New Faculty At Fisher

The appointment of 11 new members to the faculty of St. John Fisher College has been announced by Basilian Father Joseph B. Dorsey, dean of the college. Full-time teaching faculty at Fisher now numbers 64.

Edward N. Weber, registrar at St. John Fisher for the past six years has been appointed associate professor of chemistry. Weber previously taught at the college from 1953 until appointed as registrar in 1960. He holds B.S., M.A., and M.S. degree from Canisius College.

Returning to Fisher for the third time is Dr. Charles J. Meder, 32 Knollbrook Rd. He will be an associate professor of education and director of teachers education. Dr. Meder taught at the Basilian college in 1956-57 and from 1960 to 1964. He also taught at Benjamin Franklin High School for three years.

For the past two years he was on the staff of Phoenix College, Phoenix, Ariz. He received his B.Ed. degree from Brockport State, M.A. in history from Lehigh University, and a doctorate in history from the Maxwell School, Syracuse University.

Donald L. Muench, who was a member of the first graduating class at St. John Fisher in 1955, has been named an associate professor of mathematics at his alma mater. A native Rochesterian, Muench taught mathematics at the U.S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Md., for the past six years.

He has been a summer session instructor at Johns Hopkins University and Loyola College, Baltimore, Md. Now a doctoral candidate at the University of Maryland, Muench was awarded his M.S. in mathematics.

Richard B. Vexler, 300 Gates Manor Dr., will become an instructor in sociology. He has taught social science courses at Brockport State and Onondaga State. Vexler earned B.A. and M.A. degrees from the University of Pittsburgh and anthropology at Syracuse University.

Father Mark Sullivan, a priest of the Diocese of Rochester, is the newest member of the theology staff at the college. Father Sullivan, a native of Geneva, is a graduate of St. Andrew's Seminary and St. Bernard's Seminary. He received his licentiate in sacred theology from the Gregorian University, Rome, Italy, in 1963.

Mrs. Sybil Brewster Bregman, 273 Cypress St., who received her M.S. in biology from the University of Rochester in June, has joined the Fisher biology department as a laboratory instructor. Mrs. Bregman completed undergraduate studies in biology at Simmons College, Boston, Mass.

John C. Orange of Sudbury, Ont., who received B.A. and M.A. degrees from the University of Toronto, will be an instructor in the English department at St. John Fisher. He was a graduate teaching assistant at Toronto.

Joseph E. Whitbread, who received his B.S. in economics from LeMoyne College and has completed work on the M.A. in that field of study at Northwestern University, will be instructor in economics. He is a native of Syracuse.

Melvin J. Brandon, 256 Mt. Vernon Ave., a summer session instructor at St. John Fisher College for the past four years, joins the philosophy department on a full-time basis. A doctoral candidate in philosophy at St. Louis University, he also has taught at Nazareth College, Southern Illinois University, and at St. Louis University. Brandon received his B.A. from St. Michael's College, Toronto.
