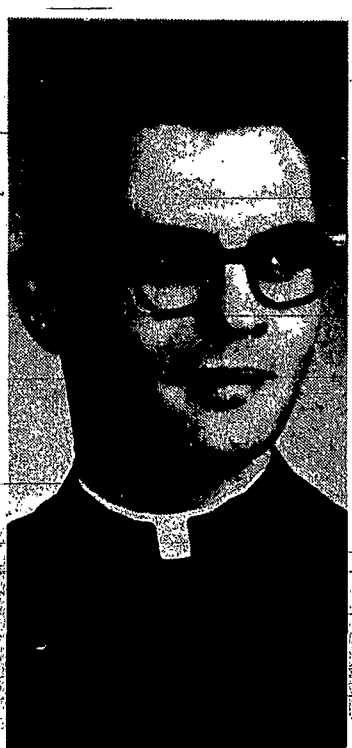

## Hornell Churches Discuss Worship

Hornell—"How Do We Worship" was discussed recently in the second of three ecumenical dialogues being conducted by the clergy and laity of St. Ignatius Loyola, and eight other churches in Hornell.

The discussion, in which 152 persons participated, was held in the Moose Home on Seneca St. It followed the opening session, on May 9, in which the topic was "The Meaning of Ecumenism."

Sunday night's discussion was prefaced by a panel dialogue with the Rev. Gerald Connor, assistant pastor of St. Ann's Church, the Rev. Miltora Vahey, pastor of East Avenue Methodist Church, and the Rev. Denton Durland, rector of Christ Episcopal Church setting the tone for the informal inter-faith conversations later.

Father Durland defined worship as "the response of the creature to the Creator" and added, "It is the act of the soul in response to the Creator."

"We worship because God is there. Therefore we praise and adore Him. All other reasons are secondary."

He described Episcopalian worship as "a balance between Word and Sacrament—a representation of the one perfect sacrifice, that of Christ on the altar of Calvary."

Mr. Vahey said that man, a part of the whole world fellowship, responds corporately to God.

"If," he added, "man truly worships God, his relationship to his fellow man expresses the harmony and unity of the Trinity."

"Worship in the free churches is not so fixed as that of the established churches. There is more emphasis on the Scriptures, as the revealed Word of God, than on the sacrament. The sermon is the climax of our worship," Mr. Vahey said.

Father Connor defined worship as "the summary of all we believe," and added that Catholic worship, centered in the Mass, includes the liturgy of the Word through the reading of the Gospel, Epistle and other portions of the Mass and

in His Mystical Body, we join with Him in giving God, the Father, honor and glory through the celebration of the Mass, the essential form of our worship," Father Connor said.

Refreshments were served by the pastors of the participating churches during the question period which preceded the summary and closing prayer.

## Nazareth Lists Mrs. Sibley

A Rochester woman known throughout the world for her religious and social work will deliver the commencement address and receive an honorary degree at Nazareth College graduation exercises, Tuesday, May 31.

Mrs. Harper Sibley will be the speaker at Nazareth College graduation exercises, Tuesday, May 31.

Mrs. Sibley has been chairman of the executive board of the Women's Auxiliary of the Protestant Episcopal Church, president of the United Council of Church Women and, for six years, a member of the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church. In 1945 she was named "American Mother of the Year."

In 1962, Mrs. Sibley attended the opening of the Vatican Council in Rome and she returned for five weeks as an observer during the last session of the Council.

Until his death in 1959, Mrs. Sibley was accompanied on many of her trips abroad by her husband. In 1931, as members of the Laymen's Missionary Inquiry they spent nearly a year studying missions in India, China and Japan. In 1951, they visited Japan, Hong Kong, Formosa and other countries in Southeast Asia in connection with Church World Service and the YMCA and YWCA.
