Joliet, Ill. — (RNS) — Archbishop John P. Cody of Chicago bluntly condemned racial segregation and discrimination imposed on millions of "the captives of modern America," as he addressed a crowd of more than 2,000 attending the installation of Bishop Romeo R. Blanchette in St. Raymond-Cathedral here.

"Throughout our nation, millions of Americans are imprisoned behind a wall of fear, suspicion, and bigotry," the archbishop said.

The consolation that Our Lord gives is not always to cool a fevered brow or heal a broken limb, but to give a vision of His purpose so that we will use every suffering to save souls. Nowhere is this better revealed than in a letter we received from a priest in charge of an Asian leprosarium. He wrote: "I was about to send you the good news of the complete cure of one of our patients when suddenly tragedy struck our leprosarium. Fire broke out in the stillness of the night and within three hours most of the 65-year-old compound had burned to the ground. The men's ward was completely destroyed and with it the dental and electrical apartments, the pharmacy and all the medical supplies, the library and barber-shop, half of the operating room and the roof over the kitchen. The men lost the few meager possessions they had but the patients helped each other wonderfully. Those with sight led out the blind, others carried on their backs those without legs. Although they have lost everything, the men have no other thought, no other words but to thank God no lives were lost. They feel that this sacrifice and hardship was needed to save the world."

"This sacrifice was needed to save the world!" In their deprivation, these lepers have found the divine purpose. They have united their nails and thorns with those of Christ for the redemption of the world. There is not a plaintive "What have we done to deserve this?" But how hard it often is for us to see in the accidents and trials of life — in sickness, in bereavement, in financial loss, in leprosy — any divine purpose. Today, few understand self-denial, sacrifice and living for others. Yet we do receive letters, many letters from those who understand, those who know that there can be no Christ without a Cross and who see Him in their starving, imprisoned, sick brothers in mission lands.

You who seldom help heal a wounded body, comfort a weary soul, make a convert or do something concrete to save the world — we address this column to you — in the hope that you will hear and heed the words of Christ, "Whatever you do to these, the least of my little ones, you do it to Me."
