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**Sunday Sermon
A Protestant
Problem Too**

Durham, N.C.—(RNS)—The opening session of the annual Christian Convocation and North Carolina Pastors School at Duke University was told here that the sermon has been "a means of communication and proclamation" and "there is great disillusion with respect to the effectiveness of the Sunday sermon."

The speaker, Dr. Edmund A. Steimle, of the Union Theological Seminary in New York, said "preaching is in great trouble" and there is a need for re-appraisal if it is to be a vital force in preacher-congregation communication and a strong point in Christian heritage."

Dr. Steimle, a well-known Lutheran theologian, said he "had not come to bury preaching," but to "take a serious look with his fellow ministers at the place of the pulpit in the overall mission of the church and to suggest means for its renewal."

Stating that there is a definite place for the sermon in the traditional form as a part of the main worship service, he said, however, that "the sermon has become a catch-all for almost any or every purpose a minister may wish. It is used to raise money, to promote stewardship, social action, or any number of things."

He suggested that these functions may best be served through other structures in the church organization.

Blaine Bias Voted Out

New York — (RNS) — More than half the delegates to the New York State Constitutional Convention next April will be in favor of repeal of the so-called Blaine amendment.

That "amendment"—a provision of the state's constitution—specifically bars any church-related schools. The estimate was based on unofficial and incomplete returns from Election Day balloting. Citizens of New York State elected 186 delegates to the convention. In each of the 7 State Senate districts, the voters named three delegates. In addition, statewide, New Yorkers elected delegates at large slates of 15.

Prior to Election Day, the Citizens for Educational Freedom, a predominantly Protestant-Catholic unit with Roman members and officers—sent a questionnaire to all candidates for delegate, asking them to express their opinions on Article 11, Section 3 of the constitution (the Blaine amendment). In the questionnaire, those advocating some action on the Blaine amendment indicated they either favor repeal, or the substitution of another article with wording similar to that of the First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution, or both.

A total of 102 delegates elected to the constitutional convention indicated on the CEF questionnaire that they wanted a change in the Blaine amendment. Only two delegates elected on Nov. 8 expressed a desire to retain the controversial amendment. Among the other delegates elected, 36 did not answer
