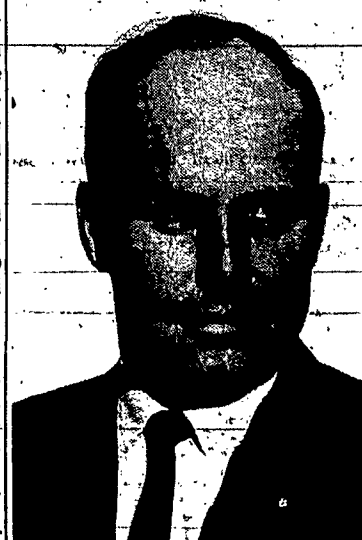
Modern methods (modified Montessori) and the home-like atmosphere provide an ideal setting for the learning experiences and the social development of the children. In the course of the year, parents are invited to observe their youngsters in a real situation. There are no planned performances.

With the opening of the new school year next September, a new arrangement will come into effect: two half-day sessions which will make possible very special attention for each child.

Paul G. Rombaut has been appointed New York State chairman for the Knights of Columbus oratorical by James E. Foley, State Deputy. Effective immediately, Rombaut will start to organize auxiliary chairmen for the 101 districts into which the state is divided.

What do you think of the young people of today? I know it sounds old-fogy—"square" I guess they'd call it—to compare them to those of another generation.

But all they seem to want to do is drive around in cars, study just enough to get by, boys with hair down to here, looking more like girls, the girls wearing pants, and all of them thinking they have the answers to everything.

I "tuned in" recently on a group hanging around a neighborhood drug store. Talk was about "getting a good thing going," a way to make a great deal of money in some specialized field where competition would be slim, where "you don't have to bother about going to college except just long enough to get draft deferment." Some of these children, I happen to know, are Catholics.

Frankly, I'm disgusted. Are the young people I see the exception, or the norm? (Name withheld)

Frankly we think the writer "tuned in" on the exception, though goodness knows neighborhood drug stores, have such gatherings nightly.

In the highly competitive world of today, most young people find themselves up against problems their elders never encountered.

AS COUNTERBALANCE, we should like to print excerpts from a thoughtful salutatory speech given recently by a high school senior in Columbia, S.C., a commencement attended by the governor of the state as well as the bishop of the diocese. The speaker was Patrick Schuette, age 17.

reading to a single type. Some prominent educators feel that students in college should study only those subjects which are of interest to them or those required for their major. As a result, some students tend to place little or no emphasis on subjects which do not fall into those categories. Thus, the science major will be less interested in English, and the humanities major will be indifferent to science.

"Yet to be truly prepared for the challenges presented by the modern world, the student must learn as much as he can in several different fields. Scientists must not scorn the beauty of the literature of Milton and Shakespeare. Likewise, linguists should not deprive themselves of the mysteries and mental discipline to be found in chemistry and physics.

"In pursuit of this learning, we must also strive for excellence in every aspect of our lives. As we increase our understanding of the world and its problems, we must be careful not to let our spiritual life decay. As knowledge grows, our relationship with God should become more close and more personal. Cardinal Newman said that a man was not truly educated if he did not understand, or if he was unable to defend the truths of his religion."

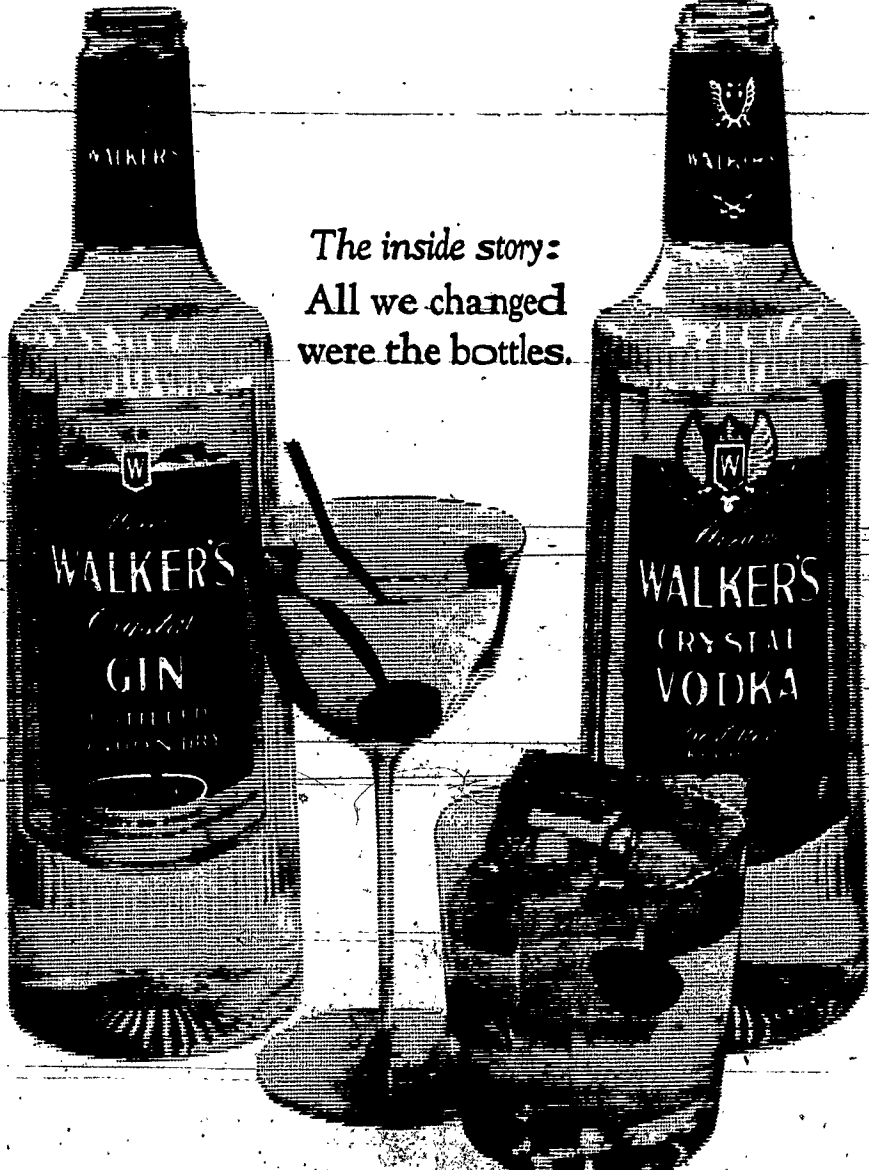
Answering today's ecumenical drive for an "enlightened laity," young Patrick Schuette goes on:
