Now that the open season on travel, both at home and abroad, is here you may well come some suggestions along the line of non voyage gifts — or travel aids you may wish to buy for yourselves. From practical experience, we can mention more than a few that made our recent visit to England and Europe both pleasant and happily memorable.

Of course, you can't manage without those paper towelleths which do a perfumed and practical clean-up job. Another new item is now available in which spot removers impregnated on paper are individually wrapped. The ones we were given and used successfully and frequently are called POOF. They work beautifully as if by magic. There are probably other similar products known by other names.

Still in the good-grooming department are individual shoe shine papers, foil-wrapped. Use one and toss away. Don't disregard their need. Many hotels now charge seventy-five cents for the shoes you once placed outside your door in the evening to find them beautifully shined without any extra cost in the old days.

Other gifts many vacationers will welcome are travel mirrors in pretty flowered plastic cases. Battery-operated shavers since currents vary in the different countries. Completely fitted cosmetic kits including the one by Estee Lauder mentioned in a previous pre- vacation column. Include, surprisingly enough, a washcloth. Many hotels both here in America and abroad do not furnish this necessity.

Scarf hats to help keep your hair looking its best between hair appointments are great grooming aids since its sometimes difficult on a tight schedule to get your hair done as often as you do at home. A selection in various colors will serve both a pretty and practical purpose and will pay easily without taking hardly any room in an already crowded suitcase. (Head coverings are not absolutely required in many European churches. But bare arms are frowned upon. Better take a sweater!)

Other travel necessities for your consideration may include a set of converters and adapter plugs complete in kits since electrical outlets and currents differ from country to country. Air mail stationery and postal cards, not stamped, of course. Colored glasses including the very sensationally styled which may, at first, look strange at home but they're widely seen on the continent.

We took two pairs apiece, — a spare in case of loss, and disappeared after six days of rain on board ship of ever needing them. But we did. The sun did come out at last . . . and in London at that! If you're very lucky indeed some luxury-loving friends may send champagne to ship or flowers for your cabin or hotel room.

Bishop Kearney offered a Requiem Mass for departed servicemen, and a Rochester priest-chaplain, Col. John F. Albert of the U.S. Air Force gave the sermon. Father Albert urged the Cathedral congregation to remember several groups especially in their Memorial Day prayers: "Those who have made the supreme sacrifice." Honored already by a grateful nation, he noted, "may they be honored even more by the angels and saints in heaven." "Those who have been crippled and injured in battle, that they may be restored to health, returned to their homes and loved ones "to fulfill the dreams and hopes of their youth."
