### Michael Iuppa Requiem. Builder of Churches

Solemn Funeral Mass was offered for Michael Iuppa, retired builder of many churches, in Sacred Heart Cathedral, Saturday, August 27.

The Solemn Mass of Requiem was celebrated by Father William Trot with Father Edward Zimmer, deacon, and Father Joseph Reinhart, subdeacon.

Mr. Iuppa, 79, of 106 Schofield Road, whose M. Iuppa Construction Co. Inc. built Sacred Heart Cathedral, died August 24, 1966. He had been a member of Sacred Heart parish for more than 50 years.

Mr. Iuppa was born in Sicily and came to the United States when he was seven. At 16, he began work as an apprentice with Friederich & Sons Construction Company. Four years later, he started his own business. He spent four years at Mechanics Institute, now Rochester Institute of Technology.

He built many Catholic Churches and schools for the Rochester Diocese and also many public schools, theatres and other civic buildings. Because of his health, he retired in 1953 and at this time devoted much time to his garden and his 19 grandchildren.

He was a member of the Sacred Heart Cathedral Men's Club and the Notre Dame Retreat League. Also, he was a member of the Builders Exchange and the Chamber of Commerce.

Washington (RNS) — A top research official of the National Council of Churches warned members of the House committee considering inclusion of the 1970 census that an entirely different query — the Social Security number of the individual — could stimulate more of a protest than the religious affiliation issue.

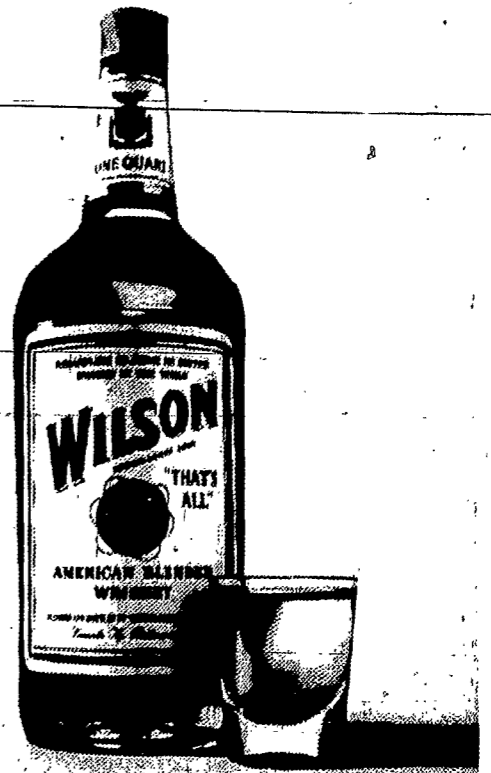
In a statement to the House Committee on Post Office and Civil Service, Dr. Lauris Whitman, executive director of the NCC's department of research, cautioned that the question, including Social Security numbers on census forms "has not received much attention as yet from church groups."

"But" he added, "it is bound to come, sooner or later — and I suggest that you get ready for the avalanche when it comes."
