Bishop Kearney opened the scoring with a 3 run outburst in the second. Cardinal starter Ken Harrington, winner of four straight games, walked three consecutive batters and gave up a 2 run single to Dick Ford to put the Kings ahead 2-0. Ward Wilson scored the third run on a wild pitch.

The Cardinals scored their first run in the bottom of the third as Ken Khums walked, moved to third on an error and scored on a wild pitch. Mooney scored again the fourth as centerfielder Tom Hayes tripled to the scoreboard, then scored on a wild pitch. Kearney still led 3-2.

The Kings bounced back in the 5th with their final run as Dan Monacell tripled and scored on a balk by Jim Butler, the second Mooney pitcher.

In the bottom of the 6th, Mooney scored two runs on a walk to Bill Walker, a single by Tom Hayes, an error and a single by Jim Muscow to tie the score at 4 all.

Rip Coleman paced the Kings with a fine mound performance by striking out 15 batters.

Jim Butler, Cardinal left hander, did a fine job in relief striking out 6 and giving up 4 hits in the 6 innings that he pitched.

In the second game of the twin bill, Aquinas Institute defeated McQuaid Jesuit 5-2 on some timely hitting and hitting base running. Dick Vitale took to the mound for Aquinas and was faced by McQuaid's John Koller.

Aquinas Relays May 21; 1,000 Runners to Compete

More than 1,000 entrants from all over New York State, representing 25 schools, are expected to take part in the annual Aquinas Relays set for Saturday, May 21, at the University of Rochester's Fauver Stadium. The entrance parade and opening exercises will begin at 1 p.m.

The Relays annually attract the outstanding track talent of Western New York. Sponsored by the Aquinas alumni and under the direction of Father Cyril F. Carter, C.S.B., the school's athletic director, the relays are the largest track event of its kind in upstate New York.

Aquinas Institute, the defending champion, will be hard-pressed to repeat this year. Although the Irish are strong in the running events, they have already lost to Webster in a dual meet this season and will have to come up with record breaking times to hold their own against McQuaid's sensational Eric Kendrick.

All city Catholic and public high schools and most county schools have made the Aquinas Relays a part of their track schedule.

According to Milo Tomonovich, chairman of the Relays committee, a total of 178 trophies valued at over \$1200 will be awarded to the winning schools and to individuals. First through fifth place awards will be given in every relay event. Winners of the freshman events will receive ribbons.
