

Aquinas Gridders Ready For Opener Saturday

Aquinas Institute's football team started hitting last weekend and more of the same is on tap tomorrow night.

Coch Bob Rosmarino gave his team some contact work last Saturday in preparation for Saturday's game against Mont Pleasant of Schenectady under the lights at Aquinas Stadium. Game time is set for 7:30 p.m.

"It was our first all out scrimmage," said Rosmarino, "and we came out well." He added "The players look like they're in shape and they hit hard."

Rosmarino, now in his second year as the Irish coach, figured to give the team more contact during the week.

With graduation on taking away most of last year's starters and a large number of juniors vying for positions, several spots are still up for grabs.

Fielding a squad of 40, Aquinas line averages 179 pounds while its speedy backfield averages 156 pounds.

Quarterback is turning into the expected three-way battle between juniors Mike DiTroia

Rich Parinello and Doug Miller. Parinello, who saw action last season as a sophomore, will undoubtedly get the nod for the Schenectady game.

Senior Don Hall, a speed merchant and one of the Irish's leading rushers last season, has looked good. It's a little early to tell who his halfback running mate will be but chances are it will be Rich D'Etore.

Fred Recchio, who has considerable game experience with three TD's to his credit last season, his first shot at the fullback position. The six-foot, 177-pound senior has impressed in the early going.

Rugged Tony Brognia, who peeled off pounds during the summer, will probably nail down the center spot going both ways. Larry Boucher will return at tackle. Derek Rainey or Gerry Gugino will hold down the other tackle spot. Guard positions are still a question mark at present.

Aquinas first met Mont Pleasant on Thanksgiving Day in 1960 with the Irish scoring a hard-fought 39-13 victory. The second meeting, in 1964, showed the Schenectady club at 24-20 winner. Last year Aquinas upset Mont Pleasant in Schenectady, 13-6.

Mooney Meets McQuaid

An experienced McQuaid eleven will meet Cardinal Mooney, hard-hit by graduation, this Sunday, Sept. 18 at Aquinas Stadium at 2 p.m. The Cardinals defeated the Knights in their first meeting last year.

McQuaid, coached for the past five years by Tom Seymour, brings together a fine nucleus of experienced talent as it tries to better its 1965 record of 2 wins against 6 losses. At quarterback it will be Senior Steve Hromjak. Mike Miller returns as fullback. Leading candidates for the other two running posts are seniors Bernie Ashley, Steve Crane, Tom Mulvaney and juniors Bob DiPaola and Bob Carr. Senior Dave Bruckel and sophomore Nick Combs are running behind Hromjak at quarterback while senior Art Mandara backs up Miller at fullback.

On the line, the Knights have good size in co-captain Tim McGinn at center, tackles Jim

Robinson and Pat Quinlan and guards Dan Iles, Tim Collins and Mark Stewart, all seniors. Juniors Tom Perkins, Rick Wheelan, Steve Kusak and Paul Reburn give the Knights depth at the latter two positions. At end seniors Mark Boylan and Mike Rhodes and junior Bob McRae give coach Seymour a solid trio.

Cardinal Mooney High School, tutored by Tony Merola who is in his third year at the Greece school, posted a 4 win and 3 lost record last year. The Cardinals hit by the graduation of 18 squad members, face a rebuilding job. Spirits are high however at 800 Maiden Lane, as a fine group of last year's returning players along with last year's Junior Varsity and Fresh team

members, make up a strong potential club.

The only returning starter is All-Catholic fullback Dick Musclow. The hard running Musclow, who tips the scales at an even 200 pounds, has shown some of last year's power in early workouts. Quarterback Jim Harrington, who saw considerable action last year, returns to call signals for the Cardinals. Harrington, an accurate passer, a good runner and a fine leader, stands at 6 ft. 2 in. and weighs 180. Boys who have looked good for the other backfield spots are senior Dick Palumbo, juniors Dick Parker, Terry Freeman, Paul Nealon and sophomores John Waffie and Ron Klem.

The Cardinal line, which was wiped out by graduation, will field some bright prospects. At end, the Cards have seniors Earl Lenhard, Jim Nielson, Ted Maher, juniors Randy Garrett, Gary Braun and John Lampher. At tackle are seniors Larry Schaber, Mike Griffin, Jim Chiumento and 220 lbs. Jeff Nellis. Juniors Ron Durbin at 195, 6 ft. 3 in. Mike Urbanas at 240 and John Corcoran at 205 add more size to the position. The guard positions are being sought by seniors Mark Kesselring, Brian Gurtler, John Shirley and two fine sophomores Paul Hank at 185 and Bob Merkel at 180. The center spot offers a tussle between senior Jim Conover and juniors Jim Connor and Mike Smith.

Ohio Parents Claim Federal Aid Held Back

Columbus—(RNS)—A priest, speaking for Roman Catholic school superintendents of Ohio, warned here that parents of children in non-tax-supported Ohio schools "are getting edgy because nothing or so little is being done for their children" under Title I of the U.S. Elementary and Secondary Education Act.

Father John A. Leahy, assistant superintendent of Cleveland diocesan schools, spoke here at a meeting of public school superintendents.

The meeting was sponsored by the Ohio Education Department to get suggestions and "means of cooperation" for establishing federal aid programs through Title I.

Title I offers money for programs to help children who are economically or educationally deprived, regardless of the school they attend.

Father Leahy noted that parents "will be willing and eager to support" public school bond issues and levies when they see that efforts are made to provide federal benefits for their children.



Ecumenism Is Topic Of New Booklet

"New Horizons for Christian Unity," a discussion booklet for adults who want to know more about Ecumenism, has been published recently.

The 96-page booklet contains the text of Vatican II Council's Decree on Ecumenism, and 18 discussion-oriented chapters.

"Both girls," he said, "found that when customers saw them wearing crosses and chains, they wanted to imitate them. When the customers inquired where they could buy crosses, the girls found a supply and sold them to thousands of customers."

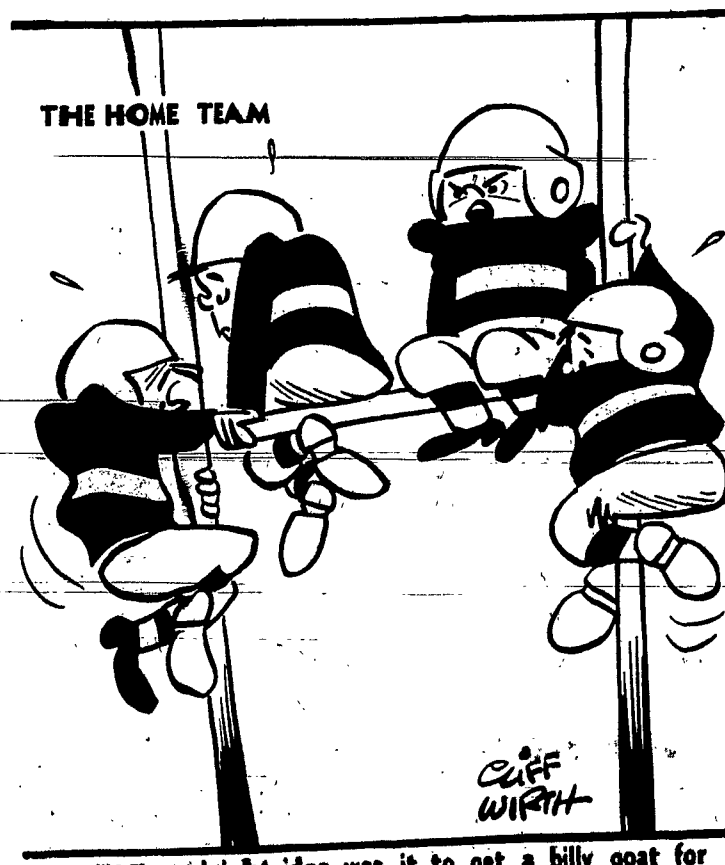
The paper said it had tried to locate where the crosses came from, but without success. It said its first inquiries led it to state-controlled jewelry manufacturers, but they denied producing crosses.
