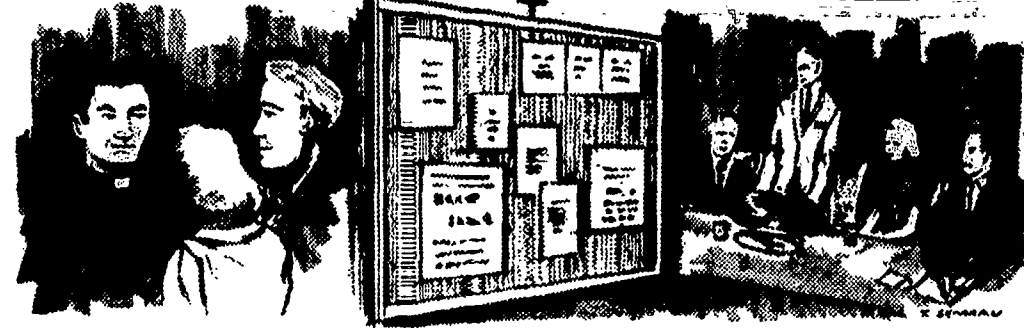

### Fr. Borgognoni Scheduled at Good Shepherd

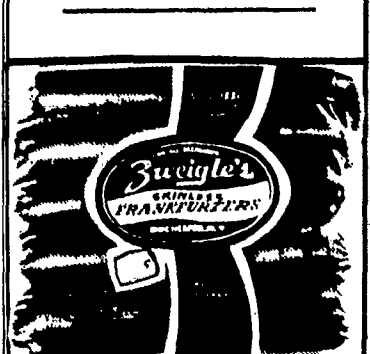
Father Charles Borgognoni, widely known priest in the Syracuse area, will speak at the adult religious education program of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Henrietta, Tue.-Joy, Nov. 29, at 8:30 p.m.

## Ecumenism Topic Set At St. Patrick's, Corning

Corning — "Ecumenism" will be discussed at the Nov. meeting of the St. Patrick's Parish Aides at the Parish School Hall of St. Patrick's Church, Corning, on Sunday, Nov. 20, at 8 p.m.

The topic for discussion, "The Ecumenical Movement: what is it and where is it going?", will treat of the development of ecumenism, reasons for the current emphasis on ecumenism, and the future direction of this movement.

The panel of four clergymen will also be concerned with specific areas of ecumenism such as practical religious cooperation in secular matters, and joint participation in worship, sacraments and scripture.

Participating on the panel will be local clergymen of four different faiths: Pastor Floyd Addison of the Emanuel Lutheran Church in Corning; Rev. Charles L. Briem serving as minister for the Congregational Church in Horby, and interim minister for the First Congregational Church in Corning; Rev. Joseph M. Egan, Pastor of St. Patrick's Catholic Church in Elmira; and the Rev. James Elliott Lindsley, rector of Christ Episcopal Church in Corning.

The panel discussion will be preceded by a short business meeting of the Parish Aides. Interested members of all churches are cordially invited to attend. Refreshments will be served after the meeting. Mrs. Raymond Ward will serve as chairman of the refreshment committee.

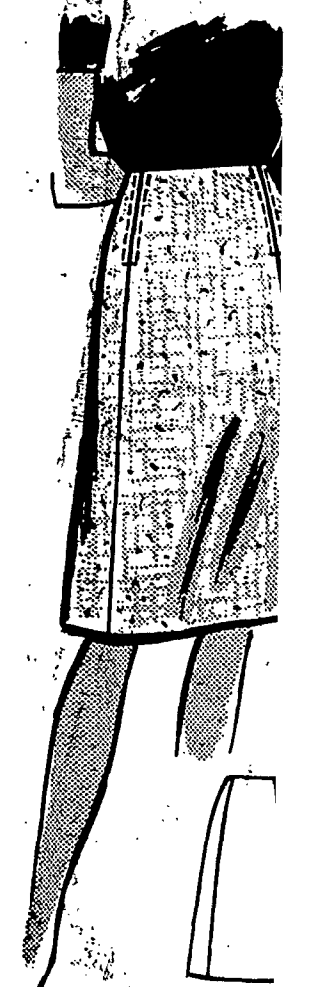

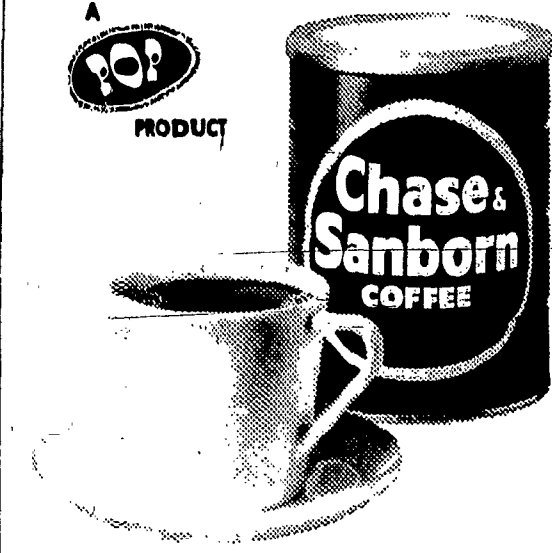

**HOLIDAY MOLDED SALAD**  
2 cups hot water  
2 3-oz. pkgs. ROYAL Cherry Gelatin  
1 lb. can whole cranberry sauce  
1 pint sour cream

Four hot water over ROYAL gelatin and stir until dissolved. Add can of cranberry sauce and mix thoroughly. Chill until thick and syrupy. Fold in sour cream with whip. Pour into ring mold and chill.

Nut meats (half cup) may be added along with sour cream if desired.

When you turn in your Labels, use the Label Report Forms with your count.

Drive-in parking. Turn ins accepted daily 3 to 5 p.m.; Saturdays 10 to 12 noon. Note the hours. Note there is parking. ### "POP" MUSHROOMS ROMANOFF

- 1 1/2 lbs. fresh mushrooms
