Knights Fall To Upstaters

McQuaid's football Knights will be out to salvage something from a losing season this Saturday night when they journey to Jamestown for the final game. The incentive is simple: Jamestown is unbeaten and, according to reports, can be taken.

The Knights certainly are overdue for a good performance after bowing to Water town, 46-6, in a frigid, wind-blown setting at McQuaid last Saturday. Not noted for its passing, Watertown surprised the Knights with a pair of long aerials that went for touchdowns and a 20-0 halftime lead. In the second half, the Cyclones struck again on long plays, this time on punt returns by Bill Miller, one for 75 yards, the other for 44. A long ground march and another aerial strike completed the carnage, and gave the visitors a place in the McQuaid record book for most opposition points.

McQuaid looked good on only one drive, that coming in the third period when Steve Hromjak's passes to Bob McRae and Hromjak's short run gave the Knights their only score.

Polish Reds 'Cooperative'

Vatican City — (RNS) — Vatican Radio reported that in the past year Polish authorities had been "very cooperative" in allowing Catholic missionaries to leave Poland for assignments overseas.

It said six Polish members of the Society of the Divine Word, which has its headquarters in Rome, had been permitted to go to mission fields in New Guinea and Ghana, and 30 other Polish members were allowed to take up posts in Indonesia, Latin America, Australia and New Guinea.

"This is in contrast to other Communist countries which allow missionaries to go abroad only in exceptional and very rare cases," the Vatican station said.

Aquinas Hosts Erie Prep

Everybody's looking forward to Saturday afternoon's football showdown between unbeaten Aquinas Institute and powerful Erie Prep.

Aquinas has the highest-scoring scholastic football team in the area.

The Irish have erupted for 189 points in six games, an average of 31-plus a game.

However, Irish coach Bob Rosmarino isn't particularly confident his offense can explode again Saturday afternoon when the Maroon and White meet scrappy and powerful Erie Prep.

"We're worried about this game," said Rosmarino this week. "This Erie club is a good one. It has many offensive variations and it's going to take a good defensive job to contain them. Erie always is a tough one for us and we're not taking this game lightly."

The rugged Ramblers will be looking for their fourth victory over Aquinas in fifteen years of competition. Coach Don Raabe isn't taking the game lightly either. Said Raabe: "We scouted Aquinas twice and it looks tough. It has size and experience and we'll have our work cut out for us. Any time you play a tough team away from home, you can expect trouble."

Last year Aquinas outplayed Erie, came from behind to prep the score in the last period only to lose the game in the last six seconds as Erie's Bill Guth leaped into the air between two defenders and grabbed a wobbly fourth down pass to edge Aquinas, 33-28.
