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Literacy, a Goal Of Missioners

Caracas — (NC) — Pope Paul is vitally and actively interested in promoting world plans for teaching literacy as the beginning of an effort to give all men a complete education, according to a papal diplomat here.

Archbishop Giovanni Benelli, formerly the Holy See's permanent observer at the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, and now pronuncio in Senegal, headed the Holy See's corps of observers to UNESCO's inter-American Conference on Alphabetization (teaching to read and write) held here.

Archbishop Benelli told the delegates to the conference that it is the "mission of the Church to collaborate intensively to raise the level of all men who wish to improve themselves physically and spiritually."

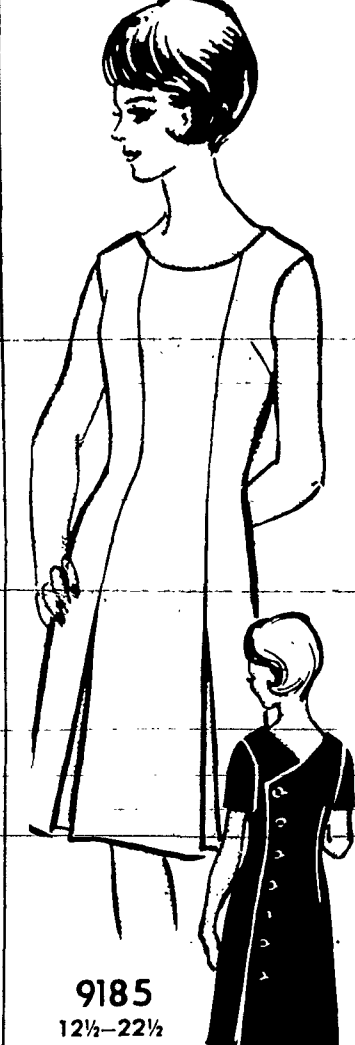
In an interview, the Vatican diplomat insisted that the Church's chief interest lies in the "integral education of man." He said that the Church takes man as he is, a being composed of body and soul. The Church is therefore concerned about his economic, social and cultural problems as well as about his spiritual problems.

One of the most serious problems that faces mankind today, he said, is the inability of great numbers of people to read and write. This prevents them from achieving full human development and does not permit them to contribute the full measure of their potential to the world at large.

Six experts in the problems of teaching literacy accompanied Archbishop Benelli to the conference, including U.S. Father Robert Kearns, M.M., founder and director of the Radio School system in Puno, Peru. Among other members of the Vatican team were Msgr. Jose Joaquin Salcedo, director of radio schools in Colombia, and Julian Mendoza, secretary general of the Latin American Bishops Council.
