### Disciples Hear Race Issue

## OK on Changes Expected

Atlanta — (RNS) — Stressing to please the bishops, Archbishop Egidio Vagnozzi, Apostolic Delegate to the United States, predicted here that most of the liturgical changes requested by the American hierarchy would be approved.

The archbishop said he was unable to tell which changes would be approved or rejected. The U.S. bishops' principal requests asked permission to read

the Canon of the Mass in English and to conduct "controlled" experimentation in the rite of the Mass.

Archbishop Vagnozzi made his comments during a two-day visit here to commemorate the first anniversary of the closing of the Vatican Council, the end of the Archdiocesan Synod, and the Feast of the Immaculate Conception.

Archbishop Paul J. Hallinan of Atlanta, newly-elected chair-

man of the U.S. bishops' liturgical commission, spearheaded the requests for changes in the liturgy. He said that he would keep asking for approval of the changes if the first request is turned down.

"I think the liturgy, in general, is developing very well," Archbishop Vagnozzi said. "There have been a few excesses, but they have not been general, and I think the bishops are doing the best they can for the good of the people. It takes time to complete a text in English on the liturgy."

The Apostolic Delegate also discussed church architecture and modern art in relation to the development of the liturgy.

"I am for modern art, but it has to be liturgical and religious," he said. "Not all of the churches of the past are nice, not all of them built today are

nice, but some are, and we can improve."

While here the Apostolic Delegate met with the bishops of the Province of Atlanta.

Asked what he had discussed with the bishops, Archbishop Vagnozzi said some of the topics covered were schools, seminaries, discipline of clergy, appointment of bishops, and the possibility of offering bishops of the South help in securing priest-hood vocations.

Noting that he and the bishops do a great deal of consulting, he said it is the desire of the Holy See to "solve the problem where it exists, rather than it being sent to Rome."

Archbishop Vagnozzi said that he is a strong supporter of the parochial school system but "we cannot expect all Catholic students to be in parochial schools. The CCD (Catechism of Christian Doctrine) program is a necessity and the CCD and parochial schools could complement each other."

## 'Traditionalist' Claim Denied

Vatican City — (NC) — The Congregation of the Council has ruled that Father Gommar de Pauw is still under the jurisdiction of the archdiocese of Baltimore.

The priest's case made headlines early this year when he claimed to have obtained a release from the Baltimore archdiocese and to have been admitted to the Italian diocese of Tivoli, near Rome, because of a dispute with Lawrence Cardinal Shehan of Baltimore.

Dutch-born Father de Pauw is the founder of the Catholic Traditionalist Movement in the U.S., which is working for the preservation of Latin in the liturgy and opposes several of the liturgical changes made following the proclamation in 1963 of the Second Vatican Council's Constitution on the Liturgy.

He established the headquarters of the movement in New York after being ordered by Cardinal Shehan to discontinue it and announced at that time that he had been released from the Baltimore archdiocese and granted "incardination" or legal status in Tivoli.

He said he was assisted in this move by Bishop Luigi Faveri, of Tivoli, Francis Cardinal Spellman of New York and Alfredo Cardinal Ottaviani, prefect of the Doctrinal Con-

gregation, all of whom have since disassociated themselves from the transfer. Cardinal Shehan has said that no transfer took place, although he admitted it had been considered at one time. Father de Pauw appealed to the Holy See.

The decision of the Congregation was dated Sept. 30, but not published in L'Osservatore Romano, Vatican City daily, until Dec. 13.

It said that a "special commission, established by a higher authority within the Congregation of the Council to judge on the validity or non-validity of the incardination into the diocese of Tivoli of Father Gommar de Pauw of the archdiocese of Baltimore, after having heard the parties concerned and examined the documents shown by them, has declared that this incardination is not valid, since the conditions called for by Canon 112 of the Code of Canon Law (dealing with incardination) have not been verified. Consequently Father de Pauw remains for all canonical purposes subject to the archbishop of Baltimore."

The note in L'Osservatore Romano said that this decision had already been communicated to Cardinal Shehan, the bishop of Tivoli, Father de Pauw and Cardinal Spellman, within whose jurisdiction de Pauw, is currently carrying on his activities.

## New Canon Text Ready, Waits Rome Approval

Washington — (NC) — Spurred by the American bishops' decision to request permission for a vernacular canon in the Mass, the International Committee on English in the Liturgy (ICEL) announced that it has taken steps to provide the translation if permission is received.

In a report to the episcopal conference of the countries represented on the ICEL, the committee stated that members were preparing a translation for the American bishops as well as an internationally acceptable translation for all English-speaking countries.

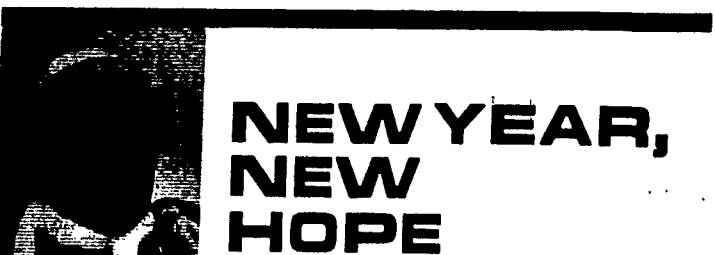
The committee also outlined an extensive program for 1967 in its report. Admitting that adaptation to local needs and accurate translation of the Latin texts is a problem yet to be solved, the committee report pointed out that the creation of new texts and rites was beyond its competence.

Another feature of the report was the recommendation that a

simple booklet of translations of prayers, prefaces, psalms and biblical readings would be published in January, 1967. This is the second pamphlet published by the ICEL since its formation in 1963. Results of the 4,000 criticisms and suggestions submitted on the first pamphlet are now being analyzed at England's University of Reading and a similar analysis is planned for comments on the January pamphlet.

Equally important, the committee said, is its work on the English translations of the experimental rites prepared by the Consilium, the Vatican's post-conciliar liturgical commission, and sent to the various translation committees. In addition to a recently published funeral rite, the committee will translate revised rites for the sacraments, the Mass, the priest's prayer book and the bishop's service book.
