

## Hornell Knights Hear Newman Club Chaplain

Father L. John Hedges, Newman Club chaplain at the University of Rochester, appealed for a positive reaction to today's college students in his talk to Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus meeting on Nov. 27 in Hornell.

Father Hedges, returning to his native Hornell to address the Knights from Hornell, Dansville and Rochester, spoke from 18 years experience with college age people.

"It's unfortunate that the five to eight per cent beatnik college students usually make the headlines and television cameras while the other 95 per cent who are too busy with their studies for drink, dope, or sex, are overlooked," he said.

Father Hedges also stressed the need for public action to eliminate, or at least revise the Blaine Amendment which "denies access to state college facilities for worship purposes. Therefore," he continued, "we have the ironical situation of taxpayers' sons and daughters being denied the privilege of seeking religious guidance in the very buildings their dollars helped to erect."

At the meeting, officers of the Hornell Council Fourth Degree Assembly and the Bishop McQuaid Assembly of Dansville were installed.

## Newman Clubs Meet, Discuss Liturgy Changes

Representatives of Newman Clubs from four colleges attended a conference on Friday, Nov. 18, at Elmira College for a discussion of changes in church liturgy.

Seventy attended the meeting from Mansfield State College, Elmira College, Ithaca College and Corning Community College.

Rev. Michael Volpe, assistant pastor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church, Rochester and diocesan director of sodalities, addressed a dinner meeting of the group, stressing the need for an informed laity.

Following the dinner, Rev. Michael E. Daly, chaplain at the New York State University at Brockport, said that "as Christians we must find a commitment to life — a place where we can do the most good for others."

"We must carry this commitment into our worship, where a close community spirit must exist to give the fullest meaning to the liturgical reforms," said Father Daly.

The highlight of the evening was celebration of Mass, sung to folk music with guitar accompaniment.
