

## Father Lavery At Conference On College Aid

Very Reverend Charles J. Lavery, C.S.B., president of St. John Fisher College, was a participant in the Working Conference of State Commissions for College Facilities Programs held in Santa Fe, New Mexico, July 25-July 28.

The purpose of the conference was to discuss new legislation that provides federal funds for construction of college facilities and the purchase of equipment for undergraduate instruction. The conference also afforded an opportunity for the exchange of ideas and information between State Commissions.

Principal speakers at the meeting were New Mexico Governor Jack M. Campbell and Peter P. Muirhead, associate commissioner for higher education, U.S. Office of Education. Representatives from both public and private institutions attended the conference as members of State Commissions from throughout the United States.

A report on early replies to the quiz is published on page one of this issue of the Courier.

You don't have to identify yourself if you don't want to. Just circle the appropriate word in the question, or answer yes or no, then clip out the quiz and mail it to the Courier, 35 Scio St., Rochester, N.Y. 14604.

1. In which category do you consider yourself to be—a member of a city parish, in a suburban parish, a village parish, a rural parish, a student parish, an institutional parish, other? And in what age group are you—under 20, 20 to 30, 30 to 45, 45 to 65, over 65.
2. Do you think the "new liturgy" has strengthened your devotion, weakened it, kept it the same?

9. What topics would you like to hear a sermon about in your parish church?
10. What other changes do you think should be made in the Church's teachings, precepts or public worship besides those already called for by the Vatican Council?

Chairs are Joseph Sica and Anthony Coccia. Refreshments and games.

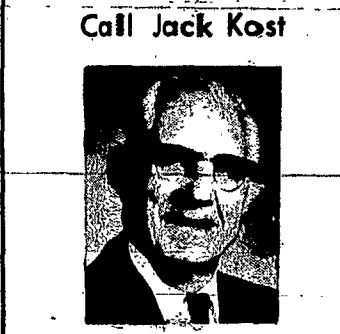

## Win Grants in Waverly

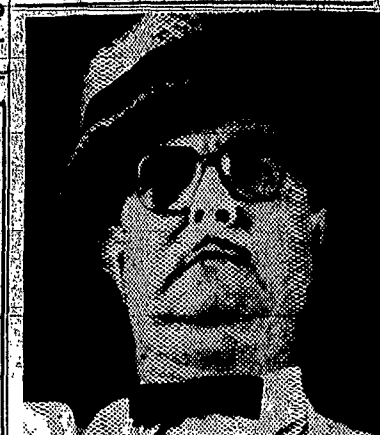
Waverly — The Catholic Daughters of America No. 235 of Waverly, has awarded two scholarships.
