ous other aspects pertaining to 15 Park St. marriage and family planning here exists a need by the Church to cope with some of the problems. After reviewing the history of marriage practices in Greek, Roman and Teutonic cultures,

he Church, Father Thomas indicated that marital mores have been in a state of evolution. 'Each generation of families will face its own set of problems," he asserted. Taking the historical context and its changes into considera-

tion is a necessity, he said, and the Church should be able, and has the obligation, to bring new theological insights to bear.

"The Church can't deal with marriage in apartheid," he said. By that he meant that outmoded rules of the past must not be applied to modern mar-

Referring to the theological influence of St. Augustine on teachings involving sex, Father Thomas indicated that the Church is not facing the reality of the problem when it applies the rule that the sex act is alone for the purpose of pro-

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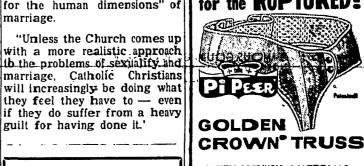
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
