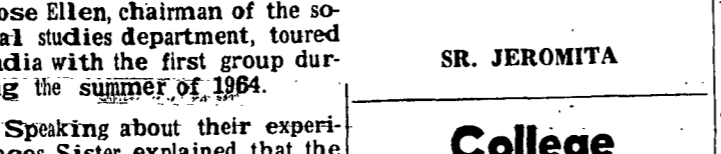

Sister Jeromita Slated For Indian Study Tour

Sister M. Jeromita, social studies teacher at Nazareth Academy, will participate in a summer study tour of India from June 27 to September 11. The tour has been made possible through a grant sponsored by the New York State Education Department and the United States Department. In charge of the program are Ward Morehouse, director of Office of Foreign Area Studies New York State Education Department; Arthur M. Osteen, program Administrator of the South Asia Program of Syracuse University.

Sponsors of the program aim to train key teachers in non-western studies. Sister Jeromita participated in Syracuse University's South Asia Project during the summer of 1965. She is the second Nazareth Academy teacher to specialize in non-western studies. Sister Rose Ellen, chairman of the social studies department, toured India with the first group during the summer of 1964.

Speaking about their experiences, Sister explained that the Freshman Class has benefited by audio-visual materials and comprehensive experience and study made by Sister Rose Ellen and from the specialized study of India and Pakistan by Sister Jeromita at Syracuse. Their course includes a ten-week unit on Asia.

Sister Jeromita has chosen for her special study the handicrafts of the Indian people. She stated that the Indian government has revived interest in crafts and is making economic studies in this field. Before returning to the United States, Sister will visit other far Eastern points not covered by her grant.

Catholic Schools Down 66,000

Chicago—(RNS)—For the first time in recent years, the number of children attending Catholic elementary schools has decreased. Total enrollment in parochial schools for 1965-66 is 4,465,000—a drop of 66,000 from the previous year.

The priest said that basic changes in Catholic schools will come in the areas of new curriculum in the ecumenical spirit, expanded in-service teacher training programs, new classroom materials, and the "tapping" of educational television in dead earnest.

In Catholic high school enrollment, Msgr. Hochwalt reported a rise of less than one per cent, to a total of 1,095,000 students in 2,460 schools. Msgr. Hochwalt told delegates that no substantial expansion of Catholic grade school enrollment is planned "until we are ready for it in terms of quality."

portion of lay teachers going from 35 to 36 per cent. Also reported was a rise in lay teachers' salaries which, it was noted, still run 20 to 30 per cent below comparable public school salaries in many areas.

There were a few new instances in the use of shared time programs with public schools, with only six out of every 1,000 Catholic children taking part. Under this program parochial pupils take some secular courses in public schools. A sharp gain in laymen serving on diocesan school boards was reported around the country—in 1963 only 23 per cent of the boards had laymen; this year 66 per cent of 80 boards have lay members.

Bishop Ernest J. Primeau of Manchester, N.H., the NCEA's president, preached at a Mass celebrated by Archbishop John P. Cody of Chicago for the convention participants. "Imaginative planning and daring experimentation" are needed in the teaching of the Catholic faith, Bishop Primeau said. "The thinking and doing of another age, when it was considered best to keep our people away from the contamination of the world, is over," he said. "Segregation and protection from the world of today is impossible in these United States. Our people are in the world and they must be for the world."

Karl Adam, Author, Dies

Tuebingen — (NC) — Father Karl Adam, the great German theologian who was one of the precursors of the Second Vatican Council, has died at the age of 89.

Professor of theology at the University of Tuebingen from 1919 until his retirement in 1949, Karl Adam had gained an international reputation through his writings before World War I. His most famous works, beginning with "Spirit of Catholicism," first published in 1924, included "Christ, Our Brother," "One and Holy," and "The Son of God." His writings were translated into the major European languages and into Chinese and Japanese as well. He was one of the first modern Catholic theologians to gain a broad readership among Protestants. He died here early in April.

Father Adam was a gifted speaker, and his lectures at the university here and elsewhere were always attended by standing-room crowds. He was outspoken in his denunciation of Hitler and the Nazi regime, and his life was threatened by the Nazis as early as 1934. After World War II, he took special interest in Una Sancta, a pioneer ecumenical movement seeking to promote better understanding of the teachings of the Reformation and to heal its wounds.

Brother Andre Shrine to be Completed

Montreal — (RNS) — St. Joseph's Oratory, one of the largest pilgrimage centers in the world, will finally be completed by Christmas this year after 62 years of continuous development. One of the reasons for the long delay — construction having been started in 1904 — is that the Holy Cross Fathers, who are in charge of the huge church, would proceed only when funds were actually available. With construction now in the final stage, the order has decided to try to finish the work by Christmas, and has appealed for funds from the Montreal public to speed up work on the mountain-top church.

The Oratory, known to millions in the U.S. and around the world as a major Catholic shrine to St. Joseph, was originally a chapel built by a modest religious, Brother Andre. Its capacity in 1904 was 100. Today, with a huge basilica standing on the site of the old chapel, the church accommodates 12,700 persons.

The central nave is one of the largest in the world and measures 120 feet by 349 feet. It is more than 100 feet high. From the floor of the interior to the dome it is 190 feet high. It is 316 feet from the ground to the cross on the dome.

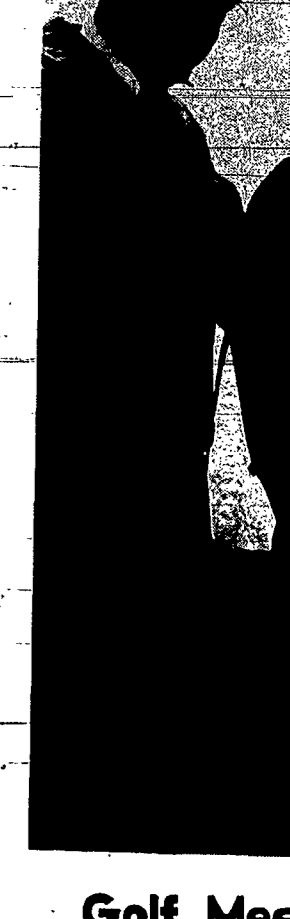
