Having previewed half a hundred collections by as many important designers and having gone all-out in favor of most of what we saw, we must admit that here are some of the things which we saw and thoroughly disliked:



1. Too short skirts worn by mature women. Only the very young can truly get away with skirts above the knee.
2. Too light stockings (white and eggshell, etc.) again on anybody but the very young — unless it's a special occasion accessory.
3. Too big bags worn with the cone (tent or pyramid) silhouette coat.
4. The no-mouth look which leaves just a gap in the face to admit food or to smile with.
5. Too long earrings which in many cases, dangle below the shoulder.

Smart women just do not wear the too short skirt—inches above the knee. The too light stocking breaks the line between shoe and hemline. With skirts as short as they are today, it is better to create the illusion of the unbroken line. The too big handbag worn with the cone silhouette simply drags the body down. The no-mouth look tends to make the eyes too prominent giving a most unbalanced look to the face.

As skirts get shorter, earrings get longer. And, well they should to balance the figure. But there is a limit to the lengths they should go.
