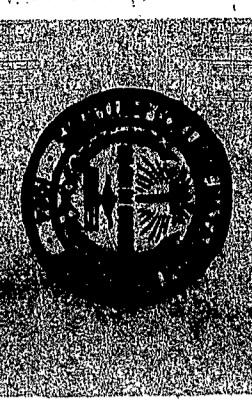

Nazareth College OF ROCHESTER

Building Stated

For Use Spring of '67

The new Academic Center at Nazareth College will fill a real void on the campus and fulfill general educational need. The college was previously operating under difficulty, using a facility that had to triple as lecture hall, auditorium and gymnasium. It was wholly inadequate, could only seat a little over 300 students, and was extremely costly to maintain, needing daily attention because of changes from one activity to another.

The Academic Center will have art and music facilities, second to none in the area, and should enhance the college's reputation in eyes of students and educators who follow these fields.

The new auditorium is unique—it will have a seating capacity of 1,100 and is tilted toward the stage to allow unobstructed viewing. The acoustics will be as fine as modern engineering will provide, and a complete projection booth has adaptation for closed circuit TV. This makes the new auditorium a tremendous improvement over the old unsuitable facility, which will remain as a gym.

A special feature is that of the Speech Therapy Department, located in the auditorium wing. It has a separate lobby and driveway. Twelve individual therapy rooms are located off this lobby. A large room for

demonstration is separated from an observation room by a one way mirror. Students can enter this room from an internal corridor separate from the lobby. One can see its versatility. This facility will also be used by students who are preparing themselves to serve in other area schools to correct speech defects.

"A college never dreamed a dream and made it become a reality. A college never fostered a spirit. Only individual men and women could dream a Nazareth

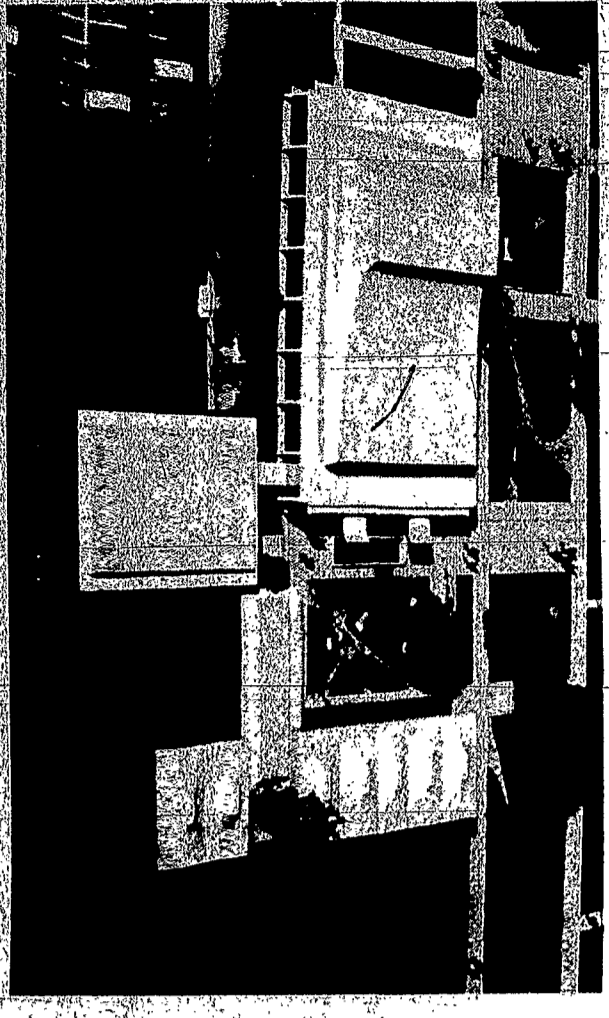

Becket Hall

Construction Schedule Indicates Opening Date of September 1967

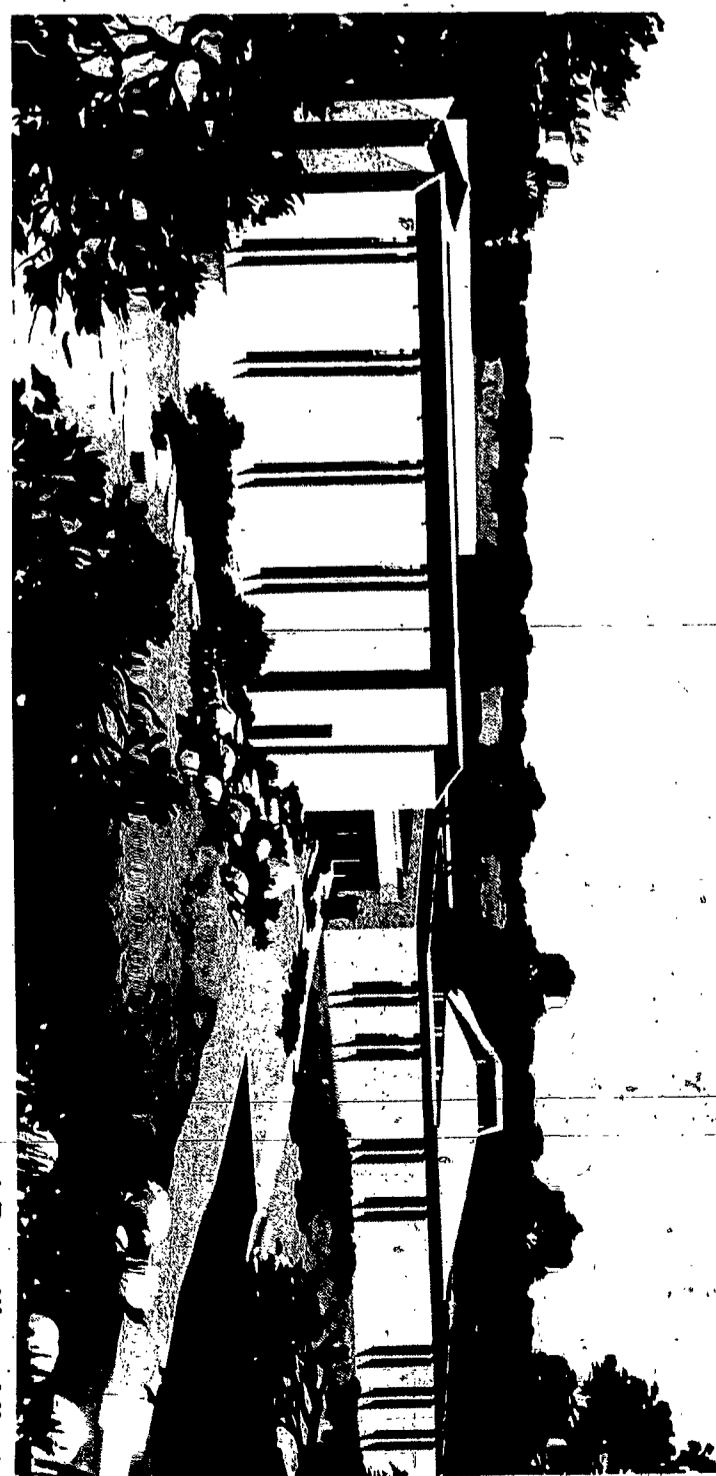
Becket Hall is being built by the Diocese of Rochester on the campus of St. John Fisher College. Its exact location is off the south side of Fairport Road.

Fr. Hall will house the seminarians of the Diocese who are attending Fisher College. This is a new development in our seminary program. Formerly, these young men attended St. Andrew and St. Bernard Seminaries for their studies during the collegiate years.

This new program began in September, 1965. It was enthusiastically endorsed by diocesan officials whose confidence has been amply demonstrated by the results of this first scholastic year.

Becket Hall will accommodate 150 students in private rooms. Their activity programs will be pursued in various areas of the new structure. The dining room, 10 seat 200 will be served from a fully modern kitchen. It will contain facilities for games, music appreciation, television viewing, etc. There will be a general Auditorium for lectures, seminars, discussion programs and social activities. Within the building, accommodations for the Rector and Spiritual Director have been provided.

The Chapel has been designed by the Dapretto Studio. It will conform in every respect to the requirements of the Rector and Spiritual Director have been provided.

Dear Friends:

I know that you will be pleased to learn that your gracious generosity is fast making a hope and a dream of a year ago a splendid reality, which has captured the interest of countless people who are concerned about the education of our future priests. I have been invited to a meeting of Seminary Rectors in Grayville, this October to present a progress report on our pioneering

We are confident that the program will achieve its full potential when all of our students can live together and have the advantage of community life on campus.

When we broke ground last spring we prayed with the Psalmist: "Prosper the work of our hands, O Lord!" for we realize that "Unless the Lord build the house, they labor in vain who build it." Indeed, the Lord has blessed us from the beginning.

The accompanying photos will give you an idea of the progress of the physical structure. Barring unforeseen difficulties, we should be ready for occupancy by next August. We expect about 120 students when we open the residence next September.

On behalf of our students I wish to thank each of you and assure you that your intentions occupy a special place in the daily prayers of all of us at Becket Hall.
