Corning Panel

Clergy Probe Unity Hopes

Corning—A group of over one hundred men and women from several area churches responded enthusiastically to a panel discussion on ecumenism featured at the November meeting of the St. Patrick's Parish Aides at St. Patrick's school hall.

Four local clergymen discussed "The Ecumenical Movement: what is it and where is it going?" They were: Rev. Floyd Addison, pastor of Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Corning; Rev. Charles L. Briem, serving as minister for the Congregational Church of Hornby and interim minister for the First Congregational Church of Corning; Rev. Joseph M. Egan, pastor of St. Patrick's Church, Elmira; and Rev. James Elliott Lindsey, rector of Christ Church in Corning.

Rev. John M. Mulligan, moderator of the Parish Aides, served as moderator for the discussion.

Father Egan opened the program by pointing out that "Pope John XXIII made the greatest contribution toward bringing the ecumenical movement to life in the twentieth century."

Turning to the history of religion, Father Egan asserted that the Reformation of the sixteenth century can be viewed in two ways: on the dark side the Reformation brought about the separation of Christians, but the shock of separation also produced necessary reforms and re-thinking which "may have been providential."

He said continued separation is harmful to Christianity today because unity begets strength, and thus "Christians must focus their attention on the very many and the very important beliefs that unite them."

Pastor Addison then stated that "Christian Unity is a subject which is dear to the heart of the Lutheran Church." He said that unity is a dynamic movement within the Lutheran Church today as evidenced by the fact that this century has witnessed the emergence of three major bodies to the Lutheran Church whereas at one time there were approximately twenty-five such groups.

Pastor Addison also referred to formal discussions between Roman Catholics and Lutherans

on the Nicene Creed and baptism, and briefly reviewed his Church's theological position. "What all Christians have to do," he concluded, "is to learn what their Lord and Master did—do. For the sake of unity they must learn to die to some ideas which are very near and dear to their hearts."

The four initial presentations of the clergy were followed by an interesting, lively, and frank question period. Among the subjects treated during this period were the problems of: "faith and works"; the Churches' apparent quibbling over incidentals; and the advantages of a new, unified translation of Scripture.

Father Lindsey proposed the idea of inter-Church prayer services in the near future, which was loudly applauded by the audience. Several members of the audience then named communities which have already had such services.

Father Lindsey opened his remarks by stating that "whether we like it or not, unity is in the air." He then pointed out steps taken by the Episcopal Church to promote frank discussion on the topic of ecumenism, and briefly reviewed his Church's theological position.

Dr. MacEliven Memorial Fund

The estate of Dr. William MacEliven has announced the establishment of a "Dr. William MacEliven Memorial Fund" to perpetuate the project he started in the British West Indies. His desire was to send much needed medical supplies and equipment to the hospitals at St. Vincent in the British West Indies and to encourage other doctors to conduct symposiums in that region as an aid to their local medical people.

Dr. MacEliven discovered the appalling medical needs in that area while on a vacation trip and flew to St. Vincent the last week in October, taking with him about \$40,000 in medical supplies contributed by pharmaceutical houses. During his stay in the British West Indies he administered to the hospital patients and conducted informal seminars with the local doctors.

On his return trip to Rochester he was killed in the crash of a private chartered plane.
