Better flex your vocal cords—the Pope wants you to sing at Mass.

A new Vatican decree adds emphasis to a Vatican Council directive calling for people to take an active part in the Mass rite. The new decree says, "Unity of hearts is more profoundly achieved by the union of voices." High Mass, not Low Mass, is henceforth to be considered "normal," not exceptional.

The new decree also opens the door once and for all to modern style music and instruments other than the organ.

Priest Tells Horrors Of Gas Chamber

Annapolis — (RNS) — After hearing a Roman Catholic chaplain tell of the last hours of prisoners condemned to die, a state legislator wiped his brow and said, "Father Tobey may have passed this bill."

Delegate Thomas Hunter Lowe (D-Taibor) was referring to a measure calling for abolition of capital punishment in Maryland. The State Senate Judiciary proceedings committee and the House Judiciary committee are holding hearings here.

Father Francis M. Tobey, S.J., a chaplain at the Maryland Penitentiary, appeared before the committees in opposition to capital punishment, as "a man and a clergyman dedicated to God."

He related the stories of many men, begging not to die, being led to the gas chamber, and then outscored the Crusaders in the last two periods.

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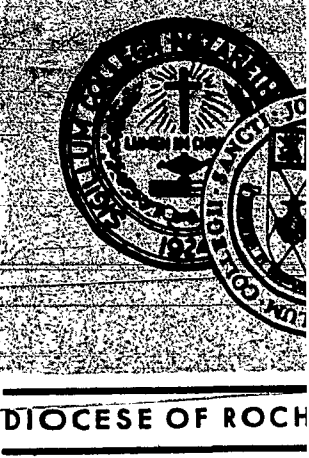
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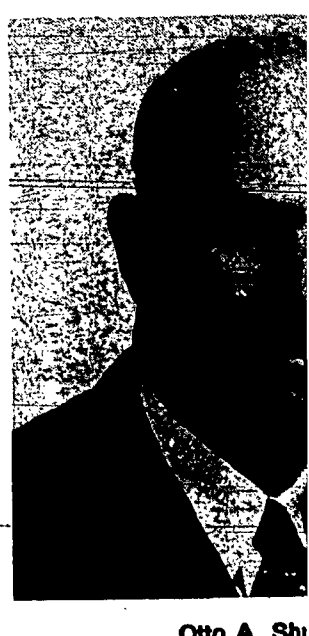
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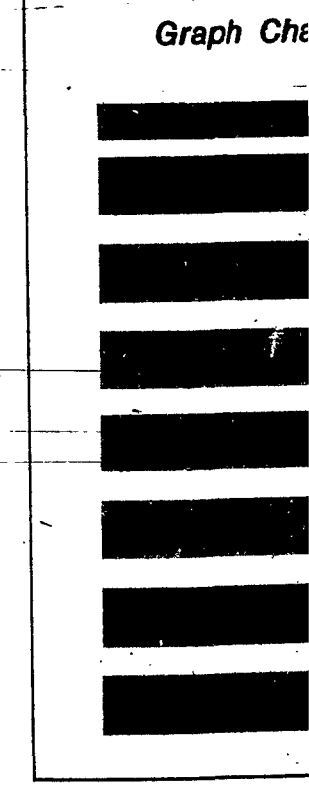
