# Mooney Beats Kearney, 32-6

In Cardinal Mooney's final two football games, Tony Merola's team reached the season's highpoint with a 32-6 win over Bishop Kearney, and then fell to the year's lowpoint when Jamestown ripped them, 45-7, in last Saturday's finale. The Cardinal's season's record was 5-3.

In the Kearney game, the Maiden Lane boys, traveled the victory route via the air with quarterback Jim Harrington at the controls. The senior completed seven of twelve passes including three for touchdowns.

The fireworks started early in the game when Harrington found Earl Lenhard open twice in the first quarter and both times threw to him for touchdowns. The plays covered 26 and 29 yards.

In the second period Harrington threw to Terry Freeman for 59 yards and a 19-0 half-time lead.

In the second half Mooney's running attack took over and moved the Cardinal's point total to thirty-two when Dick Parker went over from the four and Dick Muslow scored from the one.

The only bright spot for Bishop Kearney fans in an otherwise gloomy afternoon came when Kevin Archibald intercepted a Harrington pass and

ran for 48 yards and the King's only six pointer.

However, in the Jamestown game things did not go nearly as well for Cardinal Mooney.

The team fell to a strong undefeated Jamestown eleven by a 45-7 score.

The Cards seemed to have things well in hand through the first quarter. After kicking off to the hometown and forcing them to punt, the Mooney offense rolled to its only touchdown of the night. Dick Parker sprinted 60 yards to Jamestown's 10 from where Jim Harrington, on a keeper, scored the 6 pointer. Dick Muslow added the extra point kick.

At the onset of the second quarter the Cardinal's Muslow intercepted a pass and returned it to Jamestown's ten yard line. Muslow was injured on the play and was forced to leave the game with a knee injury.

A 15 yard penalty thwarted the Cards scoring opportunity.

Jamestown came alive in the latter part of the period to chalk up two touchdowns and take a 13 to 7 halftime lead.

The second half was featured by the running of the Raiders, Randy Sharp, who scored 3 touchdowns to lead the onslaught.



## CYO to Open 17th Season

The Catholic Youth Organization, under the direction of the Rev. William Charbonneau, Howard F. Meath and John Dorris, will launch their 17th season of play with a record number of 61 entries in the Jr. High and High School divisions.

The High School leagues are broken down geographically, while the Jr. High divisions are determined by the number of boys in each school, from the 5th thru 8th grade. The season will start Sunday, Nov. 27.

C.Y.O. has had a phenomenal growth during the past 10 years, with a modest number of 28 entries in 1956 to the present number of 61 entries competing during the present year. The program offers approximately 1400 youngsters in the Jr. High and High School level to participate in an inner school and inner parish program from the end of November thru the middle of March.

The program reaches a huge climax on Friday, March 10, when the Diocesan Tournament is conducted in Rochester, with the best teams from the Rochester Catholic Youth Organization league, the best teams from the Central division, the Auburn league and the Elmira league, comprising a total of 76 teams.

## English Mass For Children

Manchester—(RNS)—A special Mass for children was urged by Father Anthony Bullen, director of Liverpool's Roman Catholic Catechetical Center, when he addressed a catechetical study meeting here.

"Liturgy is not made for children," he declared. "It's a strange language to them, and until the day when the Congregation of Rites, or whoever is responsible, produces a special Mass for children we are going to have a lot of hard work to do, all of us."

Father Bullen also suggested that since teachers and priests are permitted to put the Epistle and the Gospel into simplified English, they should be able to do the same with the Introit, Offertory, and Gradual, and that children can better understand these portions of the Mass.

# Aquinas Closes With 6-2 Record

Aquinas Institute's hopes for its first undefeated football season in 16 years were crushed when Bob Rosmarino's boys met a strong Pennsylvania team, then a stronger Ohio machine, and lost both, finishing the season with a 6-2 record.

Erie Prep handed the Irish its first loss of the season, winning 28-27, and St. Joseph's of Cleveland, Ohio, added another to Aquinas' loss column, while moving to a 27-7 victory last Sunday.

In the Erie game a crowd of 2,500 weathered a steady bombardment of rain and snow and watched Aquinas outstrut and generally outplay the Pennsylvania Ramblers in a losing cause.

Early in the game Erie, taking advantage of two short punts, scored twice on pass plays covering 14 and 10 yards.

In the second quarter, Aquinas was "halled" back into the game when its forever-scoring halfback Don Hall went into the end zone twice on short runs. John Basile tied the score at 14-14 with successful conversions. However, just before the half ended a 37-yard touchdown pass put Erie ahead 21-14.

Aquinas took the second half kickoff and evened the score when Rich Parnello threw a 25-yard pass to Bruce Costello for a TD. Late in the quarter Erie moved ahead, 28-21.

In the final period Pat Graham blocked an Erie punt, setting the stage for the Irish's final score, a one yard plunge by Don Hall. The all-important PAT was blocked and Erie went home with a 28-27 win.

Prep's coach, Don Raab, had nothing but praise for the Little Irish. "We like to think that the best high school football is played in our area, but Aquinas changed our minds. This is the best team we have faced all season." Earlier this season Erie had beaten Bishop Kearney 50-0.

In last Sunday's finale for the Irish against St. Joseph of Cleveland, Aquinas was not able to play in the manner which impressed Raab so much. St. Joe's, a football powerhouse in football-minded Ohio and

# Notre Dame Wins In 25-0 Romp

Notre Dame ended its athletic relations with Hornell High School with a bang Friday night as they repaid the Raiders for blocking their entrance into the Southern Tier League by running all over Hornell in the second half to romp 25-0.

In the game, ND's Joel Ramich set an all-time scoring record with a total of 94 points. He is just 127 yards shy of the all-time Elmira rushing record with one more game to play.

In the game he picked up a Hornell fumble and raced 89 yards for the score and later threw a 42 yard pass to Charlie Cascio who ran the remaining ten yards for the TD. In the fourth quarter, he ran off tackle for 57 yards, bulging over a linebacker who was unfortunate enough to be in the way.

The other ND tally was added by big Bill Baker, a defensive end who knocked down a pass

and trotted 40 yards for the score. Baker at two hundred pounds, has been a terror all season on defense.

ND's defense was a little slow in the first half and Hornell was pretty sharp, but not for long. Gary Mirdough, John Miranda, and small-but-deadly linebackers Augie Moretti and Danny O'Herron did workhorse jobs on defense knocking down passes and making key tackles. Quarterback Paul Titus and sophomore center Dan Farrell should be singled out for their outstanding jobs on offense.

Hornell, led by the excellent passing of Jim Moretti, pretty much dominated the first half. However, when Ramich and Co. got rolling there was no stopping them. Many times the Raiders passed close to paydirt but the ND defense held and they either fumbled or gave up the ball on downs.

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## McQuaid Cagers Open Season This Sunday

McQuaid Jesuit High's basketball squad gets off to an early start this Sunday, (Nov. 20) with a game at Mt. Carmel of Auburn.

Next Friday, the Knights will help open the local season when they take on Irondequoit in the second half of a War Memorial doubleheader.

Fairport and Brighton are newcomers on the McQuaid schedule of 18 games, which includes a 2-game appearance in the annual Jesuit Tournament in New York City.

Coach Ken Jones, beginning his fifth year at McQuaid, will have four seniors returning from last year's 10-9 squad. Among them is 6-4 pivot man John Koller, whose 298 points last season put him number three on the school's scoring list behind Tony Leonardo, '65, and Tony Criscuolo, '62. Koller will be joined by classmates Bob Weingartner, Paul Jones, and Jeff Gillenkirch and by junior Brad Smith.

Weingartner, who scored 125 points last year, is a strong 6-1. He'll play up front with Jones, an improved 6-5 cornerman who played only in spots as a junior. Gillenkirch, who also topped 100 points last year, will share the backcourt chores with Smith, a J.V. grad.

McQuaid's bench will have an unusual makeup, consisting of

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
