

4,000 Members CYO's Goal

Two hundred volunteers, keyed to an enthusiastic pitch after last night's kickoff dinner at Columbus Civic Center, begin today to seek 4,000 memberships in the Catholic Youth Organization.

Bishop Kearney, honorary chairman of the drive, praised the CYO program's expanded activities and urged greater family participation in its benefits.

Four division leaders will work under F. James Carr and William Feldman in the special sponsors division. They are Gerard Mulligan, John Casey, Charles Nicolay and Eslin Brace.

In the general solicitation men's division, headed by Jack E. Post, the leaders are John J. Fischette, Frederick T. McNabb Jr., C. Norman Driscoll, William O'Brien and J. Douglas Martin.

Mrs. E. Garrett Cleary, head-

ing the women's division, is being assisted by Mrs. Richard Maurer, Mrs. Thomas M. Springer, Miss Rosalie Nesser and Miss Margaret Costanza.

Members of the special sponsorship division held an organization meeting Tuesday night at Columbus Civic Center.

Howard F. Meath, executive secretary, pointed out that attendance at CYO functions during the past year exceeded 200,000. Family memberships are \$60 yearly, businessmen's \$40, businessmen's \$24 and students \$15.

An initial report meeting will be held September 20 and a further report September 27. The campaign will close September 29.

High School Apostles

(This is the seventh in a series on the Legion of Mary in the Diocese of Rochester. Today's topic is the Junior Legion.)

No survey of Legion of Mary action in the Diocese would be complete without a discussion of the Junior Legion.

If you're under 18 and want to join the Legion of Mary, you enter a Junior presidium (parish unit). There are 25 such groups in the Diocese.

The Junior Legion, as an apostolic group sets rugged standards for its members: a weekly meeting, a weekly assignment, at least an hour, some daily prayers.

"It's tough—but worth it," is the summary of one Junior group I visited recently to get background for this Courier-Journal article.

This group is made up of high school students in St. Augustine parish. It currently numbers 22 members, varying from 14 to 17 years of age, and covering all four years of high school.

The group is impressive.

The president, Miss Geraldine Crowley, is impressive in the way she handles a meet-

ing. (The president is always a senior legionary. She's been working with the Juniors for eight years, is also president of the Junior Curia (regional) group.)

The meeting outline before her in an open workbook, she checks the oral work reports of her teenage apostles.

She offers a smiling "Good work" for an assignment completed, raises her eyebrows in question when some one offers an excuse for work not done.

The kids are impressive too. They're alert, well-prepared when they report. The variety of work they are doing is striking. For example, they:

- Visit the sick at nearby nursing homes.

New Aquinas Band Leader, Music Man 'On The Go'

To Sebastian Leonardo Calabro, recently appointed head of the Aquinas music department and director of the famed Aquinas institute marching band, the essential ingredient for success is hard work.

This course has paid off well for the youthful maestro.

In 1960 Calabro graduated from the University of Omaha with a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree and a double major in instrumental and vocal. This summer he completed requirements for the Master of Music degree from the University of Nebraska and currently is interested in doctoral work at the Eastman School of Music.

As a school music director in Nebraska he found time to be

principal trombonist in the Omaha Symphony Orchestra and write several works including musical comedy.

In Rochester for less than a month he led the Aquinas band to a second place victory in the American Legion state competition in Albany and a third place spot among 51 bands at the State Fair in Syracuse. He is a man "on the go."

According to Father Leon G. Hart, C.S.B., Aquinas principal, Calabro typifies the intelligent, serious, conscientious laymen who are found in Catholic educational circles.

The personable Calabro stands a commanding six-foot and is just a bit on the lanky side. He has a pleasant open face that breaks into a smile

suddenly and often. He has a resonant voice that has a Midwest flavor to it.

Calabro is a man not only popular with his colleagues, but a man who is respected by them as well.

The father of four children, including an infant son, and a member of St. Charles parish, Calabro fits his own description of what makes a good teacher.

Above all else to be successful in teaching, he contends, you must have integrity. A teacher is in a position to affect profoundly the thinking of hundreds of students. But, he warns, with this opportunity goes the responsibility for the qualities of honesty and good citizenship. You must have these, he states, otherwise you will be a failure as a teacher, and even more important, as a man.—W.J.

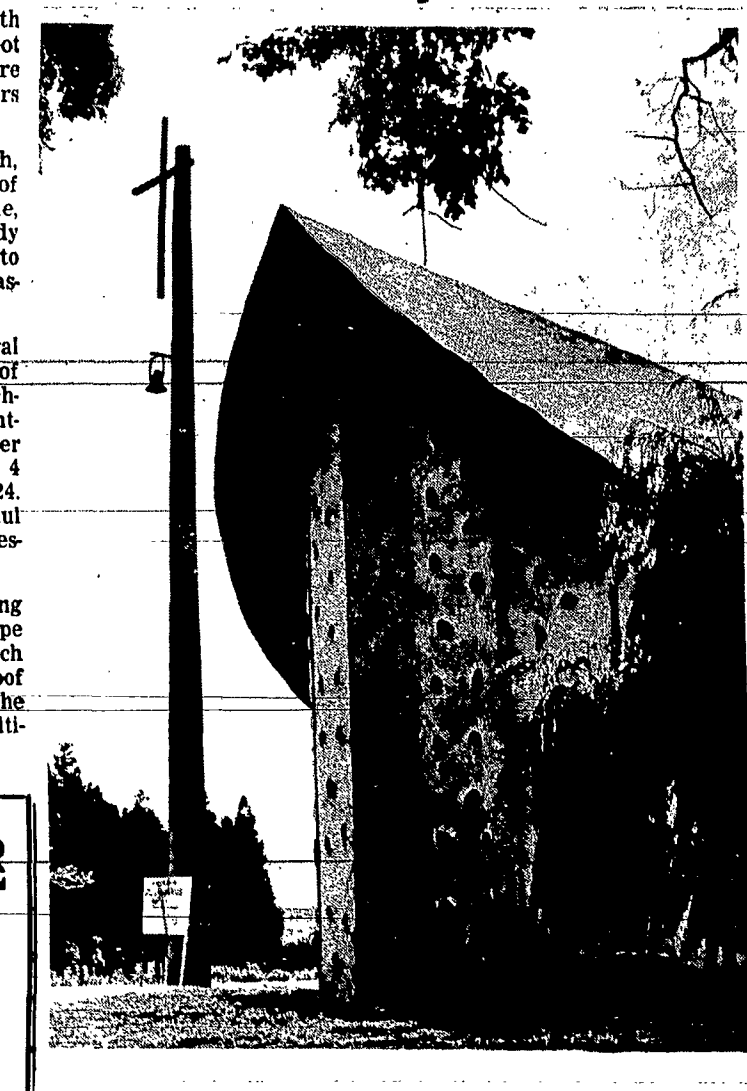
New Church in Naples

An expanded and varied course of study for adults is scheduled by the diocesan Confraternity of Christian Doctrine. The CCD courses will be held at Cardinal Mooney High School in Greece Monday evenings beginning Sept. 26 and at the Assumption School

of Religion, Fairport on Wednesday evenings beginning Sept. 28.

The courses will run for 30 weeks and prepare those taking them to conduct religion classes for pupils in public elementary and high schools.

Advanced and leadership training courses are also avail-

able for those who took the initial course in a previous year.

Applications and information are available from parish pastors or the Confraternity office, 50 Chestnut St., Rochester. Monsignor Albert H. Schmuck is diocesan director of the CCD program which will also conduct similar courses in Ithaca and Elmira.
