## 6 Marks Fall Striders Capture State Track Meet

It was record-breaking time as seven new marks rose from the track and turf of Elmira's Parker Field last Saturday at the Sixth Annual New York State Track and Field Championships.

The defending champion Long Island Striders, with a very well-balanced 38-man squad, annexed their third straight State crown with an 84-point output. Second-place went to the New York Athletic Club, in its best State showing since 1963, with 44 points. Gardentown of Buffalo came in third, with the Rochester Track Club fourth.

Four of the new title-holders performed their feats on the cinders. They were: John Elliott of the Rochester Track Club in the 120-yard high hurdles, Ron Daniel of the New York Athletic Club in the mile walk and two Gardentown (Buffalo) runners, Fran Smith in the 440 and Bill Ripple in the mile.

The three fieldmen registering record-smashing efforts were Bruce McDaniel of the Rochester Track Club in the high jump and two Long Island Striders — Ed Walsh in the pole vault and Frank DeBise in the discus throw.

Long Island Strider Al Pearman, fresh from a sixth place finish in the AAU National Decathlon Championships, helped secure 20 points for his team, an effort that earned him the coveted Most Valuable Performer Award.

Al, headed for Colgate University to the pleasure of Raider Coach Bob Warner, won both the long and triple jumps and then came back to anchor the Striders to victory in the 880 relay and the mile relay.

Gardentown's Smith, former Cornell track captain and Olympic trial finalist, also received strong consideration for his record-setting 47.6 in the quarter and a fine winning 1:55.3 in the 880.

Fran lowered his old 440 State mark six seconds from 48.2 as he captured both the 440 and 880, to duplicate his State meet double in 1961.

NYAC's Ron Daniel, the National 30-kilometer walking champ, clipped almost one minute from Gardentown's Bob Hoffman's time of 7:40.4 in the mile walk. Ron bested a fine field in 6:45.7.

star, sped to a new mile time of 4:13.3, to top the old mark of 4:14.9. Ripple had to fight off a strong late spurt by Reto Cavelti of the NYAC.

The Striders' DeBise threw the discus two feet farther than last year's mark set by the Striders' Eob Stuegerwald to register a new discus effort of 159.9.

Elmira's host KofC Track Team finished high in the relays, taking a second in the mile and a third in the 880. Running for Elmira was the team of Steve Sweet, Gary Pace, Joe Cost and Mel Skerpon.

Rochester's Rod Carter celebrated his 50th birthday by playing the role of the "rabbit" in the Corning Glass 2-mile.

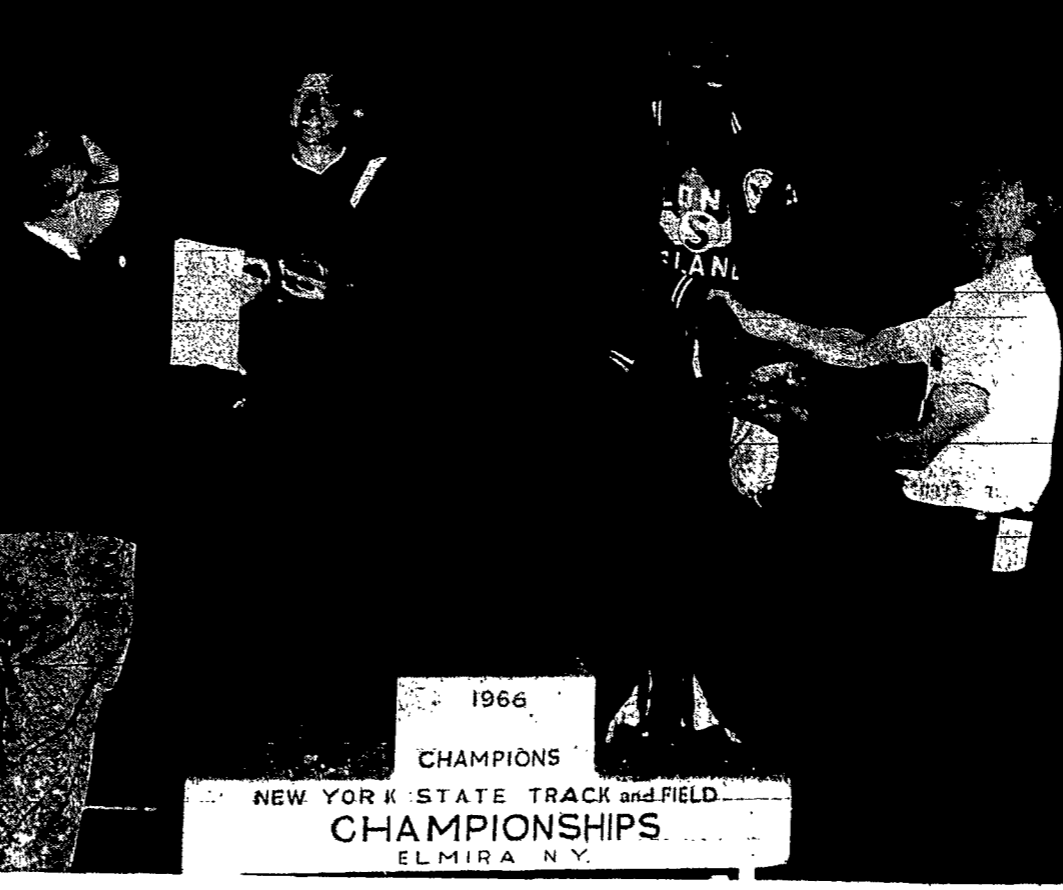
Rod sprinted to an early lead for half of the first quarter, but, as he always is, was the fans' favorite as they cheered him for finishing the race.

Bill Bruchel of the Rochester Track Club won the Junior Association of Commerce 2 1/2 mile.

Roxanne Logue of Geneva, who recently competed in the National Championships at Baltimore, was voted Most Valuable Girl Performer. She won the 100 in 1:13, the 220 in 2:54 and the 440 in 6:24.

Bill Fraley of the NYAC captured the 100 in 10.0 and finished second in the 220 for a fine evening's performance.

In the girls' competition, the Finger Lakes T. C. and the Clarence T. C. tied for first with 15 points, followed by Alfred T. C. 7, Tonawanda T. C. 3 and Hornell YMCA 2.

## \$300,000 Goal for Center

Geneseo — A goal of \$300,000 has been set for construction of an inter-faith center building adjacent to the State University College here.

Representative of 10 religious denominations, including Protestants, Catholics and Jews, have incorporated the Inter-Faith Center of Geneseo to erect the proposed building.

They have purchased a one-acre site just north of the new college health center building and hope to begin construction in autumn. Although designed for use by college faculty and students, the inter-faith center will have no official connection with the university.

Contributions will be sought from faculty and students, alumni, student parents, religious groups, foundations and the community.

Dr. Spencer J. Roemer, director of admissions at the college and chairman of the board of operating and maintenance costs.

The proposed building, to include offices, classrooms, lounge, kitchen, and custodian apartment, will feature a chapel to seat 400 persons. It will be available to all religious groups.

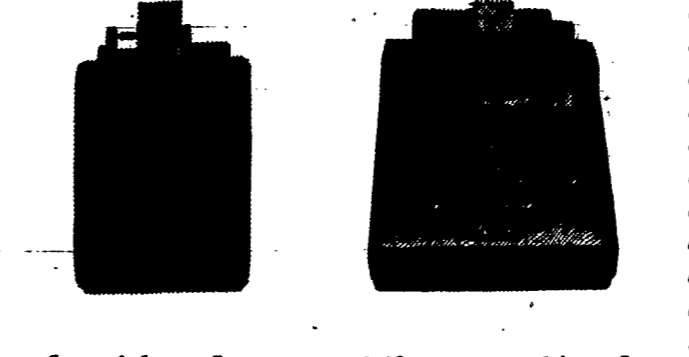
