

### 'Birthday Party' Playing at Theatre East

A New York premiere of "The Birthday Party," by award-winning playwright Harold Pinter, is Theatre East's presentation, Mar. 2-12. For the first four nights of the production, audiences are invited to have coffee and meet the cast after performances.

A departure from traditional theater, "The Birthday Party" is concerned with the uncertainties of life, as revealed through the humdrum lives of six characters. Menace and fear, lurking just beneath the surface of their lives, sometimes explode with elemental fury and result in moments of great theatrical intensity.

The production is under the direction of Robert Blackburn, who drew high critical praise for his direction of Theatre East's "Twelfth Night" and his performance of Undershaft in "Major Barbara." He is being assisted by G. Roy Levin, who founded the JY Drama Center here and is now teaching at Goddard College, Vt. Mr. Levin also has directed off-Broadway and written a play that was produced in London.

"The Birthday Party" cast consists of: Bernice McInerney, Ann Driscoll, Deven Bookwalter, Myra Mailloux, Richard Kuss and Thomas Barbour.

The following Theatre East production will be the Broadway comedy hit, "Under the Yum Yum Tree," Mar. 16-26. Tickets for all shows may be reserved by calling 334-9500.

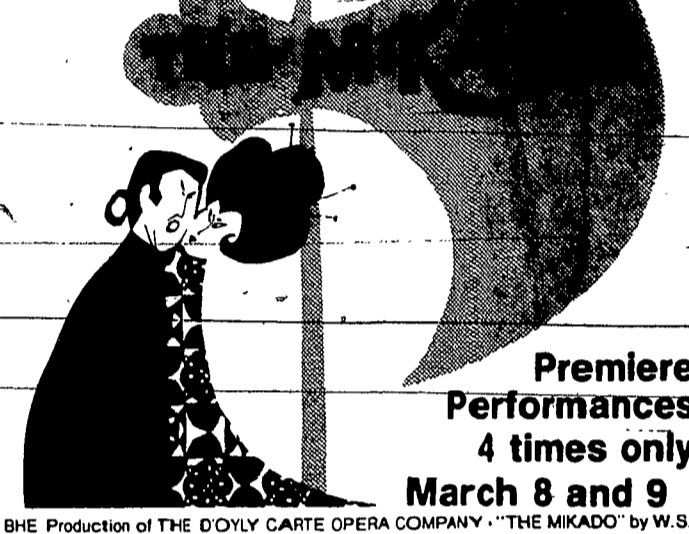
