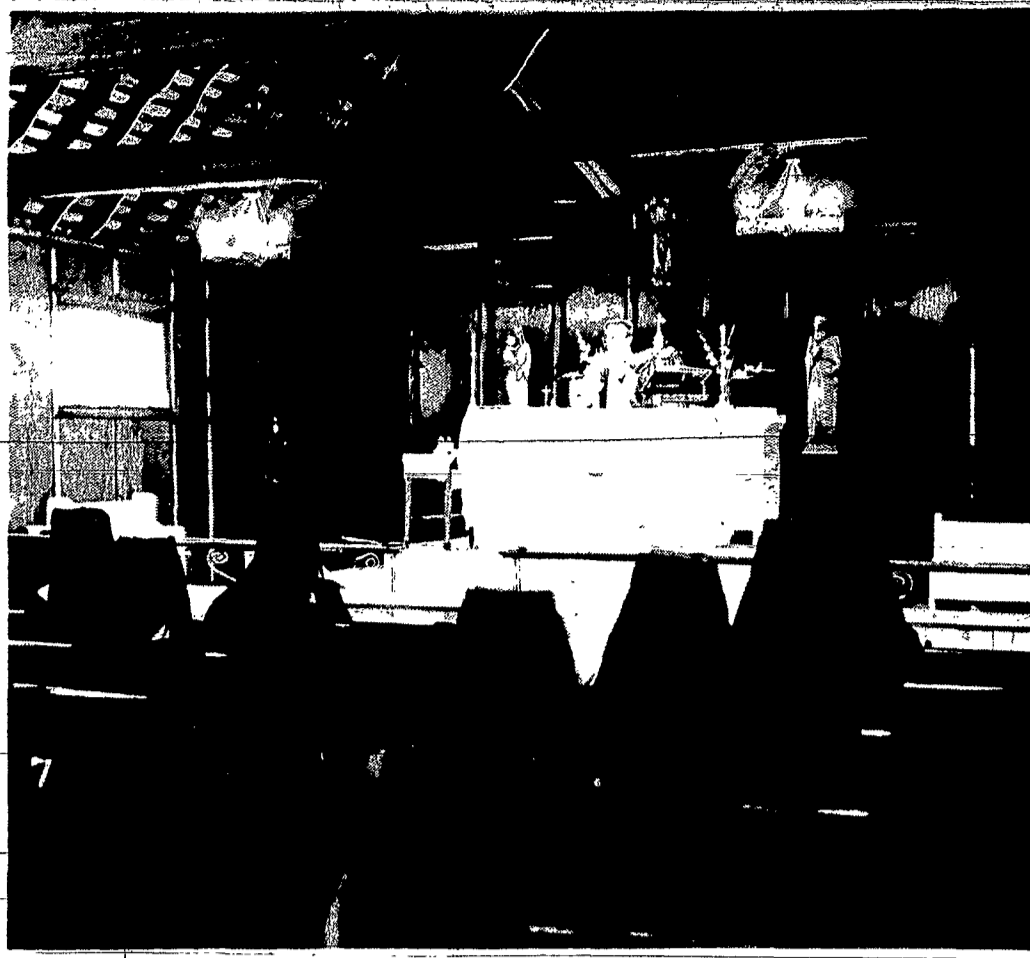

The thirty-four novices, with their directors, Sisters Evangelist, Anne Joseph, and Ann Regina, took full advantage of the Camp's facilities to enjoy this refreshing break between their year of canonical novitiate and the resumption of their college studies Sept. 18.

Thanks to the kindness of the Camp's directors, all of the buildings and equipment were at the Sisters' disposal for the week. They had Mass in the chapel each afternoon at 4:30 and for every other part of the day they were free to sleep, eat, pray or relax just as and when they wished — as these pictures show.

The novices who were clothed in the habit of the Brothers on Wednesday will pursue their spiritual and theological studies at Santa Maria Novitiate, West Park, N.Y., for one year. Their spiritual and professional training will be continued at Iona College, New Rochelle, N.Y., and at various graduate schools throughout the United States.

History, Culture Study Draws Nazareth Nun

Sister M. Rosalyn, social studies teacher at Nazareth Academy, will participate in a National Defense Education Act Institute for Advanced Study in History and Cultures of Asia and Africa at the University of Rochester College of Education.

The institute will open September, 1966, and continue part time through July, 1967, under Barry K. Beyer, director. It will include classes by visiting professors, seminars, independent study, research, and a summer workshop.

Sister stated that the lecturer will emphasize the anthropological approach to this study which has been planned to help prepare teachers in the field of non-western civilization.

The aims of the institute primarily are: to develop a core of teachers who would provide leadership for others involved in this program of studies; to provide a background of content and experience to implement the ninth grade social studies course.

As one of the 27 participants chosen from the Rochester area, Sister Rosalyn will be working on the developments of units,

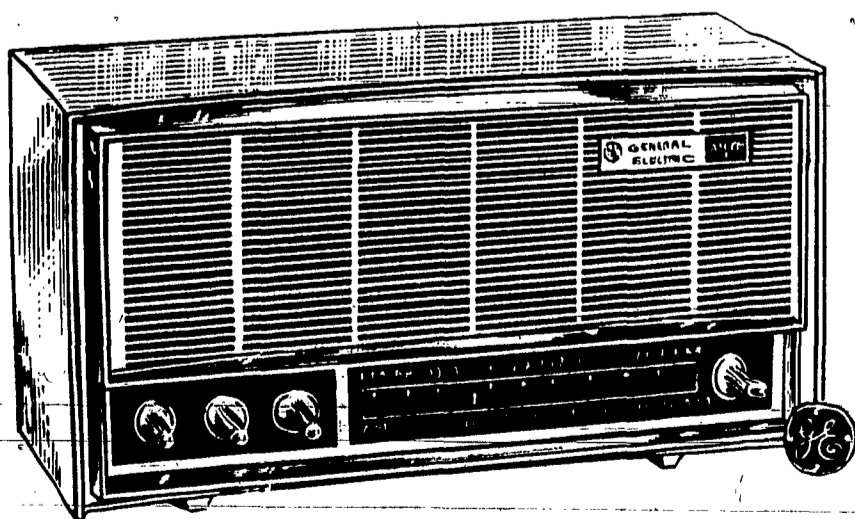

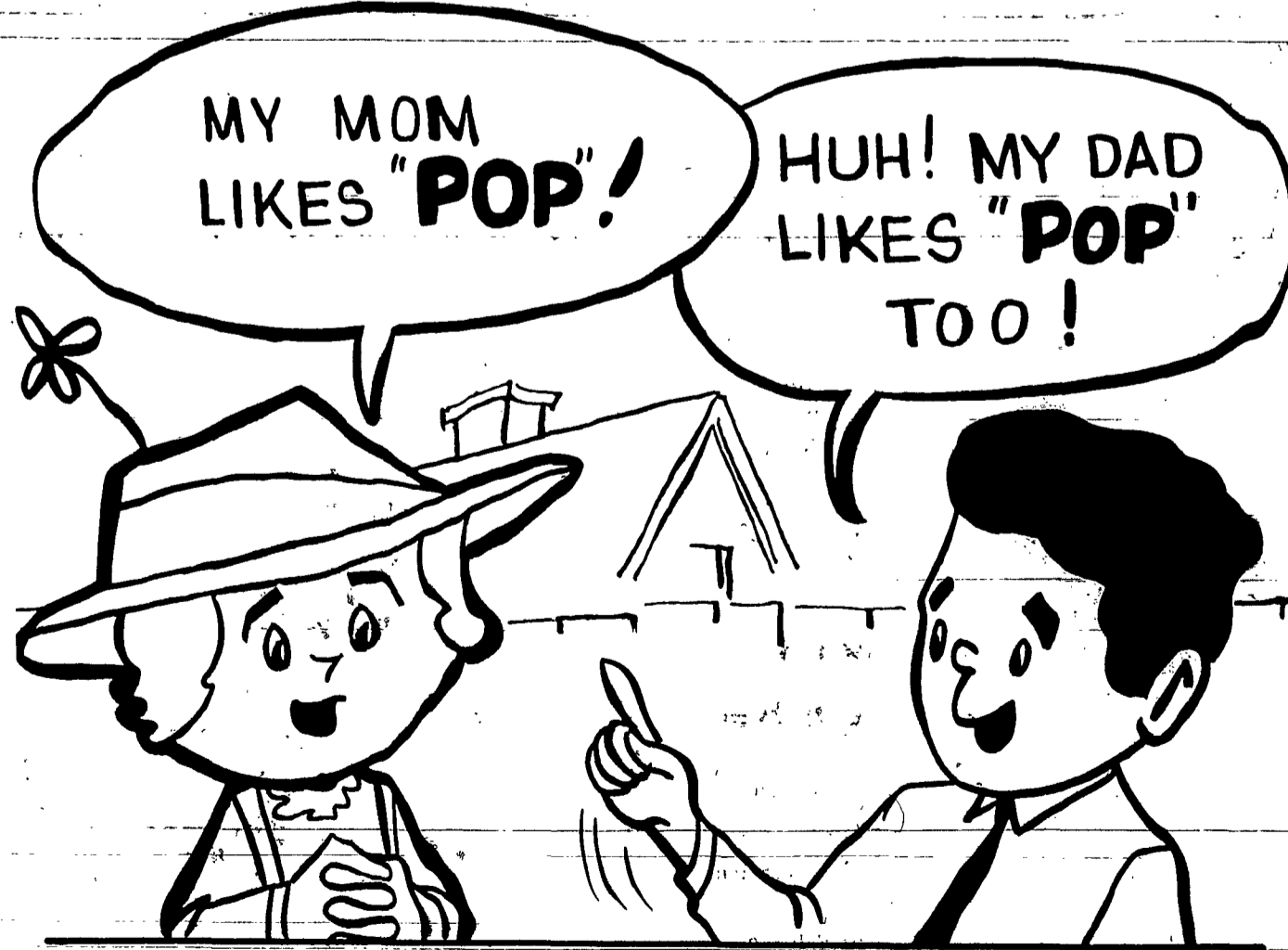
