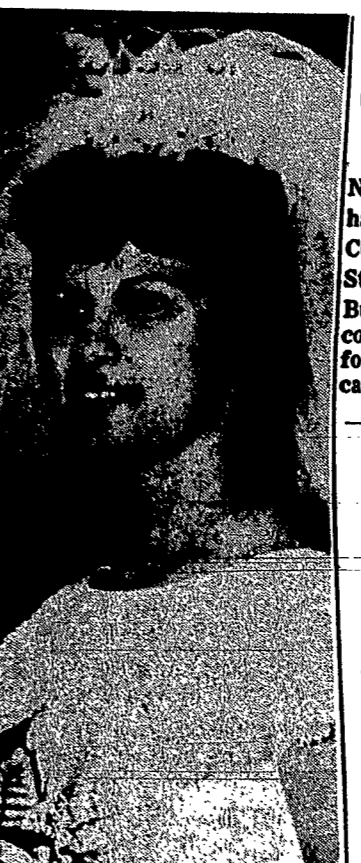
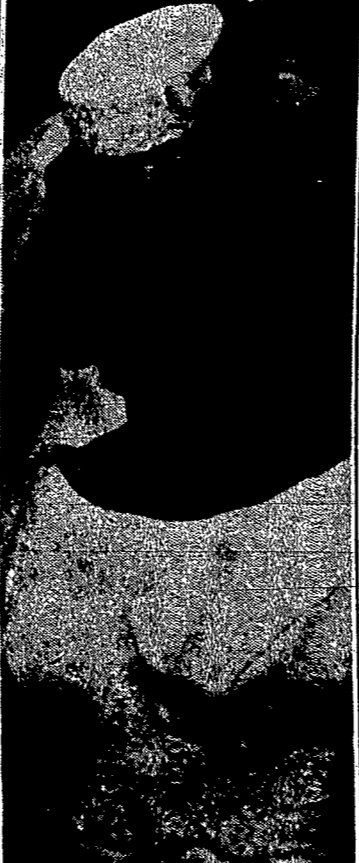

Wedding Bells to Ring

Washington — (NC) — The timeless story of young love and romance will be world news of the day here when Luci Ekinis Johnson and Patrick John Nugent are united as husband and wife in the Sacrament of Matrimony.  
The National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, a church built through the contributions of Catholics throughout the country and belonging to no diocese, will be the scene of the ceremonies Aug. 6.  
Despite the national spotlight and the great preparations, the ceremony will be essentially a simple one. The bride and groom have pledged their love "for better, for worse, for richer, for poorer, in sickness and in health, until death do us part."  
And despite the national attention given her, Luci Johnson appeared to be quite similar to any other young bride in the happy but confusing days of final preparation for the big event.  
"Time," Luci told a press conference prior to the ceremonies, was her biggest problem at the moment.  
"Sometimes there is too much of it and then there is too little," she mused. "There is too much of it, in that Pat is not here now, and I miss him like a front tooth."  
"Then there is too little in that I get up early in the morning and go to bed late, and still don't get everything done that I should have done."  
Responding to questions about her plans for after the wedding, she said she and Nugent have leased "a kind of dream house" in Austin, Tex., where both will take courses at the University of Texas.  
"ASKED IF she would continue the nursing education she began at Georgetown University here, Luci said she had not yet decided.  
"I can say one thing for sure, though — that this last year at Georgetown has been one of the happiest and most rewarding years of my life.

One hour before the wedding ceremony, the 56-bell carillon of the shrine will herald the event for six miles around as carillonmaster Robert Grogan gives a concert of original and traditional music.  
When the guests are assembled, the bride will be escorted to the altar by the Chief Executive of the United States. The walk from the front door of the shrine to the altar is the approximate length of a football field.  
Archbishop Patrick A. O'Boyle of Washington will offer the nuptial Mass. Celebrating with the archbishop will be Father John A. Kuzinkas of Chicago and Jesuit Father William J. Kalfer of Georgetown University.  
During the Mass, the couple will receive both the consecrated bread and wine at Communion, as allowed by the recent Vatican Council.  
The chalice to be used by the couple on their wedding day is known as the "Lone Star" chalice. It was donated to the National Shrine by the Knights of Columbus of Texas. Luci's home state and was used in 1959 at Masses marking the shrine's dedication.
