The first varsity football meeting between McQuaid and Bishop Kearney High went into the Kings' column by a resounding 38-0 score last Sunday at Aquinas Stadium as halfback Laverne Dickinson ran wild for 4 touchdowns.

This Saturday, McQuaid will attempt to bounce back from that loss in a home game against Watertown. Earlier this season the Cyclones from the North Country held Kearney to a 14-13 tie, a statistic that suggests another busy day for the Knight defenders.

Busy would be an understatement for the afternoon that Dickinson put in. In all he covered 268 yards on 21 carries, kicked two extra points, had two touchdown runs totaling 138 yards called back, and played most of the way on defense.

Mt. Carmel High of Auburn remained undefeated by trouncing the Mynderse Academy Blue Devils, 19-0.

After a scoreless first half, the Auburn Crusaders broke loose in the third quarter. Dick Rusinko, one of Carmel's three breakaway backs, cracked through right tackle, and from his own 16 raced 84 yards to put Carmel ahead 6-0.

A short Mynderse punt set the stage for a Crusader drive that saw Dick Rusinko scurry for his team's second touchdown.

It was Dick Rusinko again as he ran for 57 yards and his third touchdown of the evening. Jim Bodine converted to make the score 19-0.

It was a good evening for Rusinko. He carried the ball 17 times for 227 yards and three touchdowns. On the season the speedy back has raced for 583 yards and a 9.4 yards-per-carry average.

Aquinas Cross-X Team One of Best

The Aquinas Cross Country team has run against 151 different teams this year. They have beaten 150 of them.

That, in effect, tells the story of one of the finest cross-country teams to come out of Monroe County.

The Aquinas team, coached by Father Donald McCarthy, runs against schools from every part of New York State — from as far away as New York City and as near as Webster — and only one of the 151 schools has been able to defeat the Little Irish harriers.

This distinction as the only squad to outrun Aquinas goes to Ossining High in the greater New York area. The Aquinas team will meet its Ossining counterpart one more time this season, on Nov. 19, in what is unofficially termed the championship meet.

Since finishing behind Ossining at the Ulster Freeway Invitational at the beginning of the season, the Little Irish, as a team, has outrun everything in sight.

During the past four weeks Aquinas has taken first place honors in four multi-school invitational: Baldwinsville, McQuaid, Watertown and Alfred-Almond.

Father McCarthy is singularly blessed with five strong runners in four multi-school invitational: Joe Wargo who has been Aquinas' first finisher in each meet. A senior, Wargo is running cross country for the first year and has not finished lower than 12th in any meet, some of which have up to 250 runners participating.

Immediately following Wargo are Dan Holden and Dick Fitz.

Aquinas Away Face Walsh

Undefeated Aquinas Institute will have to stop Bishop Walsh's passing game if it hopes to keep its winning streak alive in the annual Walsh-Aquinas football game Sunday afternoon in Olean.

On the other hand, Walsh will have to come up with a defense to halt Aquinas' strong running game if it expects to stay in the ball game.

Walsh has a talented passer in senior quarterback John Shine. The six-foot-one, 190-pounder has hit on 50 per cent of his passes (27 of 54 for 580 yards) and has tossed eight touchdowns.

John Williamson, new Walsh coach, says his signal caller "rates with any I've seen."

Williamson, talking about Shine noted:
"He's got what you call natural ability. He can pinpoint his passes. He's also smart enough to know when not to throw if his receivers are covered. He can run when he gets the opening."

Coach Bob Rosmarino has been working on Aquinas pass defense this week in hopes of slowing down the Walsh attack.

Batavia Captain Steve Kenoyer is the main cog in Coach Danny Van Delta's straight "T" formation. Kenoyer, a fifty runner as well as passer, will be working behind an aggressive line.

Mooney will again rely on senior quarterback Jim Harrington's arm and senior Dick Muslow's power running to defeat the Blue Devils.
