Church.

An articulate, dynamic activist, Martin takes the reins of a group made up of some 400, similarly articulate and dynamic activists.

And therein lies the problem. In its few months or organizing, Friends of Fight has gathered under its banner a surprising assortment of capable people who have at least one thing in common: A conviction that FIGHT must succeed if Rochester Negroes are going to have a real part in shaping their own future.

Comprising the group are Protestants, Catholics, Jews (and not a few clerics from each faith) together with agnostics. Youngish (mid-thirties would be average), the FOF members are a highly-educated group. (M.A.'s and Ph.D.'s are no rarity here.) Their ranks cover the major political parties, and represent a variety of professional and job fields.

Not heavy in numbers, the Friends of FIGHT have great potential for shaping public opinion. They are movers in a number of civic, religious and political groups. They write sharply-chiseled letters to the Editor, and speak well on their feet in public meetings.

They are capable of making FIGHT better known and loved in the white community.

Louis Martin's formidable task will be to keep all this talent moving smoothly toward the FOF goals.

It will be no picnic. Time and again, similar groups of eager white liberals have charged into the maelstrom of race relations. Time and again they've emerged with lances splintered, mostly on their own comrades at arms.

The wide range of their viewpoints, the variety of approaches they offer to get the job done, can be either a "healthy diversity" (if you're an optimist) or a "paralyzing divisiveness" (if you're a pessimist).

The unity and diversity of FIGHT's Friends stood out clearly at last week's organizing convention.

The slate of officers, produced by a nominating committee, and previously announced, was voted in with dispatch — a salute to unity. Besides Martin as president, other officers elected were: Benjamin Pheloso, first vice president; Rev. Paul R. Long, Jr., second vice-president; Richard Leinbach, treasurer; and Mrs. Estelle Wurth, secretary.

Two Catholic priests were elected to the 15-member executive council, Fathers P. David Finks and Daniel Torrey. They are assistant pastors at Immaculate Conception and St. John the Evangelist (Greece) parishes, respectively.

The diversity showed up discussion began on the strongly-worded resolutions.

Said one delegate of a demand for formation of a county-wide housing authority empowered to build 3,000 public housing units outside the city within five years:

"Let's come down out of our ivory towers!"

(He was evidently aware that the city of Rochester has completed less than 1,000 similar units in the past 20 years.)

Another speaker, Rev. George Hill, who heads the Rochester Area Council of Churches, surprised the group with some kind words about the Rochester daily papers. (The local papers were given sharp criticism in the proposed resolutions.)

A man of principle, Dr. Hill stated that the Rochester dailies had printed "some helpful articles" on race relations. While he agreed that they deserved considerable criticism, he argued for accuracy in the resolution's wording.

He commented that the press resolutions were marked by the same "imprecise generalizations" that "we have so often deplored" in the press media.

And so it went — with general agreement, but plenty of diversity.

Next day, new president Louis Martin pondered the brief-history of his group, spoke of its aims and hopes.

Biggest achievement to date, he feels, is the fact that Friends of Fight is a living reality today. The very formation of such a group, in a "dialog geared to action," is no small feat, he believes.

On two specific issues thus far, he feels that the FOF voice had had an impact. One was the "decision" to retain the Police Advisory Board (which FOF wants to strengthen); the other was the demand to have the poor represented more fully in Urban Renewal planning for the Third Ward.

High priority goals of the nascent organizations will be rapid improvement in the housing and education sectors of race relations, Martin stated.

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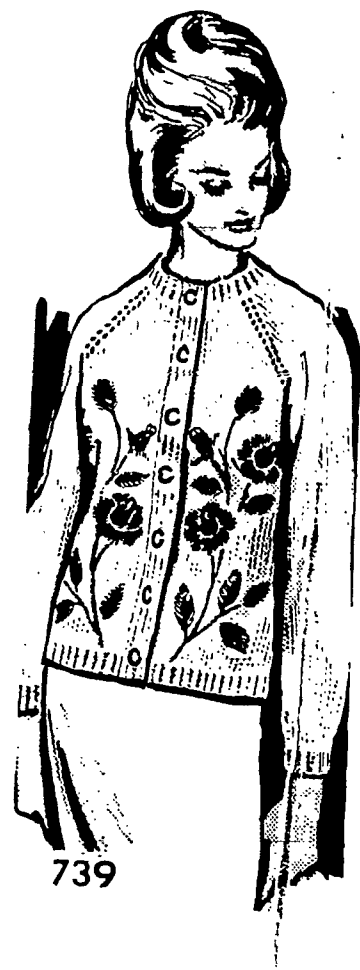
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
