

#### **New Headdress for St. Joseph Nuns**

A wide majority of votes may put the Sisters of St. Joseph of Rochester into a Bergdorf Goodman-designed headdress pending approval by the Sacred Congregation of Religious in Rome. In a preferential balloting last week the Sisters chose from among ten styles the one being worn experimentally by the Motherhouse Sisters. According to the process for essential habit change, the Sacred Congregation requires the expression of preference by the majority of the community. Pictures of the new habit and the traditional one must be sent to Rome. Wearing the traditional headdress is Sister Anne Joseph, assistant director of novices; in the new headdress; Sisters Alma Mary, Albertus, Maura and Ruth Agnes.




