3-Year Bible Readings At Masses

Rome — (NC) — The Italian bishops' liturgy commission has approved on an experimental basis, a new selection of readings from the New and Old Testaments which in the future will replace the present texts used for the Epistle and the Gospel in the Mass.

As they now stand, there are to be three readings from the Bible instead of the traditional two, that is the Epistle and Gospel. Experimentally, it has been decided to continue the readings over a three-year period, instead of the traditional one-year cycles now in practice. In this period readings would cover the entire New Testament

and parts of the Old Testament. The Italian texts of the selected Bible passages will be ready before Advent and it is expected that the experimental stage, will be useful in assessing the effectiveness of the principles which have been adopted. In a few years time it is anticipated that the proper official reform of the entire plan of the Biblical readings for the Mass be implemented.

Jews, Christians Share Humanism

Pittsburgh — (RNS) — The Catholic Bishop of Pittsburgh has invited Jews to join in a shared witness with the Christian world and other peoples of "The Book" whose humanism is God-centered.

Bishop John J. Wright made the appeal at a meeting of metropolitan Pittsburgh's Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, at which the prelate received the ADL's Humanitarian Award.

Bishop Wright said his invitation was not to join in a "holy war" but to prepare for the dialogue which believers must have "with the world that rejects the world of Isaac and Jacob and Abraham."

He said that people of "The

Book" — by which he meant those who, whatever their subsequent divergencies, subscribe to the Old Testament and the prophets — must discover the validities they share if their dialogue with atheistic humanism is to be "fruitful and affectionate."

He remarked that Jews are equipped to bring key "seed ideals" to that dialogue. Among them he listed "witness to the truth that the eternal 'our' God is one; witness to the truth recorded in Genesis, that each of us is made in the image of God; witness to the primacy which personality has over all things; witness to the common good which must be each nation's service; witness to the sanctity of scholarship and to the importance of ideas and intelligence in the building of the good society."

Bishop Wright pleaded that Jewish scholarship never be allowed to become purely secular, but that it always be a "vowed scholarship in the service of God and His people."

The bishop noted the relaxed relationships between Christians and Jews, and said the improved state of affairs is due

less to Vatican II's Declaration on Non-Christian Religions than to a "tremendous number of personal experiences and episodes" that sharpened the respect which Christians and Jews have for one another as individuals.

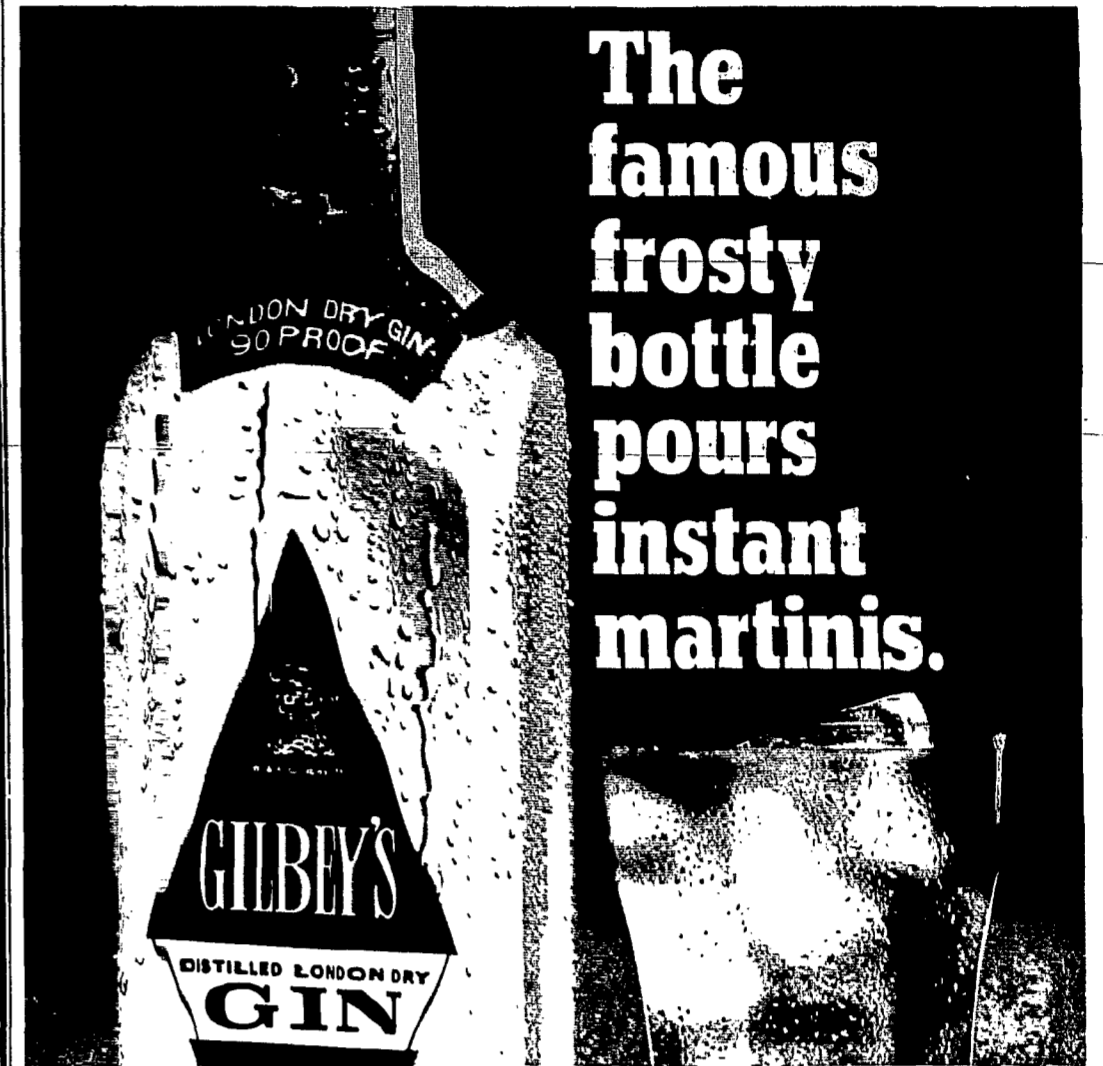

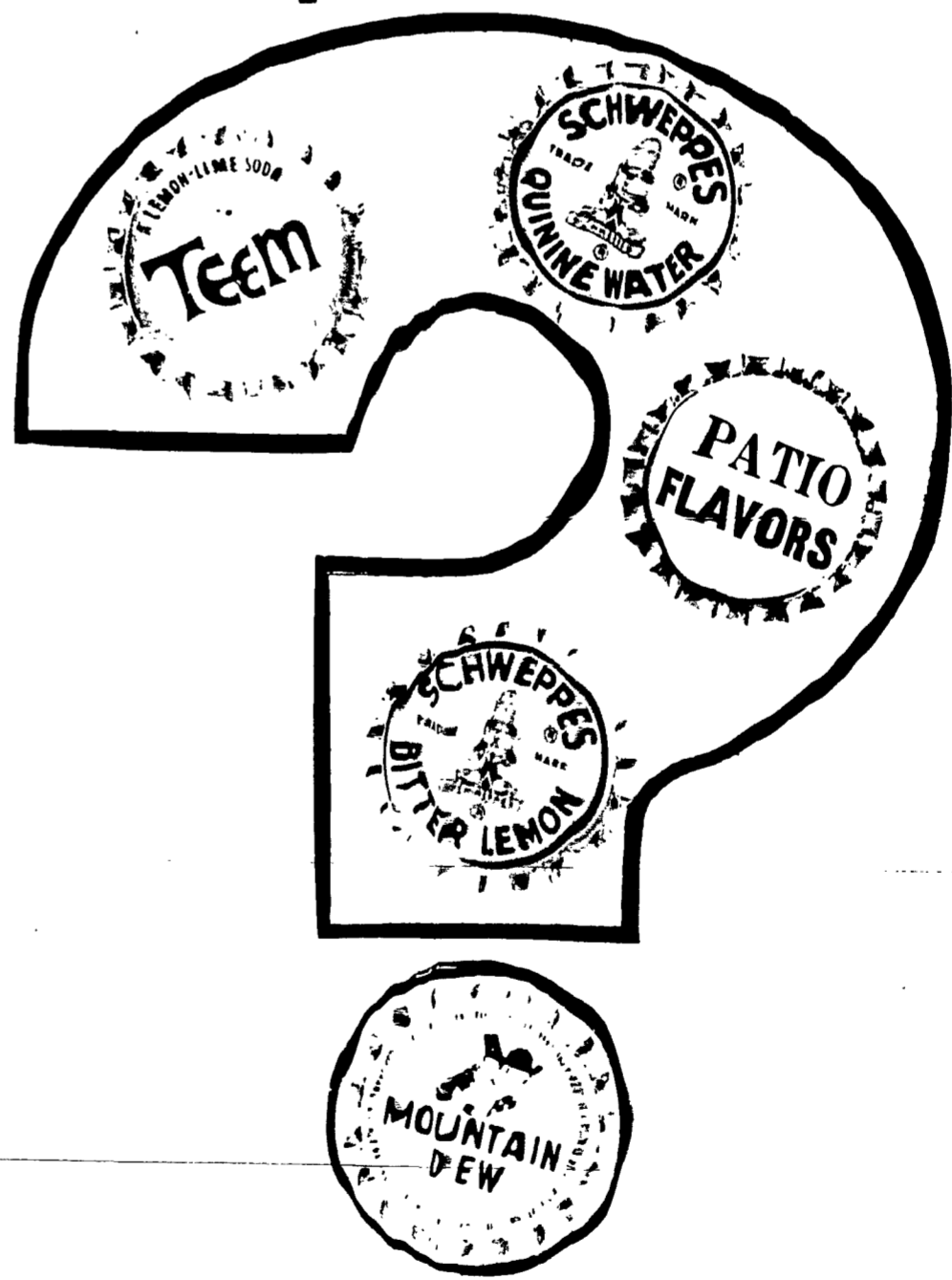
