Soviet Girls Wear Crosses

Moscow - (RNS) - Soviet Russia's top Communist youth organ took sharp exception to a 'new fashion" among Russian girls-wearing a cross and chain around their necks. Komsomolskaya Pravda said it had conducted an investigation and discovered that the new fashion had been started by two 20-year-old girl clerks named Ina and Valya in a government-run store here. "Both girls," he said, "found that when customers saw them wearing closses and chains, they wanted to imitate them. When the customers inquired where they could buy crosses, the girls found a supply and sold them to thousands of customers." The paper said it had tried to locate where the crosses came from, but without success It said its first inquirles led it to state-controlled jewelry manufacturers, but they denied producing crosses
