Reformation Remnant: English Bishops 'Illegal'

London—(NC)—The Catholic bishops in England and Wales act illegally every time they use their titles, and they are liable to a fine of about \$280.

This is what an expert in English heraldry, John Brooke-Little, claimed in a lecture here. He pointed out that the existence of the titles was contrary to the Catholic Emancipation Act of 1829, which freed Catholics here of most of the penalties imposed on them at the Reformation.

A clause in this act, which had never been repealed, declared implicitly that "no archbishop, bishop or dean, or pretended archbishop, bishop or dean may use any territorial title."

In other words, the speaker said, it is an offense for any Catholic to call himself the bishop of any diocese.


Mr. Brooke-Little is one of the officers of arms at the College of Arms, which adjudicates on the titles and armorial bearings of the English aristocracy. Because they are technically illegal, the Catholic bishops are not entitled to use their titles, and they are officially recognized diocesan arms.

John Cardinal Heenan, archbishop of Westminster, and a few other bishops, however, have applied to the college for personal coats of arms and these have been granted—at a fee of about \$400 each.

Asked to comment on this illegality of the bishops, a spokesman at the archbishop's house, Westminster, said: "Their kingdoms are not of this world."

Sues for Negligence
Detroit—(NC)—A Catholic boys high school here is suing the city of Detroit for \$2 million in damages, alleged negligence in the operation of a nearby city airport, due to constant noise and vibration created by the takeoff and landing of planes at the airport which interfere with the proper study and teaching of students.

Textbook Law OK'd

Albany—(NC)—New York's controversial textbook loan law, declared unconstitutional in its first court appearance last August, was upheld by the five-judge Appellate Division of the State Supreme Court.

But while all the judges supported the constitutionality of the law, the majority refused to consider its merits, and dismissed the suit on the grounds that a public school board did not have the right to bring suit.

The law requires public school districts to buy and lend books to pupils in grades 7-12 in non-public as well as public schools. The state reimburses the local districts up to \$15 per pupil.

The law was challenged by the East Greenbush school board and the New York Civil Liberties Union, and last August State Supreme Court Justice Paul T. Kane ruled it unconstitutional on the grounds that the law provided aid to the schools, and not the children.

But the Appellate Division's two-man minority, whose opinion considered the case's merits, took the opposite view.

"The availability of books to students at nonsecular schools is little different from the availability of books in the public library," wrote Associate Justice Ellis J. Staley Jr.

Justice Staley cited federal and state programs ranging from school lunches to scholarships which are available to all students, and added that the textbook law "is thus readily ascertainable as an aid to the school child, rather than as indirect aid to the school."

The majority opinion, written by Associate Justice J. Clarence Herlihy, did not delve into the constitutional merits of the law, but dismissed the suit on the grounds that the school board which filed the suit was "a creature of the state" and had no right to sue.

But he added that the majority is satisfied that the statute does not contravene the constitution of the United States or that of the State of New York.

Lawyers for the school board and the Civil Liberties Union said they would appeal in the Court of Appeals, the highest court in New York.

Political Leader a Vicar Gen.

Bologna—(RNS)—Father Giuseppe Dossetti, a well-known political leader in Italy before his ordination in 1959, was named Pro-Vicar General of the Bologna Catholic archdiocese.

The appointment was made by Giacomo Cardinal Lercaro, Archbishop of Bologna, who officiated at the priest's ordination seven years ago.

As a vicar general of the archdiocese, Father Dossetti is in line for episcopal appointment.

Father Dossetti was secretary of the Italian Christian Democratic Party and served in Parliament. He was regarded as a leader of the party's left wing in the early years after World War II.

With the present Italian Foreign Minister, Amintore Fanfani, he has been credited with influencing much of his country's post-war political life.

Father Dossetti gave up a political career in 1956 to study for the priesthood. He assisted in planning for the Second Vatican Council.
