### Stay Home to Find Christ Prelate Tells Lay People

Limerick—(NC)—"I do honestly fear a whipped-up apostolate, with Catholics running around in circles in order to encounter Christ, while all the time they should have stayed home, and there on their own ground, whether it be the office, surgery, kitchen, or factory floor, they could have had all the encounters they needed," Archbishop Henry Murphy of Limerick told a congress of the Christus Rex society for priests here.

There are Catholic laymen, he said, who feel that they are now called upon to be an apostle in a way quite divorced from their everyday life.

"An organized apostolate exists to make Catholics more aware and more conscious of their own personal apostolate," he emphasized. "It does not exist to organize a man out of his home, his office, his workshop, his street, his town. It exists to send him back to his home ground more alive to all his commitments in the apostolate."

### Disgruntled Group Splits

Tiruvalla—(NC)—A dissident faction of the Church of South India—formed in 1947 by a union of Anglican, Presbyterian, Lutheran, Methodist, Congregationalist and Reformed groups—has broken away and established a new sect.

The group had charged that its members were victims of social discrimination in the central Kerala diocese of the Church of South India. It is led by the Rev. V. J. Stephen, a suspended pastor of that church.

The split culminated with the "consecration" of Mr. Stephen as bishop of the new "Independent Anglican Church" of Kerala by the Rev. James P. Dees, who styles himself presiding bishop of the "Anglican Orthodox Church of North America."

Present for the ceremony was the Rev. Carl McIntire of Collingswood, N.J., American anti-communist crusader who is president of the International Council of Christian Churches. The latter body is a vocal opponent of the World Council of Churches. It also states that one of its aims is to "awaken Christians everywhere to the treacherous dangers of modernism, compromise and Roman Catholicism."

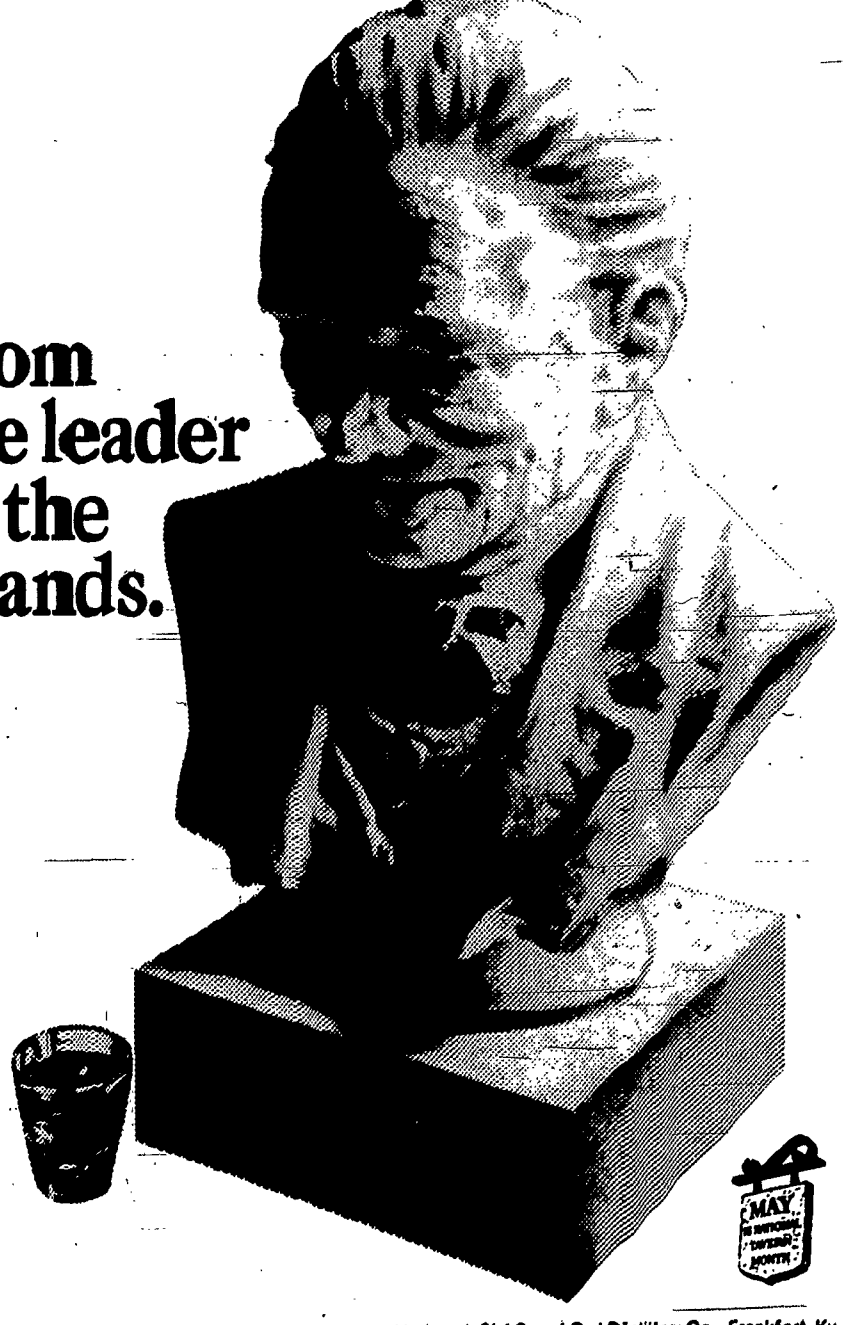
