Academy Reopens For Theatre Arts

The Theatre Arts Academy of Rochester, founded by Music Theatre co-directors Noreen Bride and Suzanne Wigg, will reopen at its new location, Theatre East, on Monday, Nov. 14.

Aimed at training and encouraging prospective professional talent, as well as enriching the background and technique of actors committed to local theater, the school will provide classes in music, dance and drama for young people and adults.

The schedule will include two theater workshops; one for high school students and one for adults, coordinating a acting, speech analysis and correction, dance, American mime and music in a two hour session for actors.

Separate hour long classes in music theory, vocal music, jazz and ballet are also available. Saturdays will feature

dance and drama classes for youngsters from 7-17.

The drama staff, headed by Mrs. Bride, includes Richard Mancini, children's theater, and Barbara Flanagan, speech. Miss Wigg is in charge of the music department, with Mrs. Lois Gilbert, vocal music. All dance classes will be taught by Tom Cahill, the young professional dancer recently returned from Hollywood to teach in his native city.

The school year will be divided into two thirteen week terms. All classes are co-educational, and students will be graded according to age and previous experience.

Admittedly autobiographical, the play explores the tragic circumstances of the youth of one of the greatest playwrights of American theater has ever known.
