

Chicago Lairy Taunt Nun, Split Her Head with Brick

Chicago — (NC) — Two of the latest incidents in racial strife here saw a nun hit with a brick while participating in a civil rights march and civil rights speakers booed and jeered by the majority of some 350 persons attending a meeting in a Catholic school hall.

Sister M. Angelica expressed shock, but no bitterness, at the injury resulting from her participation in a march through the Chicago Lawn area.

"I really could have continued," she said. "My black veil soaked up the blood at first, but then it began to get on my white collar."

She was taken for treatment to Holy Cross hospital, on the insistence of another marcher.

She was more disturbed by the attitude of the neighborhood, which she described as heavily Catholic, than by the stitches in the back of her head.

"I feel no bitterness toward these people — but it hurts to think we haven't taught them better," she said.

Summing up her participation, she said, "I saw a need for it and did it, and I got in the way of a brick."

Another religious leader at the scene, Father Robert A. Reicher, who was not a participant in the march but among the clergy attempting to keep order in the neighborhood, reported that priests on the scene were subjected to a great deal

of verbal abuse. It included, he said, "every curse and obscenity I have ever heard."

Father Reicher also reported that the three nuns who marched were subjected to taunts about their chastity.

Highlights of the community's annual report, released here by Mother Miriam Hoover, provincial superior, include the following:

—At the Sisters' hospital in Qui-Nhon, South Vietnam, more than 30,000 Vietnamese men, women and children received care. Miss Hofschneider Requiem Offered

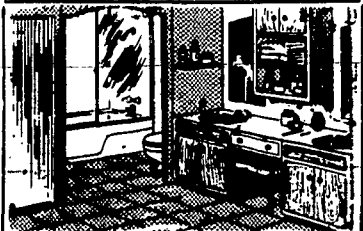
