Pope Describes Bond Between Church, Sports

Vatican City—(RNS)—There is "a basic harmony" between sport and the Church, because sport can be considered from the point of view of social and moral as well as physical education, Pope Paul VI declared here.

The occasion was an audience in the Consistory Hall of the Vatican Palace to members of the International Olympic Committee who were in Rome for their 64th session.

"You will permit me to regard your presence here, gentlemen," he said, "as an invitation to a dialogue with the world of sport. . . The Church considers the human body as a masterpiece of creation in the material order, as a habitation and an instrument of the soul that is immortal . . ."

"The dialogue between the Church and sport becomes even more cordial when sport is considered as a factor in search of moral education. Sport is a school of loyalty that rejects every idea of trickery as something unsportsmanlike. Sport invites us to raise our spirits. It is an antidote to softness and indolence. It demands a spirit of sacrifice, self-control, courage and tenacity."

Retirement Benefits for Lay Employees

St. Anne's, Rochester, is the first parish to inaugurate a retirement plan for lay people employed by the parish.

Monsignor William Naughton said the plan will include employees in the clerical, domestic and maintenance departments. The plan, arranged by the John Hancock Insurance Co. will go into effect July 1 and will thereafter cover employees immediately upon their being hired.

Monsignor Naughton said the "competitive advantages" employees in local industries enjoy prompted the parish trustees to adopt the plan to make "the position of an employee of our parish more attractive."

The plan, he said, will provide monthly benefits for life beginning at 65. Cost of the insurance will be borne by the parish. Currently the parish employs four lay people. Lay teachers will be provided for in a separate plan now under study by diocesan school officials, he said.

CYO Swimming Program Set For Outdoor Pools

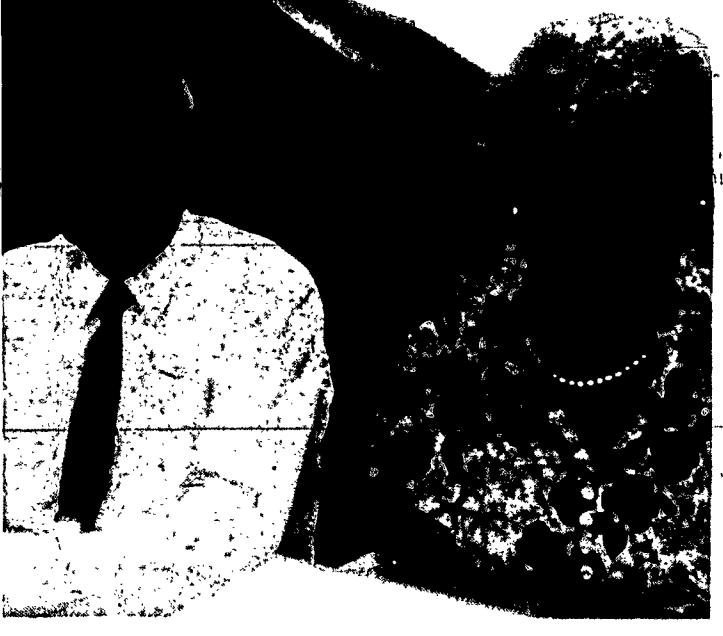
The CYO will conduct swimming programs again this year beginning June 27, for boys and girls ages five and up, at 18 outdoor pools. The program is carried out through the generosity of many pool owners. Sessions will begin at different times for each pool.

Instruction is to be offered at all skilled levels with particular emphasis given to non-swimmers. Classes are limited in size to insure best teaching conditions and all lessons are to be taught by qualified American Red Cross Water Safety instructors and aides.

At the conclusion of each eight lesson course, students receive signed progression cards and swim suit badges in recognition of the progress made. Three outdoor life saving classes have been scheduled and special adult lessons are also to be conducted for non-swimmers as well as for those requiring instruction in more advanced phases of swimming and diving. The purpose of this program is to make swimming instruction and knowledge of the elements of water safety readily accessible by offering such training at neighborhood sites.
