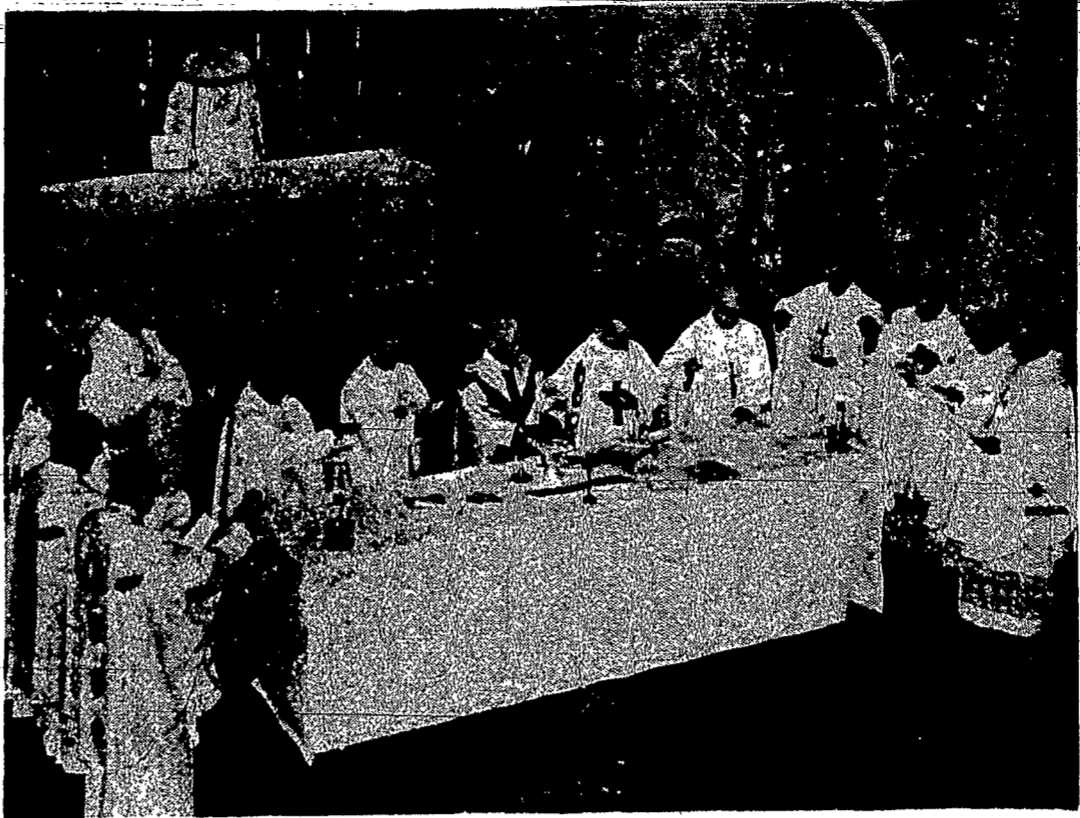

Buy-Power Mobilized For Equality

Hartford — (RNS) — Project Equality, launched last year in the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Hartford, has been expanded into a statewide and inter-religious program.
In making the announcement, Archbishop Henry J. O'Brien of Hartford said:
"What pleases me especially is the fact that the incorporation of Project Equality makes this work a truly cooperative interreligious venture. I am happy to see so many of our religious leaders joining hands to assist in this important work."

Project Equality is an equal employment opportunity program sponsored by the National Catholic Conference for Inter-religious Justice. Participating institutions agree to take action to end discrimination, if any, in their own hiring practices and to require similar action on the part of their suppliers of goods and services. They agree to consider future contracts on the basis of the employment practices of the supplier as well as the requirements of price, quality, and service.

Religious groups who have already pledged their financial support to Connecticut Project Equality are: Connecticut Convention of American Baptist Churches; Connecticut Conference of the United Church of Christ; Connecticut Valley Region, United Synagogue of America (Conservative); Union of American Hebrew Congregations (Reformed); Union of Orthodox Congregations of America; Connecticut Jewish Community Relations Council; New England Synod of the Lutheran Church in America; New England Southern and New York Conferences of the Methodist Church; Presbyterian Presbytery of Connecticut Valley.



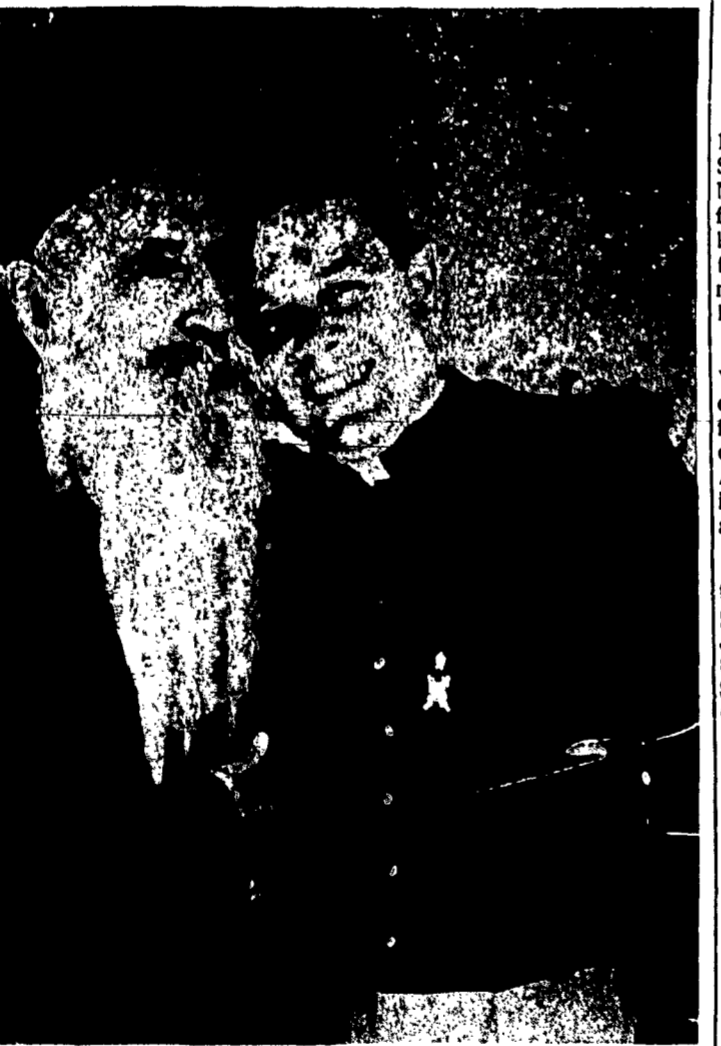
Veterans' Day Mass

Jesuit Warns Expect Vocation Drop

Dallas — (NC) — The current culture of the United States cannot be expected to produce abundant vocations to religious life, Jesuit Father Vincent McCorry said at the annual meeting of the National Theresian Conference here.
Vocations, the associate editor of America magazine said, have traditionally been abundant in cultures characterized by clericalism, un-questioning piety, relative poverty, strong family structure, limited career opportunities, downgrading of worldly values, and restricted pleasures.
American culture today, he continued, is characterized by individualism and the impaired image of the priest, uncertainty in belief, affluence, family permissiveness, boundless career opportunities, exaltation of worldly values, and a wide range of pleasures.
In this type of culture, he said, vocations will inevitably decline and the question which must be faced is: "Is the great age of religious life, as we know it, now coming to an end?"
An affirmative answer would not necessarily be detrimental to the Church, he said.
"All is not lost. Religious vocations should increase in quality; vocations from minority groups may increase, secular institutes will prosper and the 'temporary' apostolate will help," he said.
"Christ will be a power in the world of tomorrow. We just don't know what working clothes he will wear," he told the Theresians who are dedicated to fostering vocations to Sisterhood.

Greek Patriarch Honors U.S. Mission Priest

Istanbul — Christians separated by history can leap toward unity by allying against world poverty, according to His Holiness Athenagoras, the Ecumenical Patriarch.
"We are already united," the head of world Orthodoxy told Catholic anti-poverty leader, Monsignor John G. Nolan, Secretary of the U.S. Catholic Near East Welfare Association, in an extraordinary private audience at the Patriarchal Palace here.
Shattering precedent, the Patriarch decorated Monsignor Nolan, a 42-year-old New Yorker, with the Gold Cross of the Order of the Council of Rhodes.
The Monsignor recently rounded out a 20,000-mile survey of Catholic commitments in the Near East, Africa, and the Balkans. Monsignor had called upon the Patriarch to bring the greetings of Francis Cardinal Spellman, CNEWA President, and to discuss generally the work of the two Catholic agencies which touch Orthodoxy at several points.

Nolan of the U.S. Catholic Near East Welfare Association and President of the Pontifical Mission for Palestine, following their historic meeting in Istanbul. Monsignor Nolan is seen wearing the Gold Cross of the Order of the Council of Rhodes, the first person not a member of the Orthodox Church to be so honored. During their two-hour meeting the Patriarch spoke of "Christian Reunion — instantly, in charity."

Homes Sought For Students From Abroad

Washington — (NC) — The 1967-68 International High School Student Program of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, by which U.S. Catholics can serve as "host families" for Catholic students from Europe and Latin America, has been launched.
Conducted through the NCWC Youth Department, the program enables high school students from foreign countries to become better acquainted with the American way of life by attending schools in this country for a year.

Deadline for host family application for the 1967-68 program is Feb. 1, 1967.
