McQuaid Halts Mooney, 57-51

Trailing for almost the whole game, a fired-up McQuaid team exploded in the final quarter to earn a 57-51 win and deal Cardinal Mooney its first loss.

The game was played before a high-strung SRO crowd Saturday night at the McQuaid gym.

The win gave McQuaid first place in the Catholic High School League with a 3-0 record, while Mooney's league mark is now 2-1. It was the Cards' first loss in 11 games and McQuaid's ninth win in 12.

The Knights, trailed 47-40, with 4:30 to go when they began the rally. John Koller twisted for a layup to start things, and Jeff Gillenkirk hit two fouls and a jump shot to close the gap to 47-46. When Mooney's Dick Felber missed the second half of a one-and-one foul opportunity, the score stood at 48-46, and McQuaid finally tied it on Bob Weingartner's 2 foul shots with 2:02 remaining.

Then Gillenkirk, who paced the sport with 8 points in 3 minutes, gave McQuaid the lead with 1:20 to go. Mooney came back with 3 points to close the lead to 52-51 with 45 seconds left, but McQuaid froze the ball for 30 seconds until Weingartner drove the baseline for a twisting layup and added a foul for the clinching 3-point play. Koller ended the game with 19:22 more fouls in the final seconds.

Earlier in the game, Mooney had jumped off to a 12-6 lead using an aggressive full-court press. However, Koller came up

to post position near mid-court to break the press effectively the rest of the game. McQuaid closed the score to 28-26 by halftime, and 41-38, after 3 quarters.

The game was marked by good teamwork on both sides, with 3 men each in double figures. Koller was high with 21. Weingartner had 14, and Gillenkirk 13. For Mooney, Otis Davis had 16, Harrington 15, and Doug Farrell 10. Although outshout from the field, 19-17, McQuaid came through with 23 of 26 foul shots while Mooney had only 13 of 23.

The game was a stunning victory for the Crusaders who, relying on a very effective zone defense and a 4-point edge in overtime, marched off the floor victors in a down-to-the-wire 63-59 thriller.

Notre Dame led by 4 points with 35 seconds remaining when Perry Oakden hit from underneath to put East within 2 points. Seconds later Ed Craume was fouled and calmly converted both ends of a 1 and 1 situation, sending the game into overtime.

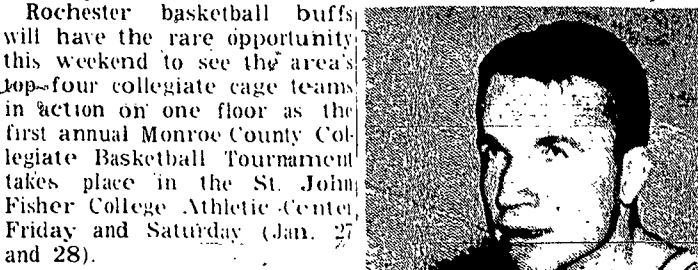
The Crusaders controlled the ball for most of the overtime period, which saw Bill Baker (N.D.) hit on a jump shot and drive to help put the game away for N.D.

Corning jumped off to an early 13-5 lead on six of their first seven shots and it appeared as though the Trojans might make it a runaway. N.D.'s defense tightened and along with Baker's rebounding they were able to come within 4 points at the half.

N.D. rallied in the second half, taking the lead in the third quarter and continuing at that pace until Oakden and Craumer tied it up 59-59.

Kevin Donovan Wins American Legion Award

There are many reasons why Aquinas Senior Kevin Donovan believes it is inexcusable to deny a man the right to a decent livelihood because of race, creed or color.

Hardheaded economic reasons, and lofty philosophic ones dealing with the essential dignity of man.

Donovan used them all last week at Cardinal Mooney High School. And his compelling reasoning won for him first place in the annual American Legion Oratorical Contest.

In a speech entitled: The U.S. Constitution—Protector of Minorities, Donovan chipped away at the barriers that delay an acceptance of minorities and pointed out that, when evoked, the American Constitution has been the great protector of freedom since its inception in 1789. Justice delayed is justice denied; the Government has a solemn obligation, in Donovan's view, to dispense justice without delay to its own people according to the Constitution.

Donovan, 17, was presented with a trophy and \$25 for his winning effort. He also won the right to compete in the District Oratorical Contest Feb. 5 in Auburn State and national competition would follow if he is successful.
