

Mooney Shocks Edison, 75-47

A hustling and aggressive pressing defense paved the way for Mooney's second basketball win of the season as it trounced Edison Tech 75-47 on the Engineer court. Jim Harrington's 21 points paced the Cardinals attack while Otis Davis tossed in 18, and Sophomores Doug Farrell and Terry Meagher had 14 and 12 points respectively.

Mooney opened up a 23 to 5 bulge in the first period and led 43 to 15 at the halfway

mark. The Cardinals kept up the pressure in the third period as they threw in 18 points to Tech's 19 and to go ahead 61 to 28.

The Cardinals had fine defensive performances from Dan Shoniker, Dick Felber, and outstanding rebounding from Davis, Harrington and Felber.

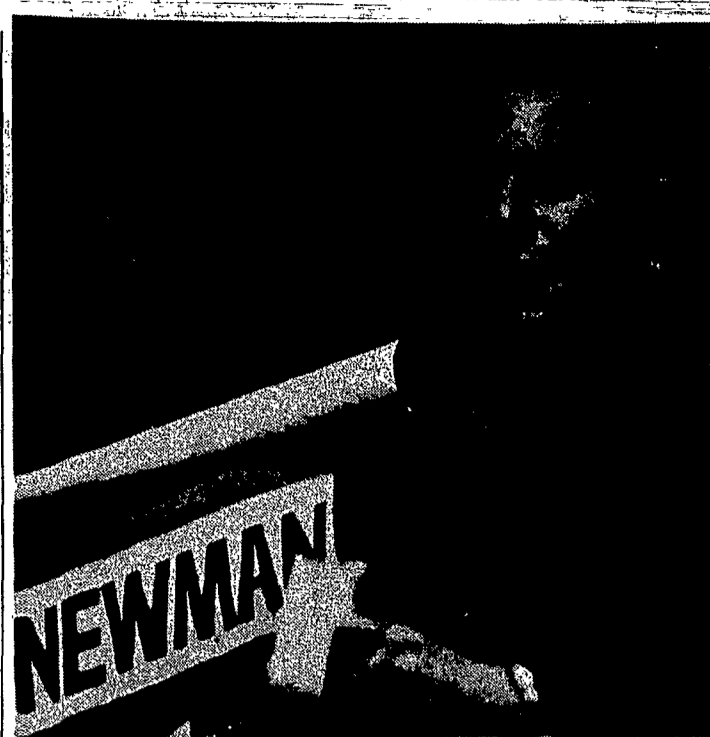

Secular Campus Dangers Challenged by Chaplain

Father Charles Borgognoni, chaplain of the Newman Association at Syracuse University, spoke on "The Catholic Student on the Secular Campus" in the second presentation of a Christian Culture Series, sponsored by the Fraternity of Christian Doctrine at Good Shepherd Church, Henrietta.

Father Borgognoni discussed the problems faced by seven-year-olds when they leave the security of their parents' presence for college life.

"Should your child enter a secular university?" Father Borgognoni asked. "Yes, if he or she is spiritually, emotionally, and mentally mature. The secular campus is not the cause of Catholic students losing their faith; it is merely the occasion." The cause, according to Father Borgognoni, is the lack of spiritually based maturity with which they come to college.
