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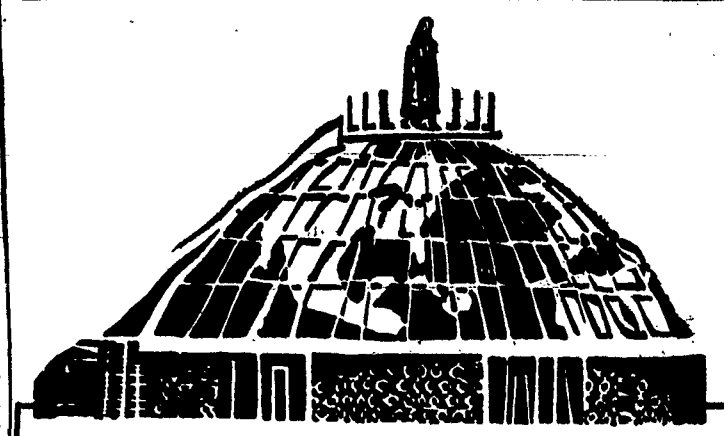
Eleven Attend Theology Meet

We expect everything in the universe to click. If we keep the commandments, we expect not to have cancer. If we avoid adultery, we expect not to have a drunken husband. If we give "an envelope every Sunday," then our son should not be a "beatnik." Where does faith come in? In a full bank account? Being rich enough to have cocktails for dinner, a split-level home, a daughter with an MG?

Did not Our Lord refuse Satan's three short cuts of prosperity to establish His kingdom: plenty of bread (economics); overcoming gravity by falling from steeples (technical); identifying the kingdom of God with labor unions, capitalism, communism, democracy (political)? Was not God the tormentor of Job? The mysterious goal of Jonas? The wrestler Who wounded Jacob? The One Who pushed Joseph into a well as a prelude to a throne? The One Who told Paul what he must suffer "for My Name's sake"? If our faith is nothing more than running to church every Sunday and expecting God to make us richer because we are good-goddy, may it not be only a phosphorescent putrefaction of those of whom Our Lord said: "Not everyone who calls Me 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven?"

It is no wonder there is an attack on God and on the Church, not just from those Catholics who have a bad conscience for falling in their vocation, but from sincere people who say to us with Nietzsche: How can you expect me to believe in a Redeemer, if you do not act like one redeemed? Where is our faith in the Mystical Body of Christ when we limit it to our parish, our diocese or our nation which we call "good" because it is rich. Once we have identified our faith with being unwounded, we forget the wounds of lepers, the puffed up tumblers of African children and the poor priest with 24 mission chapels—all straw. Because we are not in the depths, we do not cry out to the heights to the Divine Physician — we want a Christ as comfortable as our lives, instead of our comfort worrying us until we share something with the uncomfortable. We leave our churches each Sunday after witnessing Calvary in the Mass, unbruised and unscarred. That is why we do not worry about the wrecks of humanity — our brothers in Christ, the slum dwellers who are not finding God, because they cannot believe that we believe Christ wants us to love them.

I dislike intensely being a bagger — even for the Holy Father. But I thank God daily that it introduced me to the woes and miseries of the world where I find another Presence of Christ and also where I learned to find God when the chips are down. INDIA: BABIES WON'T DIE

THE HOLY FATHER'S MISSION AID TO THE ORIENTAL CHURCH

FOR THE FIRST TIME, HINDUS will mourn babies by the hundreds who died today of plague, cholera, smallpox, influenza, typhoid fever. Deaths like these need not occur in 1966.
